The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met in the Alcoholic Beverage Control Hearing Room, Reeves Building, 2000 14th Street, N.W., Suite 400S, Washington, D.C. 20009, Chairperson Ruthanne Miller, presiding.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Our next case is at 4:00, so the Board will recess until then, unless that is Capital Pride here. I don't think so.

MEMBER ALBERTI: I don't think so.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I don't think so. She doesn't look like Capital Pride. Okay.

(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went off the record at 3:53 p.m. and resumed at 4:06 p.m.)

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

MR. CORBETT: How are you?

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Good afternoon.

MR. CORBETT: Good afternoon.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: This is a Fact-Finding case for Capital Pride Alliance event, which is scheduled for June 14, 2015.

So would you all identify yourselves for the record?

MR. CORBETT: Sure. Rob Corbett. I'm

1 Capital Pride Operations Director.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

3 MR. GILLETTE: My name is Matt
4 Gillette. I'm the Beverage Operations Manager
5 for Capital Pride.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Would you
7 say your name again?

8 MR. GILLETTE: Matt Gillette.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Matt Gillette,
10 okay. Okay. And this is going to take place
11 between 300 and 700 Blocks of Pennsylvania
12 Avenue?

13 MR. CORBETT: Yes, ma'am.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: All right. And
15 you anticipate 3,000 attendees? Is that right?
16 That's what I have on my notes. Is that right?

17 MR. CORBETT: Yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And I know
19 you have been doing this for many years, right?

20 MR. CORBETT: Yes, ma'am.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: How many years is
22 it?

1 MR. CORBETT: Actually, this is our
2 40th anniversary.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: 40th?

4 MR. CORBETT: 40th and this is, I
5 believe, our 11th -- no, actually, no, it's about
6 our 15th or 16th on Pennsylvania Avenue.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Wow.

8 MR. CORBETT: Yes.

9 MR. GILLETTE: This is my seventh one
10 with them.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And, Mr.
12 Corbett, you haven't been doing it 40 years
13 yourself, have you?

14 MR. CORBETT: I have not, no.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: No.

16 MR. CORBETT: Since the Capital Pride
17 Alliance actually was formed in 2008.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So you
19 have been doing it since 2008. Okay. And have
20 you been coming to ABRA since 2008?

21 MR. CORBETT: Yes, ma'am.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Hi. Are

1 you joining us on this Capital Pride event?

2 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Yes, this was
3 assigned to me.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great. We have
5 just really got started. Why don't you introduce
6 yourself for the record?

7 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Supervisory
8 Investigator Keith Gethers from the Enforcement
9 Division.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So we were
11 just saying that this -- they have been doing
12 this for 40 years, this event. Mr. Corbett has
13 been involved with it since 2008. And Mr.
14 Gillette since 2000?

15 MR. GILLETTE: 2008.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: 2008 as well.

17 MR. GILLETTE: Seven years.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

19 MR. GILLETTE: Yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And have you been
21 coming to ABRA for seven years?

22 MR. GILLETTE: Yes.

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So have
2 you had any problems at the event related to
3 alcohol, particularly?

4 MR. GILLETTE: No, not any overlying
5 problems. I actually, cross my fingers, kind of
6 boast about that to our volunteers every year. I
7 really try to make sure they stay diligent and on
8 their -- on top of their game the entire day.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great. Okay.
10 How many volunteers do you use?

11 MR. GILLETTE: I use around 45
12 bartenders that are experienced bartenders that I
13 make sure that they have credentials for
14 bartending. I have three licensed ABC Managers
15 besides myself who will be managers that day. I
16 have a couple of bartenders who have their
17 license. And then I have six beverage -- six
18 garden managers that are under the ABC Managers
19 as well for other things. And then each garden
20 also has its own security manager to go along
21 with the 36 security guards that we have hired
22 for the day.

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So you have six
2 separate gardens with this?

3 MR. GILLETTE: We have four. We have
4 two that are connected to each other.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

6 MR. GILLETTE: But I'm considering it
7 four gardens. I have staffed it that way.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right. Okay.

9 MR. GILLETTE: I can -- just for
10 operational reasons, I say four.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And has
12 anything changed from this year? From last year
13 to this year?

14 MR. GILLETTE: There are some
15 significant changes.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

17 MR. GILLETTE: This year the Capital
18 Garden, which is the one closest to the Capital
19 on 3rd and Penn, has changed sides to the museum
20 side.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

22 MR. GILLETTE: It used to be on

1 Constitution Avenue. But this year it changed
2 sides so that we could add a VIP area onto 3rd
3 Street, because this year we were able to acquire
4 3rd Street, so that we have a little bit more
5 space, room to work with. And those two gardens
6 are connected. And then there is a copy -- on
7 the other side are the two other gardens.

8 MEMBER SHORT: Thank you.

9 MR. GILLETTE: So that's the biggest
10 change on that side is just we really just
11 switched sides, so that we could have a little
12 bit more space for the VIP area. That's really
13 the biggest difference. We expect the same
14 volume out of that side.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Do you have a
16 pretty much consistent volume over the years?

17 MR. GILLETTE: As far as I know, yes.
18 When it gets to the middle of the day and it's
19 just kind of like controlled chaos sometimes.

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: The only --

21 MR. GILLETTE: As well as marchers.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: What kind of

1 alcohol are you serving? Just beer or something
2 else?

3 MR. GILLETTE: Beer, wine and liquor.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Beer, wine and
5 liquor. Okay. And is your security the same as
6 last year?

7 MR. GILLETTE: It is. Last year we
8 had 16 hired security guards and this year we
9 have 36.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Last year you had
11 16?

12 MR. GILLETTE: We had 16 paid.

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So it has
14 doubled? I mean, it's more than double.

15 MR. GILLETTE: Yes.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You have 36.
17 Okay. And why did you do that?

18 MR. GILLETTE: Because we also added--
19 so we had these two areas which last year it was
20 not this large, so we added a VIP area.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, okay.

22 MR. GILLETTE: And then we also added

1 a food court --

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

3 MR. GILLETTE: -- on -- what is it?

4 MR. CORBETT: 6th and Constitution.

5 MR. GILLETTE: Yes, 6th and
6 Constitution where Constitution, Pennsylvania and
7 6th all come together.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

9 MR. GILLETTE: By the west wing of the
10 art gallery. This food court is technically all
11 ages, so we -- I pumped that area with extra
12 security guards and we have an augmentation of
13 volunteer military personnel that are going to be
14 walking through and volunteering for us that day
15 until that garden closes as well.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So you are not
17 just having any volunteers, you are having
18 volunteers that are actually military?

19 MR. GILLETTE: Yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: What's that mean
21 exactly?

22 MR. GILLETTE: To augment our paid

1 security.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes. But I mean,
3 where do they come from?

4 MR. GILLETTE: Actually, they are
5 coming from the U.S.S. Eisenhower, which is
6 pretty --

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, wow.

8 MR. GILLETTE: -- cool. They are
9 coming up from Norfolk. They were here for
10 Pentagon Pride a couple of days ago that was at
11 the Pentagon. They sent some pictures, really
12 amazing. But yes, these guys, it's probably
13 about 20 or 30 people coming up. They are going
14 to help with the parade and the festival. And
15 they have done great and just being a former
16 military myself, I know the discipline that they
17 bring with them and we are looking forward to
18 that.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So and what kind
20 of like training or instructions do they get for
21 this kind of security?

22 MR. GILLETTE: I will give them the

1 same instructions the day of that I brief all of
2 the security on.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes, okay.

4 MR. GILLETTE: The head of security
5 I have been working with since about 2009 and now
6 he owns his own security company.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: What company is
8 that?

9 MR. GILLETTE: Metropolitan Security.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

11 MR. GILLETTE: He is the same one that
12 we used last year as well, so he is my head guy
13 and I have been talking with him about this event
14 for at least two months now.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

16 MR. GILLETTE: And I give everyone a
17 briefing the morning of, so that I only have to
18 say it once.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right. Okay.
20 And how do you control for sale to minors?

21 MR. GILLETTE: Sale to minors?

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

1 MR. GILLETTE: So in this area, we
2 have two ID checks. So that will be the -- the
3 people who want to purchase alcohol have to go to
4 the ID check. They are going to get a wristband
5 on their left wrist.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

7 MR. GILLETTE: If someone doesn't have
8 a wristband on their left wrist, that means they
9 have not had their ID checked or they are under
10 21 and they cannot be served. If I do find
11 someone who is under 21 who is drinking,
12 hopefully that does not happen, then they will
13 get Xs on their hands and they will be escorted
14 out. And they will be told if they try to get
15 into a garden with the Xs on their hands, I want
16 MPD to escort them off of the festival premises.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes, okay.

18 MEMBER SHORT: What happens the first
19 time they do it?

20 MR. GILLETTE: Off of the festival
21 premises?

22 MEMBER SHORT: Yes.

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Wait is -- excuse
2 me, but I think maybe the first time they can't
3 get into where you are serving, but they can
4 still do other parts of the festival? Is that --

5 MR. CORBETT: Right. They can -- that
6 would leave them open to other parts of the
7 festival.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: -- what you mean?
9 Where there is not drinking?

10 MR. GILLETTE: Because every space is
11 controlled. Every space has controlled entry
12 with security guards at the entrance and the exit
13 at all times.

14 MEMBER SHORT: I think if they are a
15 problem once, they will probably be a problem
16 again. I sit upstairs with the guy with the --
17 at the Planet Jordan, we asked those same kind of
18 questions, if I can remember.

19 So the bottom line is we don't want
20 troublemakers in there where you have alcohol.
21 And if they can't get a drink themselves,
22 somebody else will pass along a drink.

1 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

2 MEMBER SHORT: So that's why --

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: That's a good
4 point, yes. Okay. What do you think?

5 MR. CORBETT: You know, we can
6 definitely talk to MPD about maybe, you know,
7 issuing a summons right there, but, yes,
8 certainly --

9 MEMBER SHORT: If you ask MPD to --
10 that they are to leave, they will escort them
11 out.

12 MR. CORBETT: Right.

13 MEMBER SHORT: They honor the rules.
14 Once you say -- identify this person that is
15 being in the tent trying to get a drink or
16 drinking underage, because that can cost you the
17 event years down the line.

18 MR. CORBETT: Right.

19 MEMBER SHORT: You know that's a
20 problem.

21 MR. CORBETT: Right.

22 MEMBER SHORT: Just get rid of them.

1 MR. GILLETTE: I have no qualms about
2 that.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes, okay.

4 MR. GILLETTE: That's fine.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

6 MR. GILLETTE: I am too busy for you
7 right now.

8 MEMBER SHORT: Trying to save you some
9 grief.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

11 MR. GILLETTE: Appreciate it.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. All right.
13 Do others have questions?

14 MEMBER SHORT: I have, Madam Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes, okay. Mr.
16 Short?

17 MEMBER SHORT: Are you going to have
18 the uniformed military people? Are they going to
19 be in uniform or are they going to be in civilian
20 clothes?

21 MR. CORBETT: They actually will be in
22 our volunteer shirts that all of our volunteers

1 are wearing. The security is going to be in --

2 MR. GILLETTE: The security has their
3 own shirts that are like highlighter yellow.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes. Okay.

5 MEMBER SHORT: So what are the
6 military guys going to be doing?

7 MR. CORBETT: They are really going to
8 be augmenting the paid security, so like, you
9 know, we have already basically more than doubled
10 our numbers, but again it's because --

11 MEMBER SHORT: Well, I would think all
12 security people should be marked. Someone might
13 be sipping something and they see a security
14 person -- you have problems if you don't see a
15 person with a shirt on, they think.

16 MR. CORBETT: Right. I mean --

17 MEMBER SHORT: So it has got to be a
18 differentiation.

19 MR. CORBETT: Okay. Right.

20 MEMBER SHORT: There should be
21 security on every security person. There should
22 be somewhere security on the front or the back or

1 both.

2 MR. CORBETT: Right.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: How did you
4 describe what the security was going to wear?
5 They are doing to wear certain T-shirts?

6 MR. GILLETTE: Yes. They are wearing
7 this like a bright highlighter yellow T-shirts
8 that say security on the back.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: There you go.
10 Okay.

11 MEMBER SHORT: And I was asking about
12 the military though.

13 MR. GILLETTE: Because they usually
14 wear black and I told him specifically that I
15 don't want them in black T-shirts.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

17 MR. GILLETTE: Because it's usually
18 really hot that day.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes, okay.

20 MEMBER ALBERTI: It's kind of.

21 MR. GILLETTE: I don't want anyone
22 passing out, but especially the -- my paid

1 security that protect my things. I don't want
2 them passing out at all.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Well, the T-
4 shirts are going to be bright yellow or
5 something? Whatever bright something? What's
6 the lettering going to be, black though?

7 MR. GILLETTE: It's just going to be--
8 it should be, I think, white across the back.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: White. Okay.

10 MR. GILLETTE: Yes.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. All right.

12 Others?

13 MEMBER SHORT: TIPS training, will all
14 the servers have TIPS training?

15 MR. GILLETTE: To my knowledge, most
16 of them do, that's why I hire everyone out of
17 restaurants and bars that are --

18 MEMBER SHORT: Most of them do?

19 MR. GILLETTE: I --

20 MEMBER SHORT: That's not a good
21 answer. What about the ones that don't have TIPS
22 training?

1 MR. GILLETTE: What do you mean?

2 MEMBER SHORT: I think that everybody
3 serving alcohol should have TIPS training. I
4 think that's the law.

5 MR. GILLETTE: Well, I'm --

6 MEMBER SHORT: Is that the law?

7 MR. CORBETT: No.

8 MEMBER ALBERTI: No.

9 MR. GILLETTE: You have to have TIPS
10 training to get your manager's license.

11 MEMBER ALBERTI: Right. Well, I think
12 the question is so --

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I see. All the
14 managers there will be --

15 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- will there be a
16 manager at every station where alcohol is being
17 served?

18 MR. GILLETTE: Oh, yes. And I have
19 bartenders who have manager's licenses as well to
20 augment the actual ABC Managers that are
21 controlling the garden.

22 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Very good.

1 MR. GILLETTE: And then I have mine as
2 well and I'm technically supposed to be at all
3 four places at one time.

4 MEMBER SHORT: The more the merrier.

5 MR. GILLETTE: Oh, yes. I mean,
6 that's what I try to do. I do have probably
7 eight bartenders coming up from Richmond that
8 work with one of my friends who actually bartends
9 here as well, who is also bartending the event.
10 So I'm trying to pull people from around the
11 region.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

13 MEMBER SHORT: How many bars?

14 MR. GILLETTE: We have four bars
15 total.

16 MEMBER ALBERTI: I mean, just I think
17 it's important that you make sure that every
18 staff of bartenders, every staff of service is
19 sort of overseen by an ABC -- someone who has an
20 ABC Manager's License.

21 MR. GILLETTE: Oh, yes, everyone is
22 being overseen by an ABC Manager.

1 MEMBER ALBERTI: So that's where the
2 responsibility is.

3 MR. GILLETTE: Yes.

4 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. I think that's
5 what we are really looking for here.

6 MR. GILLETTE: Yes.

7 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Other Board
9 questions? Okay. Mr. Gethers, do you have some
10 questions, comments?

11 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Yes, ma'am.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

13 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Can you
14 describe your containment system for the areas
15 where the alcohol is going to be served to ensure
16 that drinks cannot be passed beyond that area?

17 MR. GILLETTE: Yes. So if you flip to
18 the Capital Garden, so it's the first page.

19 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Yes.

20 MR. GILLETTE: All of the red is 8
21 foot fencing.

22 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Okay.

1 MR. GILLETTE: And then the yellow is
2 a, and we did this last year as well, double bike
3 rack and we make sure that it is wide enough,
4 because there is also the stage cable that runs
5 right there.

6 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Yes.

7 MR. GILLETTE: We make sure that it is
8 wide enough that you can't touch anyone.

9 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Okay.

10 MR. GILLETTE: And that's one of my
11 security checks in the morning. I think I pull
12 those apart myself last year, just so that I made
13 sure it was done.

14 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Okay. So I
15 take it you will be doing the same thing?

16 MR. GILLETTE: Oh, yes. And I'm doing
17 a security walk through of each garden after it
18 is setup before I allow it to open.

19 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Okay. And what
20 kinds of methods of communication will you have?

21 MR. GILLETTE: We have radios that we
22 communicate with each other.

1 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: How many radios
2 will you have total?

3 MR. GILLETTE: 50.

4 MR. CORBETT: Yes.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Wow, okay.

6 MR. GILLETTE: So on those radio
7 channels we have the heads of beverage, so the
8 ABC Managers, myself, security, health and
9 safety, everything, everyone is connected on
10 those radios throughout the entire festival all
11 day.

12 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Any
13 alternatives to the radios?

14 MR. GILLETTE: Everyone must keep
15 their cell phone on themselves at all times. And
16 we have also suggested that everyone get those
17 external battery packs, so their cell phones do
18 not die, so that we always have a mode of
19 communication.

20 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: And you will be
21 available by cell phone?

22 MR. GILLETTE: Oh, yes.

1 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Okay. All
2 right.

3 MR. GILLETTE: Last year I had that
4 batter pack in my pocket and my cell phone in one
5 pocket and a really long cord going all the way
6 around plus all my others ones and my phone
7 stayed at 100 percent the entire time.

8 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Okay. Given
9 the time frame for it and also that there will be
10 alcohol, can you tell us about your safety plan?

11 MR. GILLETTE: Sure. So actually I
12 did bring a copy and I'll be happy to give it to
13 you or email it to you. But yes, essentially we
14 do contract with Metropolitan Police Department,
15 which will have, I believe, about 40 officers at
16 the festival.

17 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Yes.

18 MR. GILLETTE: We also contracted with
19 D.C. Fire, which will provide an on-site
20 commander. And then we contracted with AMR, a
21 medical resource provider, that will basically
22 set up two kind of MASH Units. One is going to

1 be -- actually, each one of them is pretty close
2 to a beverage garden, kind of spread throughout
3 the site.

4 And then we will also have roving EMTs
5 that will be on golf carts that can go out to
6 serve people.

7 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Okay. And your
8 anticipated attendance?

9 MR. CORBETT: For the entire festival?

10 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Yes, sir.

11 MR. CORBETT: Probably about 75.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

13 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: That's it.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Mr.
15 Silverstein, do you have any particular
16 questions?

17 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: No, I don't.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So you
19 have 3,000 written under your -- on your
20 application. So before we vote on it, I would
21 probably ask you to change that to 7,500. Is
22 that what I heard you say?

1 MR. GILLETTE: Well, we were talking
2 about the entire festival throughout the day is
3 probably closer to about 75,000. We factored in
4 with the beverage garden being probably
5 significantly lower than that.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh.

7 MR. GILLETTE: So that 75 is really
8 throughout the day, which a lot of people are
9 going to come early on. They are going to take
10 off and we really see a big crowd turnover right
11 around usually 3:00 or so.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So this is the
13 number -- the 3,000 is the number you expect in
14 the gardens?

15 MR. GILLETTE: Correct.

16 MR. CORBETT: The estimate, yes.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, okay.

18 MEMBER ALBERTI: Is that the entire
19 day or at one time? How many people would you
20 expect at one time in the garden?

21 MR. GILLETTE: I would say probably at
22 one time between all four around 3,000.

1 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So throughout
2 the day there may be more?

3 MR. GILLETTE: There could be more,
4 but I wouldn't anticipate any more at any given
5 one time --

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: All right.

7 MR. GILLETTE: -- than that.

8 MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. So we
9 should probably just annotate your application to
10 say at one time.

11 MR. GILLETTE: Yes.

12 MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. At one
13 time in --

14 MR. GILLETTE: I like to always -- I
15 like to try to estimate higher than --

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: That's --

17 MR. GILLETTE: -- lower.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

19 MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Very
20 good.

21 MEMBER SHORT: Madam Chair?

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes?

1 MEMBER SHORT: I would just like to
2 ask.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

4 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Let's say you
5 have a crowd just a little larger than you might
6 have had, how do you make sure you don't
7 overcrowd anyone in those areas? Do you have a
8 mechanism in place to cut it off if it gets
9 overcrowded?

10 MR. GILLETTE: Oh, yes. That's what
11 my ABC Manager plus the guard manager are for.
12 They are supposed to be -- with security, they
13 are supposed to come together and look for things
14 like overcrowding, like is this really getting
15 full and they are then supposed to communicate
16 that to me, so that I can go to that place and
17 make that -- handle it.

18 MEMBER SHORT: So that's part of the
19 plan?

20 MR. GILLETTE: Right. To make sure
21 that that -- make an analytical decision to say
22 hey, it's now one-in/one-out. We can't go any

1 further.

2 MEMBER SHORT: Good. Thank you.

3 MR. GILLETTE: You're welcome.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Others? Will you
5 be providing free water or anything like that?

6 MR. GILLETTE: We do have -- I mean,
7 we do have water for purchase that day.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

9 MR. GILLETTE: But I always say if
10 someone needs it, give it to them.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

12 MR. GILLETTE: Because this water is
13 donated to us.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

15 MR. GILLETTE: It's all free to us.
16 So if anything needs to go out -- and I tell that
17 to -- I told this to all the volunteers on
18 Saturday. If someone looks like they need
19 water --

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

21 MR. GILLETTE: -- just go get them a
22 bottle of water.

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you. Okay.

2 MR. GILLETTE: Including yourself. In
3 addition to that, we actually do permit the fire
4 hydrants through D.C. Water, so those will also
5 be a drinking source. What they do is D.C. Water
6 basically puts like a garden hose on it.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

8 MR. GILLETTE: And then we kind of
9 have a contraption that will allow you to kind of
10 come up and fill up a water bottle or whatever.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, okay.

12 MR. GILLETTE: So it's something else
13 that has helped a lot and our Sustainability
14 Committee is one that kind of came up with that,
15 because they can't stand those bottles of water.
16 So they wanted another source.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh.

18 MR. GILLETTE: But it's a big help.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: How many fire
20 hydrants are there?

21 MR. GILLETTE: Four.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Four, okay.

1 Great. Yes, Mr. Silverstein?

2 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: The temperature
3 for Sunday is expected to be?

4 MR. GILLETTE: 85.

5 MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Nice.

6 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: That's not awful.

7 MR. GILLETTE: It's supposed to be 94
8 on Saturday during the parade.

9 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Yes.

10 MR. GILLETTE: But Sunday is 85 with
11 a 56 percent chance of thunderstorms.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

13 MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: I have a question.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes, Mr.

15 Rodriguez?

16 MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Yes, sir. Where is
17 your first aid station there?

18 MR. CORBETT: The first aid, actually,
19 they are on the second map the one that is closer
20 to the Monument Beverage Garden.

21 MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Yes.

22 MR. CORBETT: Right at 6th and

1 Pennsylvania you will see there it is marked EMT.
2 That is -- basically, it's our eastern or excuse
3 me, our western most station. The other one is
4 not on your map, but generally if you were, using
5 that same page, to go down where those tents turn
6 blue --

7 MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Right.

8 MR. CORBETT: -- that is going to
9 become 4th Street. And so right up 4th Street,
10 that's where the other medical station is.

11 MR. GILLETTE: And that is also where
12 the command center is.

13 MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: All right. Thank
14 you.

15 MR. CORBETT: They usually send out
16 their command buses.

17 MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: I hear you are
18 going to have a big crowd.

19 MR. CORBETT: 40 years and we are
20 expecting a lot of people from out of town.

21 MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Yes. It's very
22 popular.

1 MR. CORBETT: We have a lot of great
2 hotel partners that are ready to receive people
3 and we are excited.

4 MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Okay.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Any other
6 questions, comments?

7 So this just needs to be annotated, do
8 you think, Mr. Alberti --

9 MEMBER ALBERTI: Well, I --

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: -- how many
11 persons?

12 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- just think, yes.

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

14 MEMBER ALBERTI: I mean, just so our
15 staff knows that --

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: This is the 3,000
17 at one time.

18 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

19 MEMBER ALBERTI: In the beer garden.

20 MR. CORBETT: Okay.

21 MEMBER ALBERTI: In the beer garden.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you.

1 MEMBER ALBERTI: So I think that --

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Why don't you --

3 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- just so everybody

4 knows, our staff knows when they go up there --

5 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- what they are

7 looking at.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Yes?

9 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: I just have a
10 question. Just so in keeping with what you have
11 received over the years in terms of service from
12 us, is there anything that you would like to
13 comment about in terms of what went wrong or
14 right, so that we can move towards providing
15 quality service for you and maybe close some gaps
16 if there are any gaps between what happened last
17 year and what you would like to see happen this
18 year?

19 MR. CORBETT: Thank you for that
20 question. I will say we would definitely like to
21 kind of get the signage from you guys that we
22 kind of post in the beverage gardens. We also

1 purchase six of the books, the verified ID books,
2 so that's going to be stationed at every beverage
3 garden.

4 So I think those are kind of the
5 couple primaries. And then I'll let you speak to
6 anything.

7 MR. GILLETTE: One rule that I have
8 actually kind of been unclear about are foreign
9 IDs. I have always in the past not really let
10 anyone in who didn't have a passport, but I have
11 heard that that may not be the case that they
12 don't -- may not have to have a passport just as
13 long as it is government issued, but that's
14 something that I am unclear about.

15 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Okay.

16 MR. GILLETTE: Does anybody have any
17 insight on that? Because we actually had a lot
18 of people. We want to be more of an
19 international festival.

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

21 MEMBER SHORT: Right.

22 MR. GILLETTE: But people don't

1 necessarily want to carry around their passport
2 on a big day like this, because what if your
3 passport gets pickpocketed out of your pocket?

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right, that's
5 true.

6 MR. GILLETTE: Or you lose it. So we
7 had a lot of angry people last year that I had to
8 calm down and say I'm sorry, we can't let you in
9 without a passport.

10 MEMBER SHORT: Madam Chair?

11 MEMBER ALBERTI: Go ahead.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

13 MEMBER SHORT: On your website and I
14 know this when I travel out of the country, I
15 make a copy of my passport. Just make a copy of
16 it and leave my passport either in the safe or in
17 my room.

18 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

19 MEMBER SHORT: But I have a copy of my
20 passport when I walk around any place in these
21 foreign countries.

22 MEMBER ALBERTI: Ms. Miller?

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes?

2 MEMBER ALBERTI: I consulted --

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You consulted
4 with counsel?

5 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- with general
6 counsel.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

8 MEMBER ALBERTI: And she says that it
9 just needs to be a government issued ID.

10 MR. GILLETTE: Okay.

11 MEMBER ALBERTI: You don't need a
12 passport, just a government issued ID.

13 MR. GILLETTE: Okay.

14 MEMBER ALBERTI: Although I think we
15 would caution you that if the person looks
16 particularly young and it's a foreign ID --

17 MR. GILLETTE: Oh, yes.

18 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- you can't check if
19 it's valid, so, you know, do a little extra
20 checking asking about their birth date or
21 something else.

22 MR. GILLETTE: Okay.

1 MEMBER ALBERTI: You know the routine.

2 MR. GILLETTE: Yes. Because like --

3 MEMBER ALBERTI: So many people --

4 MR. GILLETTE: -- if they are like
5 coming from Canada and they have a Canadian ID or
6 something like that --

7 MEMBER ALBERTI: Just be extra careful
8 to say, you know, okay, what's your birthday?

9 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

10 MEMBER ALBERTI: You know, just do
11 that extra -- go that extra step to check.

12 MR. GILLETTE: Okay.

13 MEMBER ALBERTI: That's all I would
14 advise doing.

15 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: And I would
16 agree with that. I mean, just err on the side of
17 caution when it comes to making that decision.

18 MR. GILLETTE: Okay.

19 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: I mean because
20 you don't want to be on the wrong side of that
21 issue.

22 MR. GILLETTE: Oh, no, no, no.

1 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: And defer maybe
2 to some of your experienced managers because many
3 of them know how to get to that in terms of line
4 of questioning and that sort of thing if they
5 have an ID. There is a line of questioning that
6 you can use based on a document that you have in
7 front of you.

8 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

9 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: And for people
10 that typically are underage, they will get some
11 questions wrong.

12 MR. GILLETTE: Yes, that's why I also
13 hired the security guys that I hire because they
14 work primarily in bars and at private events such
15 as this, so they are clear as to exactly what
16 questions to ask.

17 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Right. But
18 certainly if you are not sure, just like I said
19 err on the side of caution. And the signage that
20 you mentioned, how many signs do you need?

21 MR. GILLETTE: We have one, two,
22 three, four five, we have got five entrances.

1 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Okay. We will
2 make sure you get those today.

3 MR. GILLETTE: Thank you.

4 MR. CORBETT: I would also just like
5 to ask if we can be approved at the nonprofit
6 rate?

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, right.

8 MR. CORBETT: Something that --

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

10 MR. CORBETT: It helps.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Everybody all
12 right with that?

13 MEMBER ALBERTI: You noted that on
14 your application, right?

15 MR. CORBETT: Yes, we did.

16 MEMBER ALBERTI: All right.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: All right.
18 Right. Okay. We are cool with that.

19 MEMBER ALBERTI: Yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Any other
21 questions? Good questions.

22 MR. GILLETTE: The other question that

1 I have is normally we don't let -- of course, we
2 don't let beverages out.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

4 MR. GILLETTE: But beverages in with
5 this food court is kind of a gray area to me.
6 The other ones I could care less if people bring
7 stuff in, but with the food court, we are trying
8 to get like moms and moms or moms and dads or
9 dads and dads to come in with their kids to want
10 to have lunch and also have a drink.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right. Okay.

12 MR. GILLETTE: I think that's really
13 primarily who I want in this garden. But can I
14 have -- do you have leeway with like letting them
15 bring in water and --

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Their drinks?

17 MR. GILLETTE: -- Gatorade and formula
18 and like stuff like that? Like that is kind of
19 where my mind goes. I don't want to bring in any
20 of the other ones.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: How are your
22 drinks being served? Are they in special

1 containers? We didn't even talk about that.

2 MR. GILLETTE: The liquor is, they are
3 Pride 10 ounce cups.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

5 MR. GILLETTE: And the beer is all
6 cans. And the wine will be in the sort plastic
7 wine glasses.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I think the main
9 point is that they be easily distinguishable
10 between -- you know, if it's a classic Gatorade,
11 I don't think that's an issue. Does anybody find
12 that --

13 MEMBER ALBERTI: Yes, just as long as
14 you can --

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

16 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- distinguish the
17 formula from the wine glass.

18 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

20 MEMBER ALBERTI: I'm being a little
21 facetious.

22 MR. GILLETTE: Yes.

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

2 MEMBER ALBERTI: But as long as you
3 can -- as long as you have a plan for
4 distinguishing --

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Clearly.

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- easily
7 distinguishing, you know, what kind of beverage
8 that person has in their hand --

9 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

10 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- there should be no
11 problem.

12 MR. GILLETTE: Okay.

13 MEMBER ALBERTI: So you know, just
14 make sure that none of the food court cups mimic
15 what you are serving your alcoholic beverages in.

16 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

17 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.

18 MR. GILLETTE: And if I have to tell
19 them to pour out a bottle of water, I'll give
20 them a free bottle of water.

21 MEMBER ALBERTI: Well, it won't be --
22 you know, a bottle of water you are not -- yes, I

1 mean, you can distinguish that, because it's a
2 bottle of water.

3 MR. GILLETTE: Well, I tell my staff
4 especially with the no beverages in, that you
5 don't know what is in that bottle.

6 MEMBER SHORT: That is correct.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

8 MR. GILLETTE: You have no clue what
9 is in that bottle.

10 MEMBER ALBERTI: Right. You don't.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Why not? If it's
12 a Gatorade bottle, you mean?

13 MEMBER SHORT: Well, you just take the
14 top off, you put the alcohol in it and you put
15 the top back on it.

16 (Simultaneous speaking.)

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You mix it with
18 what you have.

19 MR. GILLETTE: These are things I did
20 in college.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You mix it. Yes,
22 I'm very naive. Okay. So you mean like you mix

1 it.

2 MR. GILLETTE: So that's where my
3 concern lies with that, but I also am trying not
4 to push that demographic away from --

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

6 MR. GILLETTE: -- the food court.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I don't know. It
8 seems like a common sense kind of thing to me.
9 What do you think, Mr. Gethers?

10 MEMBER ALBERTI: I think, well, my
11 opinion is that there should be no prohibition
12 against them doing that, as long as they make
13 staff aware that they need to be -- as long as
14 you are not getting the food court stuff in the
15 same cups that you are serving beer in.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

17 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

18 MEMBER ALBERTI: And you make staff
19 aware of that, I'm comfortable with them allowing
20 beverages in.

21 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: And if that's
22 your position, I think your security should be

1 plugged into that, so that they are monitoring it
2 vigilantly throughout the course of the day.

3 MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Yes.

4 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Because if they
5 are vigilantly monitoring that, then your
6 participants will be aware that people are
7 watching them.

8 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

9 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: So that there
10 is no commingling between --

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

12 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: -- whatever is
13 in any of the containers, because the longer you
14 go on in a day, the more likely you are to have
15 somebody that has alcohol that may be sharing it
16 with someone else that is in nondescript
17 container.

18 MR. GILLETTE: Yes.

19 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: So and that's
20 what you don't want. So that's why you want your
21 security staff to be on heightened alert and
22 doing the same thing from beginning to end. So

1 you want to have a plan for rotating them and
2 making sure that they aren't -- that don't get
3 tired and they are doing the same thing from
4 beginning to end of the event.

5 MR. GILLETTE: Yes. I have them on a
6 schedule in the food court and they have -- the
7 rotate every single hour and they will be
8 positioned throughout, so that they can all see
9 each other, so they all have lines of sight
10 throughout and Heineken is providing us with
11 umbrellas, so I can put them wherever I want in
12 the shade.

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I mean, at just
14 this point, I don't think we should get too
15 paranoid on, but I mean, I know that especially
16 young people carry a lot of these reusable
17 containers like thermoses for water and so, you
18 know, are they going to let them come in with
19 that? Because they could pour a beer in it or
20 something like that.

21 But I think that you have just got to
22 balance here.

1 MR. GILLETTE: Right. Yes, like I
2 said, if I have -- I think if I have any
3 questions or security has any questions --

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

5 MR. GILLETTE: -- they can -- if they
6 say it's water --

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

8 MR. GILLETTE: -- just pour it out and
9 we will give you a free water.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right. Okay.
11 Good.

12 MR. GILLETTE: Right.

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

14 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: And I think
15 that's the benefit to having a professional
16 staff.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

18 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: I mean, it
19 sounds like everyone they have that is working on
20 the security side and on the service side seems
21 to have the right credentials. And, you know, I
22 think intuitively they know when to start taking

1 a second look at people and that's going to make
2 a difference particularly since they have this
3 rotation plan for security where they will have
4 fresh eyes --

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

6 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: -- throughout
7 the day. And then they have the communication
8 devices, so if something starts to go wrong, a
9 particular group comes in, then they can
10 communicate that to one another and just kind of
11 deal with that situation and keep the day going
12 on.

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And how many
14 Investigators are we going to have there? At
15 least two?

16 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: Generally, at
17 least two.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

19 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: But I'm not
20 sure exactly for this event.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

22 INVESTIGATOR GETHERS: I would have to

1 check with Chief Jackson to find out how many
2 have been detailed.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Anything
4 else? Okay. So where is the application? I
5 know that we have signed-off on it. Oh, okay.

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: Somebody back here
7 has it.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So we
9 actually have signed-off. And you know, if you
10 have any questions, you should contact Mr.
11 Gethers or Ms. Jenkins or, you know, if you have
12 any other questions like the passport issue or
13 whatever, we would be happy to help you with
14 that, our staff would.

15 MR. GILLETTE: Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

17 MR. CORBETT: Thank you all very much.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: All right. Have
19 a great event.

20 MR. GILLETTE: We will.

21 MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Good luck.

22 MR. GILLETTE: You should come.

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Maybe we will and
2 see what we bring.

3 MR. GILLETTE: Come on Sunday to the
4 festival.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

6 MR. GILLETTE: It's supposed to 95
7 degrees on Saturday.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. You will
9 need people. We can bring our thermoses, huh?

10 MR. GILLETTE: Thank you all.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

12 (Whereupon, the Fact-Finding Hearing
13 in the above-entitled matter was concluded at
14 4:40 p.m.)

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
