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CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Next
case on our calendar is a fact finding hearing. It's Case No. 13-251-00055, House of Secrets located at 507 T Street, N.W., License No. 91636 in ANC 1B.

Okay. When you're ready could you identify yourselves for the record, please, those of you who are at the table?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Good morning. Investigator Abyie Ghenene with ABRA.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.
MR. PRICE: My name is Branville Price. I'm the --

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I'm sorry, I can't hear. Is your mic on? Yes, your mic is on. Can you speak up just a little bit?

MR. PRICE: Yes, my name is
Branville Price. I'm the party at the house that night.

MEMBER BROOKS: Still can't hear you.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: One second. Okay. I'm sorry.

MR. PRICE: Try again?
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes. I want
to definitely get your name, yes.
MR. PRICE: Sure. My name is Branville Price.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Price? Okay.
MR. PRICE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And you are?
MR. PRICE: Yes, I'm the person
that had the party at the --
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You had the party where the incident occurred? Okay.

MR. WOODSON: My name is Ralph Woodson.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.
MR. WOODSON: And I'm the owner of the house.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You're the
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owner? All right. And someone is here from MPD? You're just gathering? You're not testifying? Okay. Somebody else here who is -- do you want to come take a seat at -there's a spot at this table --

MR. MORGAN: Right here?
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: -- if you're going to testify. Sure.

MR. MORGAN: I'm the ANC
commissioner for 1B-01.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. What's your name?

MR. MORGAN: Marc Morgan.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Morgan.
MR. MORGAN: Marc Morgan.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Marc Morgan?
Okay. All right. So we've called you here for a fact finding hearing because there was an assault that occurred as it related to the last party. And we understand that there have been a lot of parties at this location and we've -- the Agency has actually granted a lot

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of temporary licenses, and we want to gather more information about actually what's going on.

Maybe we can start with you, Mr. Ghenene.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Sure. CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Thank you.
You want just a summary of what happened?
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Sure.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And then if you want to go anywhere else after that, yes. All right.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Okay. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: This
investigation was initiated as a result of a telephone call made to the ABRA hotline on early Sunday, March 31st, 2013. At approximately 3:45 a.m. I responded to 507 T

Street with reports of a stabbing incident. When I arrived I met with several different officers, but none were the ones that were actually the reporting officers. They were the ones that were kind of containing the crime scene. Eventually I got with Officer Day, and Officer Day presented me with the one-day temporary license for the establishment.

507 T Street is a residential neighborhood and the actual -- I'm sorry, T Street is actually a residential neighborhood. 507 T Street is an adjoined house on that block.

When I arrived I noticed that
there were several blood trails throughout T Street, sometimes pooling. So there was a significant amount of blood on the street. And Officer Day advised me that the reporting officer, Officer Weber, she had actually transported a suspect in that stabbing incident. And after, she was kind of -- she
was detained during that time.
Officer Day and I entered 507 T
Street and immediately met with Mr. Woodson, who identified himself as the owner of the establishment. Mr. Woodson said that he was not the one hosting the event and that he had no financial interest in the event whatsoever. I asked Mr. Woodson if the Licensee, Mr. Price, Branville Price; and I'm reading the temporary license at this point, was on premise and he said that he was not. I asked Mr. Woodson if Mr. Price was ever on the premises that day and he said he was not. I then asked Mr. Woodson who was in charge of the event that night and he said that Ms. Kiona Rice was. Ms. Kiona Rice was on site and I spoke to her and gathered some more information.

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\text { When I entered } 507 \text { T Street, I }
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immediately noticed that it wasn't -- I guess
it didn't appear to be a house per se, like somebody -- a residence where people lived.

It was very much set up for an event and it wasn't temporary things that changed. There were very permanent things in there. For instance, the largest room on the main floor there was a permanent large bar, probably around the size of the Board's podium, I guess. But there was also a fixed DJ booth as well. And I took some pictures of that. It's in my report. Also the kitchen area has a permanent bar area and a very small stove and things of that nature.

I spoke with Mrs. Rice once I was inside and asked her a few details about the event specifically that night and events in the past. Ms. Rice stated to me that she was the one who supplied all the alcohol for the event, that she had some -- the alcohol that she provided for the event and that was sold during the event was surplus from events she had hosted, I believe she said in December, at the same establishment, or at the same residence and that she might have bought a
couple of bottles of wine to I guess add to what she brought, but none of it was bought for this event. It was stuff left over.

Ms. Rice also indicated that she was the primary promoter for the event and that her company, the Ambiance Group, was hosting a birthday party and pre-selling tickets for $\$ 50$. She said that she provided cakes, pastries and other dessert items for the event. And from what I was gathering from Ms. Rice, that was kind of one of the themes, was kind of this kind of dessert, cake, chocolate, that kind of thing that was part of I guess the promotion.
Ms. Rice stated that -- I asked

Ms. Rice -- Mrs. Rice if Mr. Price had been there at all during the evening and she stated that he was not there for the entire night, but he did come and stay for about approximately an hour during the event. I asked Mrs. Rice if there was any ABC managers outside of -- well, if there were an $A B C$--
was there an $A B C$ manager present. She said that she didn't know what that was, or she didn't know.

I asked Ms. Rice if she was the one who contracted the security staff for the event and she said that she did and that they came through the Nation of Islam and that she approximately had -- outside of the security she had 20 people that worked directly for her at the 507 T Street ranging from bartenders, bus boys and waitresses, I think, you know 20 staff members.

I asked Ms. Rice how she knew Mr.
Price and she said that they had a business relationship and they had worked together for years throwing parties.

Ms. Rice also stated that there were approximately 150 patrons that attended the event that evening and that she was unaware of any incidents that took place inside the establishment that evening.

That night I also spoke to Mr.

Woodson. Mr. Woodson indicated -- and he took me throughout the establishment and I saw, I would say, what I believed to be about 85 to 90 percent of the rooms inside the establishment and none of them had beds in them or, you know, stuff that I would consider to be inside a traditional bedroom. They all had sofas, a lounge-type atmosphere, something that would promote a lounge-type atmosphere. They had colored strings of lights and things of that nature, not overhead lights. It was definitely a lounge-type atmosphere, all the rooms that I saw.

Mr. Woodson had told me that he had been throwing parties for over 50 years at his residence and that again he never received any kind of financial compensation for letting people use his house and that he just wanted to help people, is what he told me.

I interviewed MPD Officer Weber, who was the reporting officer for the incident. Officer Weber indicated that a
dispute had begun inside the establishment between a man and a -- two men regarding the other men, one of the -- I guess it would be victims. At the time she indicated that he might have grabbed his wife inappropriately and the guy invited him outside to settle their differences. Once outside, the suspect found that the victim had brought his friend with him and a fight ensued at that point. And during that fight the victim was -- I'm sorry, the suspect pulled out a knife and cut both of the victims. So that's how the stabbing occurred, according to Officer Weber, the day of the incident.

On Tuesday, April 2nd, 2013, I
spoke with Mr. Price, and I used the telephone number listed in the application. Mr. Price indicated that on Saturday, March 30th he hosted a regular party at 507 T Street, N.W. I'm going to read this part directly because I want to make sure it's accurate, if you don't mind.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Mr. Price
stated that he and Mr. Woodson are old friends and that Mr. Woodson allows him to host parties at his home on occasion for no cost. Mr. Price stated that there were no promoters for the event and that he was present the entire night. Mr. Price stated that approximately 80 to 100 people attended the event and that it was a private party.

At the end of the conversation Investigator Ghenene asked Mr. Price who Kiona Rice was to him. Mr. Price stated that he did not know who she was. Investigator Ghenene explained to Mr. Price that she was at 507 T Street while Investigator Ghenene was present and claimed to be the only host of the event that evening. Mr. Price quickly changed his response and stated that he knows her as Kim and that she was his partner for the event. Mr. Price stated that he left the premises around 3:00 a.m. and did not witness any
incidents.
Mr. Price stated that he provided the following for the event: All alcoholic beverages, which he purchased from Schneider's of Capitol Hill; four security guards who are individually contracted; food items including chips and candy; and a DJ and three-piece band.

On Tuesday, April 2nd, 2013, I
reviewed the ABRA one-day -- Licensee filed for one-day licenses issued to -- for the oneday license issued to Mr. Price and found the following: The hours of the event were to be from 10:00 p.m. to 3:00 a.m.; he has had several events in D.C. before; he will be the event manager; there will be between 60 and 80 patrons; tickets will be sold at the door for \$30; two security guards will be hired and their names are Michael Adams and Cliff Barr; the nature of the event would be a first annual spring affair and that there would be one DJ and a three-piece band; snacks
including chips and pretzels would be provided; and all the alcohol -- he plans to purchase the alcoholic beverages from Schneider's of Capitol Hill. So that's what was actually on the application.

I continued to review ABRA files and other sources of information and found that there was a press release issued by ABRA in April of 2004 indicating that Mr. Woodson was hosting events at his home where underage drinking, gambling, drug use and sexual conduct were allowed. It was also concluded that Mr. Woodson was in possession of marijuana with the intent to distribute and selling alcoholic beverages to minors. ABRA also determined that Mr. Woodson did not receive any type of ABC license for the events he hosted.

## I also reviewed the ABRA files for

 temporary licensing, and I sorted it two ways. I reviewed it for all the one-day licenses that Mr. Price has applied for since 2009 andit indicated that he had six -- seven licenses issued to him between 2009 and the present. And that's for that one location, 507 T Street. Additionally, there was approximately 12 licenses since 2009 issued to 507 T Street for one-day temporary licenses. And that's also in a graph in my report.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: What's the difference between the 12 and the 7 ? What did you say?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I'm sorry. Mr. Price himself has applied and received seven different licenses.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Whereas the address has had --

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: -- 12
licenses.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Including the seven?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Ma'am?
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CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Inclusive of the seven?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, ma'am. CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Thank you.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: And that's what I've got.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: All right. Thank you.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: And what is the time period on that?

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And the time period is 2009 to '13?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir. Yes, 2009.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I just want to clarify for those of you who haven't come to a fact finding hearing before, it's different from our evidentiary hearings. No one is put under oath. We don't take documents into evidence. What we're doing is just trying to gather facts. And basically
we're trying to gather facts with respect to this case to determine whether the Agency will issue anymore licenses to this establishment, this residence, this address because of what we're hearing. So that's what we'd like you to address.

We're not going to take any action against any of the individuals today or anything like that. But there is a record here. It's possible if we thought there was some kind of activity we wanted to send to the OAG, we could. But basically the purpose of this hearing is to find out what's been going on there and whether or not anymore licenses should be issued. Okay. I want to make sure you understand that.

So, Mr. Woodson, I don't know if
you want to go next and address some of Mr. Ghenene's --

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Do we have any questions?

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You want to
ask questions? Why don't we hear --
MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Do we have any questions?

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Well, let's
see if Board Members want to hear a little bit from each of the parties before we ask questions, or you want to ask a question now?

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Okay.
MEMBER ALBERTI: I don't care.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: All right.
Let me hear what either of you two have to say about this topic.

MR. PRICE: First thing I guess I would have to say is -- and I'm not sure how there is miscommunication, what have you, but I was certainly there all night long. I would honestly tell you this -- Mr. Woodson's home is one of my favorites places in the world, so I actually would say I enjoy being there and I actually was there. I was there all night. If I obviously signed up for a license, I know that I'm responsible for being there and I was
absolutely there all night. I don't know why anyone would say I wasn't there, but I absolutely was there. I think I probably left about 3:30 in the morning. And I can tell you the thing that I remember seeing when I left was there was -- of course there was police in the street and there was somebody doing -pushing one of those things. I guess they were lining the street. But I was absolutely there all night long.

I would also say that there was absolutely no issue in the house. There was no fighting, nothing, and we never had an issue with any event that I'd ever had, so I don't -- I'm a little taken back and I'm certainly disappointed just in the fact that there was this commotion, this horrible thing that happened. I don't understand the fight and certainly like to this point where there was -- someone was maimed and hurt. So I think this is -- as I say, I'm very disappointed and I'm certainly aware as well
that I obviously have to be very much more careful about who I would invite to any party or event that I would have myself.

That's, you know, really all that I would have to say is again, you know, just in my defense I was absolutely there all night. I got there probably around 9:30 or 10:00 and I left -- the party was over at 3:00. I stayed and cleaned up, so I probably was there for about at least another -- I'm going to say probably about an hour. So anywhere from 3:00 to 3:30 when I left the house. So that's what I would have to say.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Mr. Woodson, do you have anything to add right now before we have Board questions?

MR. WOODSON: I don't have anything to say about it.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And, Mr.
Morgan, do you have anything you want to say right now before we do questions?

MR. MORGAN: Just briefly. I'm
the ANC commissioner for 1B-01, which encompasses Ledroit Park where this resident is located. An number of residents reached out to me after the incident that occurred on March 31st regarding concerns of noise, parking, public safety regarding this residence. Many of those residents have actually sent letters to this Board as well in protest.

It is the position of the $1 B$
Commission that we protest any application from 507 T Street from now and into the future for reasons of public safety, noise and parking. There will be an official letter of protest drafted by the full Commission that will be sent to this Board in recognition of that as well.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Thank you.

All right. Board questions? Mr.
Brooks?
MEMBER BROOKS: Yes.
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Investigator, did you see any food while you were there?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir.
MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. No chips, no pretzels, no sandwiches or anything like that?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir.
MEMBER BROOKS: Nothing at all?
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir.
MEMBER BROOKS: But you did observe alcohol?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. Were there any patrons there while you were there?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: It was clear that the event was over. There were probably I'd say like four to five people who did not look like they were working, but I didn't verify whether or not they were patrons.

MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. And this is
a town house?
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INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER BROOKS: And did you have opportunity to walk throughout the home?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER BROOKS: So how many levels are we talking about?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Three levels.

MEMBER BROOKS: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: From what I saw, three levels.

MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. And they were furnished as a home with beds and couches and things like that, or just --

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Just couches, pillows on the ground for like -kind of promoting like a loungey-type atmosphere.

MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. And what time was this while you were there?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I arrived on the scene at approximately 3:45 a.m., and

I left somewhere around 4:30 a.m.
MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. And you
interviewed Ms. Rice? Is that her name?
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER BROOKS: And was she
cooperative?
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Very cooperative.

MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. All right. Thank you, Madam Chair. I do have some other questions for the other people at the table, so I can wait until my turn again.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. All right. Mr. Alberti, you ask something?

MEMBER ALBERTI: Yes, but before I continue, I just thought maybe I'd like to give Mr. Price or Mr. Woodson a chance to ask Mr. Ghenene any questions that they might have. I mean you heard the report that Mr. Ghenene gave. So I'd like to give them an opportunity to ask any questions of the investigator, if they'd like. Is that okay
with you?
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: That's all
right. We'll be able to do that.
MR. PRICE: I mean I don't have any questions.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Very good.
Investigator Ghenene, thank you for your report.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Let's start with the easy stuff. Your chart of one-day licenses for this establishment indicates that there were -- if I have this right, I count seven one-day licenses issued to this address since November 23rd, 2012. Is that correct?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. And six of those were issued to Mr. Price, is that correct?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Did you
see the police report for this?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: It's not in your report, right? Is the police report in your report, or did I miss it?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir, it's the Exhibit 1.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Oh, Exhibit 1? Okay. Is there a time for the event that happened? Do we know what time this --

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I don't have my exhibits with me.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Someone help me out here. Oh, I see. Date and time found incident report. Would this be -- yes, agency, MPD. Okay. So the date and time of the report was 2:50. That's what it says in your report, I believe.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: The date and time --

MEMBER ALBERTI: Was 2:50 on the morning of March 31st.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. That's when this report was made, right?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: You're familiar with the police reports, right?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Is it typical
that the time of the report would be later than the time of the incident? I mean --

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: The time reported?

MEMBER ALBERTI: Yes, because this time of the report, would this be the time that they got the call?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, I don't know, sir.

MEMBER ALBERTI: All right.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I know that the times are generally pretty accurate as far as the time found. Reported might be --

MEMBER ALBERTI: Oh, the time found would be the time that they got the
call?
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I think time -- I don't know, sir. I don't want to speculate.

MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. But we know this is at least as late as -- can I ask the officer? We have an officer here. Can you answer that question, if I may?

OFFICER: (Off microphone.)
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Wait a second. It's not on the record.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So the --
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So he would have to come to speak into the microphone if we want it on the record.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Oh, so but just let me ask. When it says date/time found, would that be the time that the call came in?

OFFICER: That's the actual time the incident had occurred.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Great. Thank you. All right. So I'll just for the Neal R. Gross \& Co., Inc. 202-234-4433
record the officer in the audience has told me that the time found on the incident report usually reflects the time of the incident as they know it. All right. Thank you.

All right. The interior of the house, three levels?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: From what I saw, yes.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Did you see all three levels? Did you have a chance to go into all three levels?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Did you see every room?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: To be honest with you, I have no idea.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: The house was that -- there's that many rooms in the house that there could have easily have been rooms that I did not see.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Do you know how Neal R. Gross \& Co., Inc. 202-234-4433
many -- let's say the second floor. Usually that's where the bedrooms are.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Were there like separate rooms on the second floor that could be bedrooms?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I believe on the second floor I went into all of the rooms on the second floor.

MEMBER ALBERTI: And did you find any beds?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. And on the third floor?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I believe I went into all of the rooms and I did not see any beds.

MEMBER ALBERTI: And you found no beds on the first floor, right?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Did you see anything like dining room equipment?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir. MEMBER ALBERTI: Kitchen table?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: A breakfast bar sort of thing, a counter where people would be eating?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: There was a bar in the --

MEMBER ALBERTI: No, but I mean like a breakfast bar.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Oh.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Like, you know, a service bar where people would be eating. INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. I know you said there was a bar, and I took that to mean the kind of bar we'd see in an alcoholic beverage licensed establishment.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Or in a tavern.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: There was a pinball machine in the kitchen, too.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Oh, okay. And old one with a pole or --

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Cool. Okay. Now you interviewed Ms. Rice?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. And Ms. Rice said that she promoted this event?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I believe Ms. Rice stated that she was the host of the event.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: And Mr. Woodson indicated that she was the one that was in charge.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Did she seem knowledgeable about what was going on? How would you rate her level of knowledge of the events that event? Not the violence, but just the party itself.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: There was no question in my head that she was the one in
charge that night.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. And if I understood you correctly, she said that there was a cover charge of $\$ 50$ admittance?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Did she indicate how this thing was advertised?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: She did not. She just said through social -- I mean, she did. She said through social media, things of that nature. And I attached a flyer that I found.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Flyer for this event?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: And that would be --

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Exhibit 16.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Do we have those exhibits? Do I have a report with those? Just one moment. I don't think I have a complete report. Do we happen to have any
of those exhibits, like Exhibit 16? I could just take a look at it. You don't need -it's not there? Okay.

All right. Well, it's in our record. I don't have it available right now, but I'll rely on looking -- it's on our administrative record.

Okay. All right. Did I ask this, she said there was a cover charge of $\$ 50$ ? Is that correct?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir. Ms. Rice stated that tickets were pre-sold for \$50, but they were also accepting money at the door.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Oh, they were pre-sold for $\$ 50$ ? Well, that's interesting. And how many police officer did she say attended again? I know you said it before. INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Approximately 150 patrons.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Now when you spoke with Mr. Price and he told you that he Neal R. Gross \& Co., Inc.
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bought everything, he bought all the supplies, all the alcohol, he bought the alcohol from Schneider's on Capitol Hill, did he show you any receipts for any of these goods --

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: -- especially the alcohol?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir, but I didn't ask either.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: This was a telephone conversation.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Oh, okay. All right.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I spoke to Mrs. Rice on the premises.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Yes.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: She was there. Mr. Price was not.

MEMBER ALBERTI: And you showed up at what time?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE:

Approximately 3:45 a.m.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: But I did speak to Mr. I'm sorry, Mrs. Rice was on premise. Mr. Price I spoke to two days later.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. And Ms. Rice said that Mr. Price hadn't been there that evening?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Initially Ms. Rice said that he was not there.

MEMBER ALBERTI: That evening?
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: That evening.

MEMBER ALBERTI: When you spoke to her that evening?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: But when I had spoke to her two days later, she said that he stopped by for about an hour.

MEMBER ALBERTI: He stopped by for about an hour. Did she say when that was?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: She said she couldn't remember exactly. She said it
wasn't at the beginning and it wasn't at the end.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Do you know what time this event started?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: According to license it said 9:00.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I believe that the flyer -- I'm sorry, according to the license it said 10:00, but I believe the flyer -- I think the flyer said 10:00 as well.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. And the license is 10:00 until 3:00? Okay. I don't have any other questions right now. Thank you, Investigator Ghenene.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. I'll guess I'll just do a couple then, Mr. Silverstein.

Mr. Ghenene, you said that there's
a history of using this address for parties for temporary liquor licenses. Is there any history of problems or disturbances such as
this most recent one?
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I wouldn't have the most accurate information regarding that. Maybe MPD might be able to shed a little bit more light on that.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: How about Mr.
Morgan?
MR. MORGAN: There have been, according to our neighborhood records, complaints. And MPD can verify this. Over the past five years there have been multiple complaints regarding this residence.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And these complaints, have they been to the ANC or MPD, ABRA, everybody, or what?

MR. MORGAN: I believe they have
been presented to MPD. I'm not sure if
they've made it to the ANC or ABRA.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. How
long have you been on the ANC?
MR. MORGAN: I'm newly elected, since January.

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CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, you're newly elected? Okay. So you don't know off hand whether there have been any other resolutions or anything like that?

MR. MORGAN: Not other than --
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So, but of recent have there been complaints regarding any other parties other than this most recent one where the assault occurred?

MR. MORGAN: This was the only complaint other than there was a posting on a Web site about a party that was coming up on April 20th, I believe. And there were a lot of complaints around that one.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.
MR. MORGAN: A future party.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And what kind of complaints did you get about this last event?

MR. MORGAN: The residents that live directly behind reached out to me the day after the party to complain about the noise,
which went on, according to them, until about 3:00 in the morning. Another resident reached out about the stabbing, which was also I guess via the news that came out. Another resident reached out regarding parking and public safety within the neighborhood and that this has been an ongoing concern. The adjoining -I'm sorry, two houses over, the adjoining neighbor, also reached out in concern of, you know, that this has been ongoing, that this is a residential community, a residential neighborhood and they're using it as a pseudo club, so to speak. So that caused a lot of commotion and chaos within the neighborhood. CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Great. All right. Mr. Silverstein, do you have questions?

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Mr. Morgan, is there any indication anybody actually lives here?

MR. MORGAN: I walk past this
residence on a daily basis. I know that the

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lawn has always been well maintained and groomed. I can tell you that I have knocked on the door several times for neighborhoods things, you know, dropping flyers or what not. I've never gotten a response from anyone who lives there. A couple of times I've noticed we would leave literature on the door for upcoming events and three or four days later we would walk by and it would still be hanging in the door. I can attest that I know probably 85 percent of the people that live in that neighborhood and I've never met anyone who lives at 507 T Street.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: This
neighborhood is exclusively residential, that block?

MR. MORGAN: Yes, absolutely exclusively residential.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: And it is zoned --

MR. MORGAN: It's zoned residential as well.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: --
residential? No business?
MR. MORGAN: No businesses at all on that 500 block of T Street.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Mr. Woodson, does anybody live there?

MR. WOODSON: I live there. I've been living there for years.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Where do you sleep?

MR. WOODSON: I sleep on the second floor. I have a bedroom there on the second floor.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Mr. Ghenene, did you see a bedroom?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir.
MR. WOODSON: He didn't see that room. That room stays locked. Nobody can get in there. We don't have anybody going in there during the parties.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Why do you throw these parties, Mr. Woodson?

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MR. WOODSON: Why do I what?
MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Why do you host these parties in your home?

MR. WOODSON: Well, it's something to do. You know, we've had the parties there for years because there's been no place to really go in this city, you know, for our age group. So we've always had private parties there.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Your age group? This was a senior citizen party?

MR. WOODSON: Yes, the age group varies from like 20 -- 22 to 65 or 70, whatever.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Does this help pay the rent, pay the mortgage?

MR. WOODSON: Yes, well, it's not to help pay that. That's always paid and everything. But it's just something that we do because it's a place for a social outlet.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Does it help you provide --

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MR. WOODSON: It's dangerous going out in the street a lot of these places that are open nowadays.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: I'm sorry?
MR. WOODSON: It's dangerous going to a lot of places nowadays.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Yes, sounds that way.

MR. WOODSON: So we usually get a security there when we have a party to protect the people that are there and make sure there are no incidents going on inside the building.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: You're on Social Security, I take it --

MR. WOODSON: Yes, I'm on Social Security.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: -- like me.
And this helps with the income and helps you to keep the house up and all that?

MR. WOODSON: Yes, and keep the place straight, make sure everything is in order there.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: So how much you make out of these things?

MR. WOODSON: We don't make anything off it. We usually let the people have a party.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: I'm sorry?
MR. WOODSON: We let people have parties to help them out or whatever. We don't get involved with the financial rate.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: They don't help you to --

MR. WOODSON: Well, they help clean up the place. And if anything's broken, they replace it.

MR. PRICE: That's, you know, sort
of the rule of the house. Like you know, essentially I met Ralph years ago and he allowed me to have a party. And I'll be honest, I happen to have a lot of, you know, very beautiful female friends who come. And you know, he absolutely loves that, so he's always been nice to let me have parties there.

And essentially what I do is make sure, you know, we clean everything up nicely. And of course, as he said, we'll pay for anything that ever gets, you know, broken or what have you, pay for that sort of thing. But he doesn't charge me a fee to have parties. He has a great time.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: I mean he doesn't look like a rich guy. I'm sure, you know, that night you pulled in at least \$7,500.

MR. WOODSON: Well, I don't know what they pulled in because we don't have anything to do with whatever he pulls in.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: What did you
pull in, Mr. Price?
MR. PRICE: There was probably
several thousand dollars made, but you know, after paying everybody out, you know, probably I think I made about \$700-\$800.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: For 150
people at $\$ 50$ a pop you made $\$ 700$ or $\$ 800$ ?
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MR. PRICE: Security. You got to pay for the, you know, bartenders. DJs. We had a very nice band.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Okay.
MR. PRICE: So, you know, I do these parties, one, because it's a great time, and also to sort of build up my mailing list of people so I can, you know, have more events.

## MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: And you never

 helped Mr. Woodson with the upkeep of the house, rent -- or not rent, because he owns it. The mortgage or things like that. He's just a very generous and giving man, huh?MR. PRICE: I would say -- well, not much -- not that we're, you know, costing him for anything but electricity for a night. But I don't know what monetary, you know, things would be taken away from that. But, yes, but we've always -- like he's just always been -- enjoyed my events, so he let's me have parties.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Thank you,
Mr. Price. No further questions.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Mr. Woodson, do you attend the parties as well?

MR. WOODSON: Yes, I usually attend the parties. I mean I don't participate in a lot of them, but I do sit there in case something goes wrong, needs to be fixed that particular night or anything.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Do you have another home, or this is your only home?

MR. WOODSON: No, that's my only place there.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And you don't get any money from the proceeds to the party?

MR. WOODSON: No, those proceeds
belong to the people that are having the party. I don't have any idea what they're taking in on each of the parties. I think they charge like $\$ 10$ on up. This $\$ 50$ fee is something that they just started within the last couple of months.

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CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Are you involved in the planning of the parties?

MR. WOODSON: What?
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Are you involved in the planning of the parties?

MR. WOODSON: No.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: No? And, Mr. Price, what is your career? Are you a promoter, or are you a --

MR. PRICE: No, by day I'm an optician. I sell eyewear.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And where does your guest list come from for these parties?

MR. PRICE: Oh, from like Facebook and, you know, that sort of thing. I've collected, you know, names. And I've just known people for years. You know, I wouldn't say I'm not a socialite per se, but you know, I have lots of friends in the city. So I invite people and I have my friends invite people and that sort of thing.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So it's kind of a closed party? It's just people you know and people you invite bringing people they know?

MR. PRICE: Exactly. Generally that's the case. Sometimes we'll do like invitations and, you know, but we don't just mass -- you know, just invite -- tend not to invite random party. Now, you know, I will step back and say like this particular incident that we're here all about, I have to say honestly I don't even know who the person was that was hurt or what have you. I have no idea who this person is. You know, would like to know just to, you know, reach out to them and see what their status is. This way I have no idea if, you know, they're hurt. But also I did reach out to my friends and nobody seemed to know who the person was either.

So I have a feeling it was just -we did have a birthday party that night.

There was a person that had some -- invited
people that had a birthday, do I think that maybe it was part of their group. But I have no idea. I really just truthfully don't know who that person was. And I realize that oddly, once again, I need to tighten up and make sure I know everybody who walks through the door of my events.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: This was a birthday party?

MR. PRICE: Well, it wasn't just a birthday party. I mean there was someone, you know, had requested -- they were having a birthday and wanted to bring some of their friends. So we were like, yes, sure. Fine. Invite them. Yes, that's fine, but you know, as long as sort of somebody knows who, you know, knows, we figured there would be no issue. And again I can't say. Like I don't know who the person was, so $I$ don't know if it had to do with the birthday party or not. I have no idea. But truthfully, you know, I don't know who this person was that was hurt.

And again, you know, I have to say it, there was no issue in the house. Again, I was there all night long. There was not a fight. There was not a tussle. We didn't have to have anybody removed. We didn't have to call security to deal with anybody. There was no issue. None.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Let me ask you one other thing: Mr. Ghenene said there were like 12 parties, or licensees at least for this place from 2009. How many were you involved with?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I think that he said there were six or seven. I mean --

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You did --
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: -- you all
should have a record. I mean I apply for licenses. And I had all those parties and I was, you know, at all those events. So obviously.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. I
wanted to just get an idea if this is all you, you know, on the licenses or if there are other people also getting licenses for this place.

MR. PRICE: Well, I mean the
licenses that are in my name are ones I applied for and, you know, I hosted those events.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.
MR. PRICE: I want to say there was six or seven since October or November.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So this is basically recent for you though, this year? You don't go back to 2009 having parties at this place, or do you?

MR. PRICE: I had a New Year's party might have been in 2009.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Thank you. Others?

MEMBER BROOKS: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes, Mr.
Brooks?
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MEMBER BROOKS: Yes, thank you, Madam Chair.

Mr. Woodson, now you say that you do live at 507 T Street, N.W.?

MR. WOODSON: That's correct.
MEMBER BROOKS: Do you have homestead exemption?

MR. WOODSON: Yes, I do.
MEMBER BROOKS: You do? Do you have a business license?

MR. WOODSON: No.
MEMBER BROOKS: But someone is conducting business there?

MR. WOODSON: But what?
MEMBER BROOKS: Someone is conducting business by collecting money, right, at the door?

MR. WOODSON: Yes, we have the license. We have the license. We don't do any business without the license.

MEMBER BROOKS: What license are you talking about?

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MR. WOODSON: The license that we apply for. We pay $\$ 300$ every time we get a license.

MEMBER BROOKS: But you don't have a business license through DCRA?

MR. WOODSON: No, we don't have anything like that.

MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. Thank you, Madam Chair.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Alberti?

MEMBER ALBERTI: Hi. Good morning, Mr. Price. So you said you were there all night and you were there until 3:00, is that correct?

MR. PRICE: At least.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So you would have been there when the incident -well first all, let me say, when you left what did you see?

MR. PRICE: I saw, you know, policemen in the street. There was, you know,
yellow tape. They taped it off around the front. And there was, you know, some couple -- I want to say maybe there was three or four officers in the street and they were just sort of I guess surveying, you know, what was going on outside.

MEMBER ALBERTI: So you were there when the incident occurred, is that correct?

MR. PRICE: I would --
MEMBER ALBERTI: Presumably, since if it happened at 12:50, you would have been there?

MR. PRICE: Absolutely.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.
MR. PRICE: I remember like because the party was over at 3:00, so I remember -- as people were leaving I do remember, you know, looking out. You know, somebody opened the door and I saw, you know, there were lots of police lights. So of course, you know, I had to ask and see, you know, what was going on, what happened. I
think, you know, a bit later somebody told me there was something that had happened outside. There was an issue outside.

But again, you know, of course my first thing was that, you know, ask everybody did I miss anything? Did something happen inside? And as I say, there was no issue in the house and we had no issue. There was no fighting. We didn't have to throw anybody out. There was none of that. And again, any events I ever had I've never had to deal with that. Never had that issue.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Mr. Price, I'm looking at a flyer.

Mr. Ghenene, where did you get the flyer?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I believe I got it from Facebook.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Oh, that was on Facebook?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I believe so.

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MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Does that have an exhibit number, for the record, or no? MR. PRICE: I believe it's 16. MEMBER ALBERTI: He says it's Exhibit 16, but I don't know. It's in the report and it's a flyer. I will be describing it.

It says in big letters in the middle March 30th, 10:30 p.m., 507 T Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. What happens in Pandora's Box and $\$ 50$ in big letters. So this was \$50, right? Even though on your application you said it was going to cost -would be tickets for $\$ 30$, you were charging $\$ 50$ ? When did you know that you'd be charging $\$ 50 ?$

MR. PRICE: Well, that would -the person that helped me with the party, Kim, that was her guests, so the intention is I'll piggyback with people and let like -- you know, she'll bring people or other people will
bring people. So I let them decide how they're going to, you know, invite their guests. And they'll get, you know, the difference plus say, you know --

MEMBER ALBERTI: Oh, okay. Well, I'm going to continue with this flyer in a moment, but let's step back, because you described Ms. Rice as your partner. What's that mean?

MR. PRICE: I didn't describe as partner, but I think that --

MEMBER ALBERTI: I think you did.
I think either -- to Mr. Ghenene you said she was your partner and I think said it -- well, anyway. So, all right. So she's not your partner? Is she your partner or is she not? How would you describe Ms. Rice then?

MR. PRICE: We're friends and, you know, and we've had a couple of, you know, parties together.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So you essentially let her piggyback on your license?

MR. PRICE: Yes.
MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Let's get back to the flyer. It's an interesting flyer. Did you post this flyer? Do you know anything about this flyer?

MR. PRICE: I did not post it, no.
MEMBER ALBERTI: And you know nothing about this flyer?

MR. PRICE: No.
MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Well, I find it pretty interesting. It says at the top, it says Grey Goose, Cherry something Noir. I'm not sure what that means. But it says Grey Goose, so I assume that's the vodka company. Looks like their logo, their kind of -- their lettering. Yes, Grey Goose, Cherry Noir it says. And then on the other side it says D'Usse, D, apostrophe, U-S-S-E. Can someone out there tell me -- is that an alcohol beverage company? Does anyone know? Does anyone know? Do you know, Mr. Price?

MR. PRICE: Don't know.

MEMBER ALBERTI: D'Usse. D, apostrophe, U-S-S-E.

MR. PRICE: D'Usse. That's another liquor.

MEMBER ALBERTI: It's another liquor, D'Usse?

MR. PRICE: Yes.
MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Well, that's big letters at the top. So it appears -- I mean one would assume based on common practice that when you have Grey Goose and D'Usse at the top that those companies are somehow sponsoring this event. Do you know anything about that, Mr. Price?

MR. PRICE: I don't, no.
MEMBER ALBERTI: You don't anything about that? Okay. And this is not your flyer?

MR. PRICE: It's not my flyer, no.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Someone piggybacked on your event for this, right?

MR. PRICE: Yes.

MEMBER ALBERTI: It says this is hosted by Pandora's Box. Do you know who --

MR. PRICE: The only person I'm -you know, again that was probably Kim's flyer and truthfully I only know Kim by her first name. I just know her as Kim. I don't know --

MEMBER ALBERTI: So you only know her by her first name and you let her sort of get really involved in this event, is that correct?

MR. PRICE: Well, I mean --
MEMBER ALBERTI: I mean she was pretty intimately involved, and she's telling Mr. Ghenene that she's in charge, she's there when he gets there.

MR. PRICE: Yes, these are just small parties. They're not, you know, huge events.

MEMBER ALBERTI: How many people were there that night, Mr. Price?

MR. PRICE: My guesstimation,
probably 80 to 100 people.
MEMBER ALBERTI: That's a small party? Okay. All right.

MR. PRICE: Well, I guess in my mind I see it as small.

MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. So 80 to 100 that night? Well, that's a lot more than you expected. You said 60 to 80 on your application, is that correct?

MR. PRICE: Yes. Yes, yes.
MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Okay. Mr. Woodson, this is your primary residence, is that correct?

MR. WOODSON: Yes, primary.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Mr. Woodson, do you drive?

MR. WOODSON: Yes.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Do you have a driver's license?

MR. WOODSON: Yes.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Do you have it with you?

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MR. WOODSON: Yes.
MEMBER ALBERTI: May I see it?
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Why are you
asking for it?
MEMBER ALBERTI: Isn't it obvious?
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: It's going to tell you his age. All right.

MEMBER ALBERTI: I don't care about his age. I could care about his age. I care about where he lives.

Okay. I just wanted to make sure that that's -- we had our address verified. Thank you. So it does say 507 T Street. Okay. Thank you.

So it's your contention that you that you did not benefit financially from the party that night?

MR. WOODSON: That's true.
MEMBER ALBERTI: And you haven't benefitted financially from other parties?

MR. WOODSON: The people, if they have -- sometimes if they want to just make a

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contribution to me, it's okay.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Contribution? What's that mean?

MR. WOODSON: You know, money to repair the places or whatever need to be fixed that are broken and make sure everything is in order when the party's over.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Do you know Ms. Rice?

MR. WOODSON: I've only met Ms. Rice within the last three months. I didn't know her previously.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So you met her in the last three months? And how do you know her?

MR. WOODSON: Huh?
MEMBER ALBERTI: How do you know her?

MR. WOODSON: I just met her when she came by with the group to have the party.

MEMBER ALBERTI: And when was the
first time came by with a group to have a party?

MR. WOODSON: Right.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Pardon?
MR. WOODSON: I just met her when she came in to have a party with the people that were supposed to be giving the party with Mr. Price.

MEMBER ALBERTI: And when was that?

MR. WOODSON: About three months ago.

MEMBER ALBERTI: So this was a different party that she was involved with?

MR. WOODSON: This is the second one.

MEMBER ALBERTI: This was the second party? So there was a previous party bout three months ago, is that correct?

MR. WOODSON: Yes. Right. That's correct.

MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Would you happen to remember the date of that party?

MR. WOODSON: Well, he has it --
MEMBER ALBERTI: So it was one of the licensed parties?

MR. WOODSON: Yes, it was a licensed party.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.
MR. WOODSON: We don't have a party unless we do a license.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Commissioner Morgan?

MR. MORGAN: Yes, sir?
MEMBER ALBERTI: You said that there had been complaints over the years --

MR. MORGAN: Yes.
MEMBER ALBERTI: -- about this residence that you know of.

MR. MORGAN: That I know of, going back about five years.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Do you know the nature of those complaints?

MR. MORGAN: Most of them were around public safety, noise, parking. Mostly around noise.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Around noise?
MR. MORGAN: Yes. One complaint was a series of individuals in front of the place very late at night, like around 3:00, 4:00 in the morning. This was probably a year ago.

MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. About a year ago. Do you have any idea, any sense of how often the residents have complaints in terms of like how many nights that is, or how often this happened?

MR. MORGAN: I can say within the past year every time that there's been an event at this establishment there has been a complaint, a follow-up complaint. The normal -- I don't want to say protocol, but normally when someone is hosting an event where they will take a one-day application for a liquor license permit, they will address the community. They will talk to their neighbors to let them know that this is going on. They
will come to the civic association and will talk to the ANC. That has never been done by any of the other promoters at this establishment. They've never reached out to the community. We've never known until after the fact. So we've never had a chance to weigh in on any of their applications.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Thank you, Commissioner Morgan.

Mr. Woodson, just out of curiosity, does anyone else live there with you?

MR. WOODSON: No.
MEMBER ALBERTI: So you're the only resident at that establishment?

MR. WOODSON: Oh, yes.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. And have you been present at all of the licensed events at your residence?

MR. WOODSON: Yes, I have.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. I have no
further questions right now. Thank you.
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CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So I have written in my notes from the earlier part of this hearing that there were 150 guests or patrons. Did you say that, Mr. Price?

MR. PRICE: I didn't say that.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Did you say that, Mr. Ghenene? Okay. Because we have a discrepancy. We're now hearing 80 to 100. So Mr. Price says 80 to 100 and Mr. Ghenene says 150.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Well, Mrs. Rice who was on the premises that evening said that there approximately were 150 patrons there that night.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Woodson, were you there when the assault occurred outside?

MR. WOODSON: Well, I don't know anything about the assault. The only thing I know is about the report that was made. I never saw anybody that was hurt or anything. We didn't have any problem inside with
anybody.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Did you know the police had come?

MR. WOODSON: Huh?
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Did you know when the police came?

MR. WOODSON: No. I don't even know when they came.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: When did you find out?

MR. WOODSON: Must have been about maybe 3:30 in the morning after everybody had just about gone. Every left out the house around 3:00. And somebody said that the police were out there. And that was about the size of it. I didn't --

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Who told you?
MR. WOODSON: -- check.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I'm sorry, who told you?

MR. WOODSON: I said I didn't go out to check.

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CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right, but who told you?

MR. WOODSON: But he has the proper license and everything to operate.

MR. PRICE: She's asking who told you.

MR. WOODSON: Huh?
MR. PRICE: Who told there was an incident?

MR. WOODSON: Just somebody that was there in the building said the police are outside.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: How would people know to make a contribution for the house? You made a reference that at the end of the night if people wanted to make a contribution they could.

MR. WOODSON: No, we don't make any -- we don't have any records for that.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: No, you don't have any records, but how would people know to make a contribution?

MR. WOODSON: They don't know. They just -- in case they want to, they can. If they want to, they just let us know. But we don't ask for --

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right, who would they give the money to?

MR. WOODSON: They would give it to me personally.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Do you know how many contributions you got at the last event?

MR. WOODSON: The last event I didn't get any contributions.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And how long have you lived in your home?

MR. WOODSON: I guess roughly about close to 50 years.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And have you ever talked to your neighbors or the ANC about any complaints?

MR. WOODSON: The lady that lives next door to her, I haven't spoken to her for

20 years. Because I used to speak to her everyday when she moved in there and she told me one day that her friends told her not to talk to me. And that's about 20-some years. So I haven't spoken to her since. New people just moved in on the corner and they've only been in there for maybe six months. And there's nobody living in the back. In the back there's a vacant house.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Silverstein, do you have any other questions?

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Mr. Ghenene, could you describe the scene outside when you got there?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: The entire 500 block of T Street was blocked off on both sides. There was a huge crime scene truck out front and crime scene officers. There was approximately five to six police cars. And like Mr. Price indicated, everything was taped off. The entire block was taped off. Spot
lights outside, too.
MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: So do you
find it likely that people inside the house would have known police arrived, or do you find it --

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: That would seem very reasonable, yes.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Is it really possible somebody would not know? Could it have been that loud inside the house that --

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I could say
that some of those rooms that were on the third floor like it would be possible for you not to know that the police were outside.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Are you sure that you saw every room on the second floor?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I'm not 100 percent. I'm I'd say 85 to 90 percent sure. Just the way that the house is designed and the fact that the lights are low, you could miss rooms. You could miss things. And it's not very well lit and there's a lot of art
hanging on the walls and throughout, so stuff could blend in really easy. A door could blend with a wall or a door could look like a mirror or something. You know, you just don't know, or $I$ just don't know.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Mr. Woodson
has just told us that he didn't know that the police arrived or the police had been there when this incident occurred. What are you thoughts on that?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Well, all I can say is that Mr. Woodson was outside and the police were outside.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: You think it's possible that maybe he had been a back room and didn't know immediately or that there was just a lot of loud music and --

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: It's possible.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Or that the party was so loud in this residential neighborhood that you couldn't tell that the
police were there?
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: It's
possible.
MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: No further questions.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Mr. Alberti?
MEMBER ALBERTI: Just quickly I want to follow up on Mr. Silverstein's line of questioning. Investigator Ghenene, was there blood on the street or sidewalk or anywhere?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: There was a lot of blood.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. A lot of blood? Tell me where you found blood, where you saw blood.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I saw blood on half of the block closest to 507 T Street. In fact right outside of the gate to 507 T Street's property there was a large pool of blood.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. And when you say right outside the gate, right directly

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in front of it? To the left, to the right of it?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: It was in the street in front of the sidewalk. And I think I took a picture of that, too.

MEMBER ALBERTI: It was in the street?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: In front of the sidewalk. So if there's the street --

MEMBER ALBERTI: Yes.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: -- the sidewalk, then the residence, it was in the street.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Directly in front of that gate?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Where else? Did you find blood any place else?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: All over in that area in the street.

MEMBER ALBERTI: All right.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: It was
trailed everywhere.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Trailed
everywhere? Was there any trail up to the house at all?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, sir, I didn't see that.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. All right. Okay. Thank you.

So, Mr. Price, so when you came out you would have seen -- obviously the police would have been I think probably right where the blood was, right?

MR. PRICE: I didn't --
MEMBER ALBERTI: I would assume. I mean --

MR. PRICE: I saw no blood.
MEMBER ALBERTI: -- there would be a victim there.

MR. PRICE: Right. Well, there
was -- like I said, when I left it was probably -- it was -- I'm going to guess I probably put in at least 30-40 minutes of
cleaning up before I left, and that would have been at 3:00 when the party was over. But when I got outside --

MEMBER ALBERTI: So 30-40 minutes, it would have been 3:30, 3:40?

MR. PRICE: Could have been. You know, certainly wasn't looking at my watch. As I said, when I, you know, have parties my one thing I have make sure that everything is, you know, as it was when we came in. You know, obviously I don't want to leave his house a mess.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.
MR. PRICE: But again, when I came outside there was -- maybe there was four or five police officers in the street, but you know, I personally did not see any blood. Certainly I would have, you know, looked in that direction. I mean I looked to see what was going on, but I didn't see anything --

MEMBER ALBERTI: There was no
ambulance?

MR. PRICE: I don't recall seeing an ambulance, no.

MEMBER ALBERTI: There wasn't any police cars?

MR. PRICE: There was a police car. There was lights. There was definitely police cars and there were policemen there.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Thank you.
Mr. Ghenene, you arrived at what, 3:45?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: And Mr. Woodson was outside?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Who was he talking to when you arrived, do you know, or was he talking to anyone?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I believe he was talking to Mrs. Rice. I believe.

MEMBER ALBERTI: And she was outside also?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: On the
porch, not in the street.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Oh, they were on the porch? Okay.

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Mr. Price, where did you buy the alcohol for this event?

MR. PRICE: I always get the alcohol from Schneider's Capitol Hill.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. How did you purchase it? Check? Cash? Credit card?

MR. PRICE: I always pay for alcohol with cash, but actually that night we did use, you know, mostly alcohol that was from a previous party. The last event wasn't -- we didn't have that -- you know, a huge sum of people. We had a lot of stuff left over.

MEMBER ALBERTI: So you paid for it with cash?

MR. PRICE: Yes.
MEMBER ALBERTI: You have the receipts?

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MR. PRICE: I can look for them. I haven't looked for them. I imagine --

MEMBER ALBERTI: So you don't know if you have them?

MR. PRICE: I don't know, no.
MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Mr.
Ghenene?
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, sir?
MEMBER ALBERTI: Ambiance, whatever they are, that company, that caterer, are they a licensed caterer?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I did not review that. Ambiance Group is Mrs. Rice's promotion group.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I believe that they do more party planning. And I think she does some kind of retail sales with that as well.

MEMBER ALBERTI: But you got your alcohol from Ms. Rice, what she had left over?

MR. PRICE: Well, yes. I always
buy just to make sure I have, you know, enough for folks. She bought some as well. I think actually she might have had some that was given to her. Yes, I don't know. I really don't know. But she did bring alcohol and I brought alcohol. But we had stuff that was there. You know, we were pretty much ready for that party.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So is it an open bar? Fifty dollars is an open bar?

MR. PRICE: Yes. Yes, people pay at the door and then they are -- it's open bar.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. I have no further questions. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Do you have questions?
(No audible response.)
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I just have a couple. Mr. Price, so the parties in general, do you aim for a certain number, like 60 to 80, or --

MR. PRICE: I mean in order for it to, you know, be worthwhile, yes, that's typical for the house. Probably about a good number that would be -- and, you know, feel like a party and not like empty. So, yes.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And is there a way that you control the numbers to be, you know, at that range?

MR. PRICE: No, I mean, you know, if it gets to the point that -- which I can't really -- ever have to say that. If we ever get to the point where there's so many people that we have to, you know, turn people away -I just don't have that type of crowd as of yet.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Do you do it by tickets or anything like that?

MR. PRICE: No.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: No?
MR. PRICE: No, people pay. No.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: No? They just pay when they come?

MR. PRICE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So there's no payment in advance, right?

MR. PRICE: I mean I've never done that, but I think that -- yes, Kim must have done that ahead of time. I always have people pay at that door because it's easy for me. It's too much trying to keep up with this, that and the other.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right. Who collects the money at the door?

MR. PRICE: That night actually it was -- I think it was Kim maybe.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. MR. PRICE: Sometimes it will be me, depending on the time of the event.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Mr. Ghenene, did you talk with any private security when you got to the house?

INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No, ma'am.
I spoke to Ms. Rice who indicated that she contracted through the Nation of Islam for
security guards, I believe, for that event.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Were they
gone by the time that you got there?
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I believe I saw one.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: But I was
kind of focused on speaking with Ms. Rice and Mr. Woodson.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: All right. Okay. Yes, Mr. Brooks?

MEMBER BROOKS: Yes, just one more question, Madam Chair.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.
MEMBER BROOKS: Mr. Price, are you planning on having additional events soon?

MR. PRICE: I mean I would say I'd like to, but you know, I certainly -- that's all depends on whether, you know, I can get a liquor license or not. I mean obviously I -but would like to? Yes, I would like to, of course. I would like to have more events,
certainly.
MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. But you don't have one planned for this coming week, do you?

MR. PRICE: No.
MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. Thank you.
Thank you, Madam Chair.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You're
welcome. Anybody else?
(No audible response.)
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Anything else anyone wants to put on the record before we close this hearing?
(No audible response.)
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Then what I'm going to suggest is that we take this matter under advisement. We'll be looking at whether or not we'll issue anymore licenses to this address. And we will be expecting a resolution from ANC 1B?

MR. MORGAN: Right.
CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.


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
