CHAIRPERSON MILLER: The next case, as I mentioned, we have a Fact-Finding Hearing regarding Georgetown University events.

MR. MERCER: Hi, my name is Justin Mercer representing Georgetown University Senior Class Committee.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. There you are. Okay. And, Ms. Mathieson, do you want to put your name on for the record?

INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Sure. Investigator Erin Mathieson. Last name is M-A-T-H-I-E-S-O-N.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Okay. Mr. Mercer?

MR. MERCER: Um-hum.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Can you tell me what your relation is to Georgetown?

MR. MERCER: Yes, ma'am.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And then --

1 MR. MERCER: I'm the chairman --

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: -- give us --

3 MR. MERCER: -- of the Senior

4 Class Committee. I'm a current senior in

5 Georgetown College and so I help organize the

6 events that are going on now and I also

7 organized similar ones that we requested

8 temporary licenses for in the fall.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: In the fall?

10 MR. MERCER: Yes.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

12 MR. MERCER: We granted -- we were

13 granted both of those as well.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. All

15 right. So would you say that these events are

16 all similar? Not for you to give us an

17 overview of all of them or would you prefer to

18 take them one at a time?

19 MR. MERCER: They are very

20 similar.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

22 MR. MERCER: There is a slight

1 difference in between the one happening on  
2 April 26th --

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

4 MR. MERCER: -- and then the  
5 latter two. So if I could just group them in  
6 two separate ones?

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right. Okay.  
8 So let's start with one of those groups. The  
9 first one, how about that?

10 MR. MERCER: Okay.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. April  
12 26th, so that one is in the dining hall?

13 MR. MERCER: Yes, ma'am.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Do you  
15 want to just give a very brief overview?

16 MR. MERCER: Yes, ma'am.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

18 MR. MERCER: It is a party on-  
19 campus in the dining hall. It is -- there is  
20 a DJ, dance floor. We have snacks and soda  
21 provided. We also provide alcohol at the  
22 event. Only over 21 will be allowed at this

1 event.

2 What we do in order to ensure  
3 that, we have a university's registrar list.  
4 We also do a double check as well in terms of  
5 a valid Government ID and a valid Government--  
6 or a valid university GoCard, which identifies  
7 the year, student of university you are over  
8 21 by the valid Government ID and it matches  
9 the university records.

10 Once students are admitted to the  
11 party, they have a wristband and we do drink  
12 tickets and control the alcohol at the keg  
13 stations.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And what kind  
15 of wristbands are you using?

16 MR. MERCER: Tyvec. Just Tyvec  
17 wristbands that they are like a paper that you  
18 can't rip off.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, okay.  
20 Okay. And do you expect to have any underage?

21 MR. MERCER: No, not at the April  
22 26th event.

1                   CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Not at the  
2                   April 26th, okay, in the dining room. Okay.  
3                   And is this similar to the one you had in the  
4                   fall or --

5                   MR. MERCER: The latter two are --

6                   CHAIRPERSON MILLER: The latter  
7                   two.

8                   MR. MERCER: -- the other two we  
9                   will be talking about are exactly the same as  
10                  the ones we had in the fall.

11                  CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

12                  MR. MERCER: The only difference  
13                  with the April 26th event from those is that  
14                  this one is strictly 21 plus.

15                  CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

16                  MR. MERCER: The difference there  
17                  is the other events are for the senior class  
18                  in general. This one is just for over 21s on  
19                  campus.

20                  CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And do  
21                  you have any -- what's your arrangement if  
22                  somebody gets intoxicated?

1 MR. MERCER: If someone gets  
2 intoxicated?

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

4 MR. MERCER: We normally have on-  
5 campus university police department in case  
6 anyone is causing -- you know, is belligerent  
7 or is intoxicated. If it's a problem or a  
8 threat to the security of the people around  
9 them, we have them removed by the event from--  
10 using the police department on-campus. If  
11 it's a health hazard for themselves --

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

13 MR. MERCER: -- we have on-site  
14 emergency response service through a  
15 university service known as GERMS. It is in  
16 partnership with our hospital on-campus.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Great,  
18 great. All right. Do Board Members have  
19 questions? Mr. Jones?

20 MEMBER JONES: Thank you, Madam  
21 Chair. In terms of the ingress and egress, is  
22 there only one area?

1 MR. MERCER: One area to enter and  
2 exit the building?

3 MEMBER JONES: Right.

4 MR. MERCER: Yes, there is. There  
5 are emergency --

6 MEMBER JONES: Not emergency  
7 exits.

8 MR. MERCER: Besides emergency  
9 exits, there is only one controlled entry/  
10 exit for the party.

11 MEMBER JONES: Okay.

12 MR. MERCER: In the dining hall.

13 MEMBER JONES: And in terms of you  
14 check IDs at that ingress/egress point?

15 MR. MERCER: The university  
16 administrators do, yes.

17 MEMBER JONES: University  
18 administrators do?

19 MR. MERCER: Only university  
20 administrators may check IDs, yes.

21 MEMBER JONES: Okay. So how does  
22 that work exactly? Walk me through that just

1 to make sure I'm clear.

2 MR. MERCER: Yes, of course. So  
3 individuals come in through this entry point.  
4 There is two double set doors about as wide as  
5 this area right here. Individuals will enter  
6 through one and exit through another. We have  
7 signs we have prepared and we put little  
8 stanchions up to prevent, you know, crossover.

9 And there are administrators  
10 placed here as well. And individuals will  
11 enter. There are two tables of about four to  
12 six administrators, university administrators,  
13 and then with university police department  
14 around that.

15 An individual will come up,  
16 present both their forms of ID, a Government  
17 ID and a university GoCard, it's our  
18 university ID, to the university  
19 administrator. They will consult our  
20 university registrar's list of students to  
21 make sure that all three IDs both check with  
22 each other, match the person's photo and then

1 match the information that we have from the  
2 university and then that individual will be  
3 given a wristband signifying that they can  
4 enter the party and they will be allowed to  
5 enter from there.

6 MEMBER JONES: Okay. So is there  
7 a cutoff point for entry?

8 MR. MERCER: In terms of capacity?

9 MEMBER JONES: No, in terms of  
10 time.

11 MR. MERCER: Yes.

12 MEMBER JONES: I'm assuming you  
13 are not going to have administrators there  
14 working the entire duration of the party.

15 MR. MERCER: We do.

16 MEMBER JONES: You do?

17 MR. MERCER: Yes.

18 MEMBER JONES: Okay. So they are  
19 there the whole time?

20 MR. MERCER: They are there the  
21 entire time.

22 MEMBER JONES: Okay. And is there

1 entry and exit? Like once you get in --

2 MR. MERCER: There is no re-entry.

3 MEMBER JONES: No re-entry, okay.

4 Cool. Thank you. Thank you, Madam Chair.

5 MR. MERCER: There are signs that  
6 say that as well nor -- at the exit point.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes, Mr.

8 Alberti?

9 MEMBER ALBERTI: Just how many  
10 people are you expecting at one time? You  
11 have a total of 1,000 here, but --

12 MR. MERCER: Usually 1,000 is what  
13 it reaches at the endpoint of the party or by  
14 like right before the end. Usually, I would  
15 say, an average of 800.

16 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. And do you  
17 know how many campus security will be  
18 stationed there?

19 MR. MERCER: We request anywhere  
20 between 20 and 25. We almost always get  
21 between 15 and 20.

22 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.

1                   MR. MERCER: Sometimes they give a  
2 little bit extra. It's under the direction of  
3 our Chief of Police, Jay Gruber. He looks at  
4 the event and decides how many he thinks are  
5 appropriate for that.

6                   MEMBER ALBERTI: Great.  
7 Administrators, university administrators.  
8 What are their positions?

9                   MR. MERCER: Usually the foremost  
10 administrator there is the Assistant Dean of  
11 Students and the Chief or the Director of the  
12 Center for Student Programs, Erika Cohen-Derr.  
13 She is the one that submitted the letter --

14                   MEMBER ALBERTI: Yes.

15                   MR. MERCER: -- that goes with our  
16 application. We also have her entire staff at  
17 the Center for Student Programs. And then  
18 they also -- she also recruits other people in  
19 our Residence Life, which is the people that--  
20 sort of like the housing and resident  
21 assistants in the university. People from  
22 that department and other Student Affairs

1 personnel.

2 MEMBER ALBERTI: Great. Thank you  
3 very much.

4 MR. MERCER: Um-hum.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

6 Others? Is this event open only to Georgetown  
7 University students?

8 MR. MERCER: Yes, ma'am.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: They can't  
10 bring any friends from outside?

11 MR. MERCER: Not at all.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

13 MR. MERCER: All three events are  
14 like that.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Great.

16 So that registrar list is a sure check. Okay.

17 Okay. And this event is similar to the May  
18 14th event. Is that right or no?

19 MR. MERCER: May 12th and May 14th  
20 are very similar.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, May 12th  
22 and May 14th. Okay. All right. So this is

1 the dining room one. The other two are tent  
2 ones?

3 MR. MERCER: One of the -- May 12th  
4 is in the McDonough Tent and the May 14th is  
5 also a dining hall one.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

7 MR. MERCER: The reason I would  
8 say that the latter two are more similar is  
9 that the latter two have -- are open to the  
10 entire senior class, but the -- we have about  
11 10 under 21 students in the entire senior  
12 class at Georgetown out of 1,800 people. They  
13 just get special under 21 wristbands and they  
14 are not allowed to receive alcohol at the  
15 party.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Ms.  
17 Mathieson, do you have any questions thus far  
18 before I move into a different date?

19 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Yes, just  
20 a quick question. With the event for the  
21 senior class, is the -- are the administrators  
22 just printing a list of the whole senior

1 class? Is that how it's going to work?

2 MR. MERCER: We have the entire,  
3 yes, registrar there at the table.

4 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Okay. So  
5 no one other than the 21 year-olds in your  
6 class will be admitted?

7 MR. MERCER: For the April 26th  
8 event --

9 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Right.

10 MR. MERCER: -- anyone at the  
11 university that is over 21 will be admitted.  
12 For the May 12th and May 14th event, only  
13 senior class members.

14 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Okay.  
15 Will they be printing a list of all the 21 and  
16 overs?

17 MR. MERCER: Yes.

18 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: At the --

19 MR. MERCER: Yes.

20 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: So anyone  
21 who is not on that list wouldn't be allowed  
22 in?

1 MR. MERCER: Correct.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great. Okay.

3 So let's move on to just the other event.

4 MR. MERCER: Um-hum.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: In the tent.

6 MR. MERCER: Um-hum.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So

8 that's going to be a little bit different

9 logistically?

10 MR. MERCER: Yes, ma'am.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Do you

12 want to address how that will work?

13 MR. MERCER: So what we have is a  
14 giant tent enclosure. It takes up most of the  
15 -- our McDonough parking lot. It is a little  
16 bit smaller than the dining hall, in terms of  
17 size, but it's just a large rectangle.

18 We have -- the entire tent has  
19 bicycle racks that are about 3 feet high, 3  
20 feet wide and about 9 or 10 feet long that  
21 sort of surround the actual tent on the  
22 outside. This is to prevent people from just

1 going under the tent, even though it is  
2 strapped down.

3 We have two entry and exit points  
4 and then a side entry and exit. The main  
5 entry and exit is for where you would come in,  
6 you know, coming in egressing and ingressing  
7 in to the party. The back one is blocked, but  
8 it can be used as an emergency exit. It's not  
9 blocked off. It's just where the keg station  
10 is just to sort of prevent people from walking  
11 by or coming up from behind.

12 And then we have a side one for  
13 people who haven't registered yet for senior  
14 week. They can come in and register there and  
15 enter through the side. That one is also  
16 controlled by university administrators.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So there are  
18 two entrances? One in front and one in the  
19 side?

20 MR. MERCER: Yes. The main front  
21 one is -- the one in the front is the main  
22 one. The side one is for people who haven't

1 completed registration with the university for  
2 senior week. They -- what that means is that  
3 they have to go over -- at the beginning of  
4 our senior week events, which run from May  
5 10th to May 15th, you have to go to the -- we  
6 have registration days, which you go in,  
7 present your Government ID and university ID  
8 to an administrator. They check it, check it  
9 against the university registrar's records of  
10 you and then they wristband you for the week.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: oh, okay.

12 MR. MERCER: Some people who  
13 haven't completed that, can't enter the party.  
14 And so they have to go to the side tent to  
15 complete the registration and then they can  
16 enter through the side tent rather than  
17 sending them back around.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So  
19 that's different from the April one, too,  
20 because --

21 MR. MERCER: Correct.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: -- it's not

1 that senior week. Okay. Anything else  
2 different?

3 MR. MERCER: Like I said, there  
4 are -- this one is open to the entire senior  
5 class, so there are about 10 people in our  
6 senior class that will not be 21 by these  
7 events out of 1,800 total.

8 If I had to guess on how many of  
9 those people will come to the party, I would  
10 say a max of four to five. They get special  
11 wristbands that note that they are under 21.  
12 So if they approach a keg station, they cannot  
13 receive alcohol.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I see. Okay.  
15 Okay. And you are going to have university  
16 administrators checking the IDs there as well?

17 MR. MERCER: It's the same process  
18 in terms of --

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: The same  
20 thing.

21 MR. MERCER: -- only university  
22 administrators may check them and the exact

1 same number of university police department  
2 there as well.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Good.  
4 All right. Other questions? Mr. Jones?

5 MEMBER JONES: Thank you, Madam  
6 Chair. It seems like it's a minor issue given  
7 the law and the number of people you're  
8 talking about here, but of those four -- of  
9 the max of 10 possible attendees that are  
10 under 21 at the time of this event, they get  
11 a special wristband. There is nothing -- is  
12 there anything preventing them from getting a  
13 hand-off?

14 MR. MERCER: We do have volunteers  
15 patrolling it, but in terms of like how -- you  
16 know, how well our volunteers can patrol the  
17 event and like find that, I understand your  
18 concern and I -- other than like a volunteer  
19 seeing them while they are patrolling the  
20 event and our security guards patrolling the  
21 event, that could be a concern, yes.

22 MEMBER JONES: Okay. So help me

1 understand, how many people do you have that  
2 are in a volunteer capacity that are not  
3 overseeing, if you will, that type of  
4 activity?

5 MR. MERCER: Aside from the  
6 university police department that are also  
7 there at this event --

8 MEMBER JONES: Right.

9 MR. MERCER: -- we have eight  
10 volunteers that patrol the area.

11 MEMBER JONES: Okay. And the  
12 capacity of the area? I know you said it, but  
13 I just didn't hear you.

14 MR. MERCER: The capacity will  
15 also be about 1,000.

16 MEMBER JONES: About 1,000. And  
17 you expect roughly around 1,000 or do you  
18 just --

19 MR. MERCER: We do. We expect  
20 1,000 at the peak capacity. We expect an  
21 average of 800 throughout the event.

22 MEMBER JONES: Okay. All right.

1 And what is the protocol if a volunteer  
2 observes someone in that circumstance of  
3 getting a hand-off?

4 MR. MERCER: Absolutely. The  
5 volunteer is -- all our volunteers are usually  
6 our Senior Class Committee Members as well.  
7 They usually escort the person or if the  
8 person refuses to come uses -- goes with the  
9 university police department and has them  
10 escorted out of the party.

11 Almost always that person is --  
12 loses their privileges to the senior week.  
13 Their wristband is snapped. They are also  
14 followed-up with the Division of Student  
15 Affairs at Georgetown University the following  
16 business day to sort of go through  
17 disciplinary procedures.

18 MEMBER JONES: Okay. Thank you.  
19 And probably an obvious question, but all the  
20 volunteers are trained on that protocol --

21 MR. MERCER: Yes.

22 MEMBER JONES: -- beforehand?

1 MR. MERCER: All our volunteers  
2 are TIPS trained as well, so that they can  
3 also serve if they need to elsewhere in the  
4 area.

5 MEMBER JONES: Thank you. Thank  
6 you, Madam Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Any  
8 other questions? Ms. Mathieson?

9 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Yes, just  
10 a question. In terms of who is serving the  
11 alcohol that is going to be your volunteers?

12 MR. MERCER: At the April 26th  
13 event, it is our trained -- it's a catering  
14 service on-campus, the Georgetown Catering.

15 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Okay.

16 MR. MERCER: It is basically the  
17 same people that run our dining hall. It is  
18 Aramark Services, I believe is the overall  
19 company there. We pay them to serve at that  
20 event.

21 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Okay.

22 MR. MERCER: And then at our May

1 12th and May 14th event, it's TIPS trained  
2 volunteers.

3 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Were you  
4 familiar at all with the Georgetown Homecoming  
5 this past fall?

6 MR. MERCER: I am not. That is  
7 run through the Office.

8 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: That's  
9 run by --

10 MR. MERCER: Yes.

11 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Just so  
12 you know, we were there, ABRA, a couple of  
13 investigators went by and confiscated like 14  
14 IDs from people who came into the line like  
15 on-campus event and we confiscated 14. So are  
16 you -- you said you were coordinating, so you  
17 would have a list of all the staff.

18 MR. MERCER: Yes.

19 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: So is the  
20 school taking more of an involvement?

21 MR. MERCER: I can say how we are  
22 different from that event.

1 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Right.

2 MR. MERCER: The Office of  
3 Advancement does not use the university  
4 registrar list for that event, since it is  
5 also open to alumni --

6 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Right.

7 So --

8 MR. MERCER: -- and stuff. So we  
9 are strictly using the university registrar  
10 list, so there -- unless you are on the list  
11 and the information matches --

12 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: And the  
13 university -- okay. The university staff will  
14 be there --

15 MR. MERCER: And university staff  
16 will do that.

17 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: -- to do  
18 that.

19 MR. MERCER: Yes. Volunteers also  
20 -- like volunteers did the ID checking at the  
21 homecoming one.

22 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Right.

1 MR. MERCER: From what I  
2 understand. We do not do that at all.

3 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Okay. So  
4 none of the volunteers, it will strictly be  
5 staff.

6 MR. MERCER: Volunteers may only  
7 serve alcohol once an individual has been  
8 checked by the university ID and wristbanded.

9 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: And one  
10 more question, sorry. In terms of students  
11 drinking before the event, was -- how are you  
12 -- if people come in already intoxicated?

13 MR. MERCER: Absolutely. If an  
14 individual appears intoxicated or inebriated  
15 to a university administrator as they are  
16 entering the event, the university  
17 administrator or police department will turn  
18 them away from the event.

19 INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON: Okay.  
20 And if they enter the event and they only have  
21 one drink and appear to be intoxicated, if you  
22 remove them from the event?

1                   MR. MERCER:  If they are being --  
2                   if it's a health hazard to themselves, we do  
3                   the emergency services on-site.  If it's  
4                   intoxicated and being a danger to the safety  
5                   of others, then it is removed from the event  
6                   and followed-up with the Division of Student  
7                   Affairs the following business day.

8                   INVESTIGATOR MATHIESON:  All  
9                   right.  Okay.

10                  CHAIRPERSON MILLER:  Were there  
11                  any problems in the fall?

12                  MR. MERCER:  There were no  
13                  problems in the fall.  We had one or two  
14                  people that hopped the fence, but we -- I  
15                  personally was one of the people that had to  
16                  jump in and track them down and had to take  
17                  them back out.

18                  I was also a volunteer at this --  
19                  these events last year.  As an incoming Senior  
20                  Class Committee members, you usually volunteer  
21                  for these ones.  It's the same, so I can say  
22                  it's the same experience and the same sort of

1 -- you know to manage the event. You know how  
2 to -- what you are looking for as well.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Is the fence  
4 different this time to make it harder for  
5 somebody to do that?

6 MR. MERCER: So in the fall when  
7 we had people jumping the fence, that was on  
8 our Leavey Esplanade.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

10 MR. MERCER: And it was very  
11 obvious when someone jumps the fence, because  
12 that one was a 6 foot or 7 foot fence, so it  
13 was quite easy to spot someone. There are  
14 only two cases of that.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Wow.

16 MR. MERCER: And they were both  
17 brought to Student Affairs the following  
18 business day and caught at the party.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

20 MR. MERCER: We have never had  
21 someone jump the fence at our McDonough tent  
22 one, because you would have to hop the bicycle

1 fence, which is patrolled by the university  
2 police department as well on the outside of  
3 the tent and then find a way under the tent as  
4 well.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

6 MR. MERCER: So a bit more  
7 difficult.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Sounds  
9 good. Anything else? All right. Then I  
10 would move approval of these three  
11 applications for a temporary license by  
12 Georgetown University's Senior Class  
13 Committee.

14 Do I have a second?

15 MEMBER JONES: Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Any other  
17 comments?

18 All those in favor say aye.
