The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met in the Alcoholic Beverage Control Hearing Room, Reeves Building, 2000 14th Street, N.W., Suite 400S, Washington, D.C. 20009, Chairperson Ruthanne Miller,

presiding.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. We
4 have another Fact-Finding Hearing on this
5 morning's calendar. It's a temporary license
6 application. The applicant is Nancy Miyahira
7 on behalf of Georgetown BID. The date of the
8 event is June 1, 2013. And the neighborhood
9 is 1000 Wisconsin Avenue, N.W., between M and
10 K Streets.

11 MS. MIYAHIRA: Good morning.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Good morning.
13 Would you introduce yourselves for the record
14 when you have had a chance --

15 MS. MIYAHIRA: Yes, good morning--

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: -- to sign-
17 in.

18 MS. MIYAHIRA: -- I'm Nancy
19 Miyahira with the Georgetown Business
20 Improvement District and we host the Taste of
21 Georgetown.

22 MR. CHERNER: And Michael Cherner.

1 I help with the beverage pavilion for the last
2 four years. Good morning.

3 MEMBER ALBERTI: Good morning.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Morning. I'm
5 sorry, did you say Michael what?

6 MR. CHERNER: Yes, Cherner.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Could you
8 spell your last name?

9 MR. CHERNER: Yes, C-H-E-R-N-E-R.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And
11 what is your position?

12 MR. CHERNER: I'm with the
13 restaurants in Georgetown. I help run the
14 beverage pavilion for the last four years.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, okay.

16 MR. CHERNER: So I'm on-hand to
17 help with that.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great. Okay.

19 MS. MIYAHIRA: We also have one
20 other --

21 MR. WIEBENSON: John Wiebenson,
22 the Georgetown BID operations.

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And can you
2 spell your last name?

3 MR. WIEBENSON: Yes, W-I-E-B-E-N-
4 S-O-N.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And
6 also would the Investigator identify himself?

7 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: I'm
8 Investigator Kofi Apraku. The last name is A-
9 P-R-A-K-U.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Great.
11 All right. This is the fifth year or the
12 fourth year?

13 MS. MIYAHIRA: Our 20th year.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: 20th year.
15 Okay. 20th year. Has it changed over the
16 years?

17 MS. MIYAHIRA: It actually was
18 started by Grace Episcopal Church.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

20 MS. MIYAHIRA: Actually, Robert
21 Egert was one of the founders. He is at the
22 church. And the BID got involved in 2004. So

1 it started on the lawn of Grace Church and
2 since then has moved into a larger event onto
3 Wisconsin Avenue.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And it's run
5 by the BID. Is that right?

6 MS. MIYAHIRA: Yes.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And
8 where is it based at?

9 MS. MIYAHIRA: It's on Wisconsin
10 Avenue. It's just south of Blues Alley down
11 to K Street.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Do you
13 want to give us an overview? That would be
14 great.

15 MS. MIYAHIRA: Sure.

16 MR. CHERNER: Sure.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thanks.

18 Okay.

19 MR. CHERNER: So over the past few
20 years we sort of changed the way the beverage
21 pavilion worked.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

1 MR. CHERNER: When I first came on
2 board, we switched from having like a
3 wristband where it was at the entrance to the
4 pavilion with tastings of everything that was
5 available and we switched it to individual
6 ticket sales.

7 One reason was to add more value
8 to the charitable contribution and also to
9 control the amount of consumption as well. So
10 we do it as an option of where you can either
11 buy individual tickets for \$4 per taste or
12 three tickets for \$10 and three tickets would
13 be an equivalent of one drink.

14 So it's three 4 ounce tastes of
15 beer or 3 ounce tastes of wine. So you are
16 only purchasing one drink at a time, but it
17 could be in multiple pieces.

18 We have moved it over the years.
19 Originally, it was on the Verizon parking lot,
20 which is now under construction for a new
21 condo development. And then we moved across
22 to the Eagle Bank lot. And as the event has

1 grown, we wanted to make it so that the main
2 part of the event was the food and the
3 charity, so we moved the beverage pavilion
4 down further on Wisconsin Avenue, down next to
5 the Ritz Carlton condo buildings. So down by
6 like where Georgetown Bank is, down there on
7 Wisconsin Avenue.

8 With that, we have added -- with
9 the new blow-up that we just handed up to you,
10 we are doing full fencing for the beverage
11 pavilion, so the alcohol is all in that
12 enclosed area. It is also down by where two
13 of the police cars are stationed to help close
14 traffic. And we also have a full-time police
15 officer at the front gate with our ID checkers
16 as well.

17 We have about 14 different
18 products that will be on-hand that day in the
19 seven booths that are there and then we also
20 have standing area for the guests and we do
21 wristbands for everyone and the cups from the
22 pavilion are just a little 4 ounce tasting

1 cup, so there is no larger bodies there, as
2 well.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So the Taste
4 of Georgetown is food, too.

5 MS. MIYAHIRA: Yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: But you are
7 just talking about the taste of the wine and
8 the beer right now for --

9 MR. CHERNER: Correct.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. But
11 there is tastes of all --

12 MS. MIYAHIRA: Yes. There is 27
13 restaurants.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And
15 the traffic is closed off --

16 MR. CHERNER: Um-hum.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: -- between --

18 MS. MIYAHIRA: Blues Alley and K
19 Street on Wisconsin Avenue.

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. For
21 what hours?

22 MS. MIYAHIRA: The road closure

1 starts at midnight, sort of Friday into
2 Saturday morning and then reopens on Saturday
3 evening by 8:00 p.m.

4 MR. CHERNER: So the license is
5 just from 11:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: 11:00 a.m. to
7 5:00 p.m. is when what is open?

8 MR. CHERNER: The beverage
9 pavilion.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: The beverage,
11 okay. How about the food?

12 MR. CHERNER: The food is 11:00 to
13 4:00. What we found is that over the last two
14 years, the first year we had that extra hour
15 and we closed down at 4:00, we were done
16 selling tickets, but to let them finish their
17 drink and throw away the trash.

18 Whereas last year, we had done it
19 only until 4:00 p.m. and the ABRA
20 Investigators were a little upset at 3:30 that
21 we hadn't started taking cups out of people's
22 hands. So we wanted it to last until the end

1 of the food event. So that's why we have that
2 extra hour for the beverage pavilion for
3 clean-up and to get the people that volunteer,
4 we want them to have a couple of tastes at the
5 very end once they are cleaning up, so that we
6 are not in violation of ending by the time of
7 the permit.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And do you
9 serve other beverages besides alcoholic
10 beverages?

11 MR. CHERNER: Yes, we have waters
12 and sodas and lemonades from Whole Foods this
13 year. And those are available for sale
14 outside of the beverage area, but we always
15 have water on-hand in case there is ever an
16 issue with people that are having too much to
17 drink and they can go back and forth with
18 their food as well.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So the non-
20 alcoholic beverages, they are sold outside of
21 the beverage area with the other food? Is
22 that it?

1 MR. CHERNER: Correct.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. All
3 right. Except for water? You also have that
4 in the -- your area?

5 MR. CHERNER: Yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And is
7 there entertainment?

8 MR. CHERNER: Um-hum.

9 MS. MIYAHIRA: Yes, we have got
10 three bands that will be playing on our main
11 music stage, on the lawn of Grace Church and
12 we have got face painting and balloon
13 sculptures for kids.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great. And
15 how are you doing ID checks? Are you doing ID
16 checks?

17 MR. CHERNER: We are.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes. Okay.

19 MR. CHERNER: It's 100 percent
20 wristband and you have to be over 21 to come
21 into the beverage pavilion with ID. And so
22 there is only one color wristband, because

1 everybody is over 21 that is allowed in that
2 area.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And
4 who is doing it?

5 MR. CHERNER: We hired two people
6 that are TIPS-certified that were both doing
7 ID checks when I was running the event in the
8 Old Georgetown, so it's two of our old TIPS-
9 certified with the ID check with the books.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Did Ri
11 Ra go somewhere else or they just closed?

12 MR. CHERNER: They closed. There
13 was actually a reroute going into that
14 building.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: A what?

16 MR. CHERNER: A reroute.

17 MS. MIYAHIRA: The Irish Pub.

18 MR. CHERNER: The Irish Pub.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, okay.

20 Okay. So and your security, I see you have --
21 I think I saw that you had 12 police officers.

22 MR. CHERNER: There are 18 hired

1 for the course of the road closure.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

3 MR. CHERNER: And 12 are during
4 the main part of the actual festival. Others
5 are before and after the festival for setup
6 and breakdown for the street closures.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. All
8 right. Other questions?

9 MEMBER ALBERTI: Yes, a few
10 questions.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes, um-hum.

12 MEMBER ALBERTI: Now, do you have
13 volunteers roaming inside of this, within that
14 area?

15 MR. CHERNER: Yes, we do have 16
16 volunteers, eight in two different shifts.
17 And we typically go through a training process
18 of how they fill the 4 ounce cups and then be
19 exchanged with the one cup for one ticket.

20 MEMBER ALBERTI: Oh, okay. But
21 you have people roaming, other than serving?

22 MR. CHERNER: Yes, we have people

1 cleaning up trash and keeping an eye on the
2 guests and things of that nature.

3 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So there
4 are, okay.

5 MR. CHERNER: Yes.

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: And the people
7 doing ID checking, how are they trained?

8 MR. CHERNER: They were TIPS-
9 certified. They are people from my own staff
10 when I was at Mien Yu.

11 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Great.
12 Thank you.

13 MR. CHERNER: Sure.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You said one
15 cup, one ticket? One ticket, one cup?

16 MR. CHERNER: Correct.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Are there
18 refills or how --

19 MR. CHERNER: Well, you can buy
20 multiple tickets, but it's a set of three is
21 the \$10 where there will be three tickets.
22 You get three tastes for the \$10, which is

1 equivalent to one drink.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, okay.

3 Three small amounts equal one drink,
4 basically? Is that it?

5 MR. CHERNER: Correct.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And
7 did you have any problems last year?

8 MR. CHERNER: We did not.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Have
10 you had any problems within the last few
11 years?

12 MR. CHERNER: There was one
13 problem, but I think it was like six years
14 ago. That was sort of when I came in to help
15 with the beverage pavilion.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. What
17 kind of problem was it?

18 MR. CHERNER: One of the
19 restaurant was serving drinks at their food
20 booth that wasn't part of the beverage
21 pavilion, so that's when we stopped when
22 people served beverages at the booths in

1 general.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

3 Alcoholic beverages?

4 MR. CHERNER: Correct.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

6 MR. CHERNER: People were serving
7 non-alcohol beverages and one was serving like
8 a punch that had alcohol in it. So now it is
9 only food tasting outside and then all the
10 beverages are inside the pavilion.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Great.
12 All right. And do you have any questions?

13 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: I have maybe
14 one or two.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

16 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Once the --
17 you are aware that at 5:00 that ends sales,
18 service and consumption, correct?

19 MR. CHERNER: Correct.

20 MS. MIYAHIRA: Correct.

21 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Okay. And
22 who is going to be in charge of making sure

1 that no alcohol is being consumed after 5:00?

2 MR. CHERNER: I'll be on-hand for
3 the entire time.

4 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: You'll be
5 on-hand?

6 MR. CHERNER: Um-hum.

7 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Okay. And
8 do you have a picture or a sample of the
9 wristbands that you guys are going to be
10 using?

11 MS. MIYAHIRA: We can get you one.

12 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: You can get
13 us one?

14 MS. MIYAHIRA: I don't have them
15 right now. Yes.

16 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Okay. And
17 like what's the, I guess, nature of the
18 wristband? Is it like a paper one or is it
19 plastic?

20 MS. MIYAHIRA: I believe it is
21 plastic ones that we have done. What did we
22 do last year?

1 MR. CHERNER: I know that some
2 years it was the paper, like the sticky.

3 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Yes.

4 MR. CHERNER: And that sometimes
5 we have gotten the plastic. I'm not sure what
6 is ordered. I know they have already ordered
7 it.

8 MS. MIYAHIRA: We have ordered it.

9 MR. CHERNER: And we can get you
10 that sample.

11 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Okay.

12 MR. CHERNER: But they are not
13 removable or transferrable.

14 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Okay. I
15 guess the reason why I was asking is because
16 sometimes once they put the paper ones on,
17 sometimes people can wriggle them off --

18 MS. MIYAHIRA: Okay.

19 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: -- and then
20 give it to somebody else to wriggle onto their
21 arms.

22 MS. MIYAHIRA: I see.

1 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: So I just
2 want to make sure that in addition to, you
3 know, what kind of wristband it is, also you
4 kind of -- you guys make sure that security
5 know to make sure they are tight, so that they
6 can't just wriggle them off.

7 MS. MIYAHIRA: Okay.

8 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: They have to
9 break them. And when you were talking about
10 the -- where the -- the Kraft Beer Pavilion,
11 that's the only place where alcohol is being
12 served, correct?

13 MS. MIYAHIRA: Correct.

14 MR. CHERNER: Correct.

15 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Okay. So
16 there is no alcohol next to the Eagle Bank
17 lot?

18 MS. MIYAHIRA: Correct.

19 MR. CHERNER: Not now.

20 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: That has
21 changed, right?

22 MS. MIYAHIRA: It has changed,

1 yes.

2 MR. CHERNER: Yes.

3 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Okay. Okay.

4 MS. MIYAHIRA: There will be
5 restaurants this year.

6 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Okay. I was
7 confused for a minute. Okay. And then how
8 many security staff do you guys have?

9 MR. CHERNER: We have the -- I
10 mean, we have the two people from -- that
11 normally do security. They are going to be at
12 the front gate with --

13 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Okay.

14 MR. CHERNER: -- a police officer
15 where they do the ID check.

16 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Okay.

17 MR. CHERNER: And then we also
18 have the 12 roaming police at the event.

19 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Okay.

20 That's it for me.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Great.

22 INVESTIGATOR APRAKU: Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I just wanted
2 to ask, I'm looking at your diagram and you
3 have tall tables for guests. Can people bring
4 food into your -- the beverage area?

5 MR. CHERNER: Um-hum

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So
7 they can bring. You just can't bring the
8 beverages to the food. You can bring the food
9 to the beverages.

10 MR. CHERNER: Correct.

11 MS. MIYAHIRA: Right. You can't
12 do that.

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Good.

14 MR. CHERNER: Right.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: All right.
16 Any other questions? Okay. It sounds like
17 you know what you are doing, so that's good.
18 Okay.

19 Then I'm going to move to approve
20 this temporary license application.

21 Do I have a second?

22 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Second.
