3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Our
4 next Fact-Finding Hearing is for a Pub Crawl,
5 Snow Day Bar Crawl.

6 MS. KIRK: If I could come up here
7 today.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Come on up.

9 MS. KIRK: It's always worthwhile
10 sitting through it. I'm Cheryl Kirk
11 representing Kevin Kirk, which got called to
12 New York. I'm like oh, I don't even want to
13 start this conversation.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: This is
15 today's story.

16 MS. KIRK: Also --

17 MEMBER ALBERTI: It wasn't so bad
18 earlier, the first time you were here, was it?

19 MS. KIRK: No, absolutely not. I
20 actually think this is my fourth time being
21 here.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Wow.

1 MS. KIRK: So I have been here
2 each and every time.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

4 MS. KIRK: But Mr. Kirk got called
5 to New York City. He is also a CEO for a
6 company called Imaginex, that is in the midst
7 of putting together a major stage performance
8 for the Hudson Project in New York City. So
9 he got called because they were having some
10 production problems.

11 So I was going to be here anyway
12 with him, so I'm here by myself.

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. You
14 can handle it.

15 MS. KIRK: So the pub crawl is
16 scheduled for July 26th. As we have done in
17 the past, Mr. Kirk submitted all the
18 paperwork. I believe we also checked in with
19 all of the participating bars to confirm that
20 there were no outstanding issues.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Wait.

22 MS. KIRK: That was one of the

1 requests we had.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I just want
3 Mr. Ghenene to introduce himself.

4 MS. KIRK: Sorry.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: That's okay.

6 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: No problem.

7 Thank you.

8 MS. KIRK: I apologize.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: That's okay.

10 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: ABRA

11 Investigator Abyie Ghenene.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: All right.

13 Thanks. Okay.

14 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: All right.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: I just want
16 the record to reflect he was here from the
17 start.

18 MS. KIRK: Absolutely.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

20 MS. KIRK: So essentially, we
21 submitted in everything, at least as we had
22 done in the past, so I guess the question is

1 are there any open questions based on the
2 information that has been provided?

3 We are looking at -- it is called
4 Christmas in July. We are looking for
5 probably about 500 to 1,000 participants,
6 nothing like what we have during the winter,
7 which is like the December event.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

9 MS. KIRK: Which is up to that
10 4,500 or so participants. So basically, it
11 should be on a lot smaller scale.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Is this the
13 fourth time you have had this same one in the
14 summer with the same establishments?

15 MS. KIRK: This is actually the
16 first one for Snow Day.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, okay.

18 MS. KIRK: During the summer.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: This is your
20 fourth pub crawl, it's just the --

21 MS. KIRK: The pub crawls, yes.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

1 MS. KIRK: So we had the Snow Day
2 during the summer right there around
3 Christmas. Then we have had the President's
4 Day. We had the Bunny Hop. And then now the
5 new one is the Christmas in July.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So are
7 they the same establishments?

8 MS. KIRK: Yes, they are.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Same
10 place for registration?

11 MS. KIRK: Yes.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Same --

13 MS. KIRK: Pretty much the same
14 model.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: -- ticket
16 price?

17 MS. KIRK: Same ticket price, yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Same
19 security?

20 MS. KIRK: Same security.

21 MEMBER ALBERTI: Can I ask if it's
22 the same management team?

1 MS. KIRK: Same management team.

2 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Just the same
4 model, just a different day, different part of
5 the year.

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So this one
8 you only expect 500 to 1,000?

9 MS. KIRK: Yes, only because it's
10 summer.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

12 MS. KIRK: You know, a lot of
13 people, obviously, have other things to do
14 besides hang in the city, so to speak, if they
15 off to go do beach time and those kinds of
16 things. So we don't expect it, but it's one
17 of those things to try out to give people
18 opportunities to get out a little bit.

19 The difference from this one from
20 the past is that it does have a difference in
21 the hours. Before we would start at 12:00.
22 We would close last ticket sale, so to speak,

1 for being able to band everybody and so forth
2 was 5:00.

3 We basically increased that to
4 8:00, so it's a 2:00 to 10:00 versus a 12:00
5 to 8:00.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

7 MS. KIRK: So just adjusted it
8 because of the summer time --

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

10 MS. KIRK: -- frame.

11 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Have you had
12 one like one every season or what?

13 MS. KIRK: It's the intent.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

15 MS. KIRK: That's the intent.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So you
17 haven't had summer yet.

18 MS. KIRK: I haven't had summer
19 yet.

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So any
21 problems in the past ones?

22 MS. KIRK: No. Actually, they

1 have been -- it has actually been wonderful.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

3 MS. KIRK: So I mean, obviously,
4 we are -- we plan for the worst, but hope for
5 the best. And fortunately for us, at this
6 point in time, everything has been quite
7 quiet.

8 I have actually been shocked and I
9 spent a lot of time in other cities --

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

11 MS. KIRK: -- with pub crawls.
12 And this area, I don't know what it is, but,
13 it's like congenial. If they have to stand in
14 line a little bit to have to check in, there
15 has just been no concerns. Nobody is irate.
16 Nobody is having issues. I have actually been
17 quite surprised at the cliental.

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So who is the
19 cliental? I mean, do you try to target a
20 certain audience?

21 MS. KIRK: The demographics? I
22 mean, obviously, I don't see people that are

1 my age coming through --

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

3 MS. KIRK: -- and going to the pub
4 crawl, unless they are actually with their
5 adult children. So technically -- actually,
6 the Bunny Hop was an interesting demographic
7 because you did see full families coming in
8 that were with grown children and they were
9 all dressed for Sunday best and/or doing bunny
10 things, so it was kind of fun to see that.

11 But basically, I want to say from
12 an age aspect, it's actually more about 24 or
13 25.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

15 MS. KIRK: We don't even have the
16 younger, you know, the college 21, 22.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

18 MS. KIRK: We are really more
19 about the 24, 25 and probably not a whole lot
20 older than about 32.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great, great,
22 great. Okay. Other questions by other Board

1 Members? I kind of remember your first time
2 here when we went over things and it looks
3 like you have really got it down, you know.

4 MS. KIRK: The model is working.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes. And,
6 you know, it has been in the news all about
7 bad pub crawls in Virginia, you know, and it's
8 like glad I'm here, you know. Good.

9 Mr. Ghenene, are they as good as
10 we think they are? Oh, I'm sorry, Mr.

11 Silverstein has a question.

12 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Yes.
13 Virginia's politics and their pub crawls both
14 leave an awful lot to be desired these days.
15 We do a much better job in Dupont than they do
16 in Clarendon. And we actually may do a better
17 job in the Wilson Building than they do in
18 Richmond.

19 MS. KIRK: And I imagine that's
20 probably the case.

21 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

1 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Thank you,
2 Madam Chair. I just have two questions.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

4 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: One, I see
5 that in addition to the wristband you guys are
6 handing out mugs.

7 MS. KIRK: Yes.

8 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: And I
9 wondered what the mugs looked like.

10 MS. KIRK: I don't have one with
11 me, but they are 12 ounce plastic mugs. So,
12 essentially, what they do -- what is great
13 about them is they actually change color.

14 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes.

15 MS. KIRK: So that way when they
16 have something physically in them, they will--
17 like if they are pink, they will go to blue.

18 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Okay.

19 MS. KIRK: So that way, if anybody
20 is leaving -- I actually laughed the last time
21 I was heading out of the city, I felt like
22 watching Halloween tricker treaters, because

1 you saw everybody moving from place to place
2 and I knew they had the mugs, because they had
3 them in their hands.

4 But basically, they will change
5 color back to their original pink after there
6 is no liquor there.

7 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Okay.

8 MS. KIRK: So that way from
9 perspective, the other thing is we requested
10 all of the bars, which they all have agreed to
11 do or pubs is they have a bucket that as
12 somebody walks out, they are to show that
13 there is nothing in them as they walk out.

14 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Okay. And
15 then the second question I had is you guys
16 have verified that each of these places you
17 said that each bar will have their food
18 specials to offer to patrons and it will be
19 displayed on entry? You guys have worked that
20 out?

21 MS. KIRK: Yes. So every one of
22 them are required to have menus available when

1 patrons come in.

2 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Okay. And
3 that's going to be visible? It's going to be
4 displayed, I think it said, right?

5 MS. KIRK: We can -- yes. I can
6 go back and confirm. Usually we have
7 placards.

8 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Sure.

9 MS. KIRK: We will have placards
10 up saying here is like some of the bar
11 specials, so those are usually right there at
12 the front, depending on which location you are
13 in and how they choose to display it, but it's
14 either wall at the hostess desk or right there
15 on the wall.

16 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Sure. I
17 think that, and I'm just speaking to the
18 Board, my concern --

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

20 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: -- with the
21 time changing --

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

1 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: -- is that
2 the end of this bar crawl kind of runs into
3 the time where a lot of people are going into
4 the city and going into nightclubs and bars.
5 And I guess my concern would be how -- and
6 again, this may not be your issue, but how
7 these individual establishments are going to
8 control their new customers versus the
9 customers who have been there for however many
10 hours and the possibility that someone has
11 been drinking since 2:00 p.m. and is now
12 inside of a nightclub until 3:00 a.m.

13 So I think that when the times get
14 shifted, I think it creates that kind of
15 scenario. That's the only comment I have.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Why don't --
17 can you respond to that? I mean, you know why
18 you switched and did you talk about that time
19 with the establishments?

20 MS. KIRK: Establishment, yes,
21 because the establishments were saying that on
22 Saturdays usually they don't have a lot of

1 patronage until about the afternoon. So thus,
2 in other words about mid -- 2:00. We were
3 finding that the bars were saying to us look,
4 there is really nobody coming in around noon,
5 that everybody is kind of waking up and moving
6 outside in the afternoons during the summer
7 around 2:00.

8 So that's when we started to --
9 and then we were cutting off where we don't
10 have anything taking place. There is nothing
11 sold. No bands, no nothing after 8:00. So we
12 are actually for all intents and purposes, we
13 have stopped anything that they can come in
14 to, you know, have anything to drink under the
15 pub crawl rules after 8:00.

16 And actually, I have actually shut
17 it off a little bit earlier, so --

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, they
19 can't go into -- it says 2:00 to 10:00, but
20 they can't enter after -- wait.

21 MS. KIRK: No. They can -- so a
22 couple of things. You have some of the

1 establishments actually decide. For instance
2 like the registration bars, they will decide
3 if -- depending on what is going on for them
4 and what they are seeing from the standpoint
5 of patronage, they will decide if it's all pub
6 crawl only allowed in their establishment from
7 a certain time to a certain time. That's
8 their decision, because that's about their --
9 what they are wanting to serve --

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

11 MS. KIRK: -- right at that point.
12 And/or so we have that and it will be
13 interesting to see summer. Like for December,
14 both registrations said we are not serving
15 anybody unless they have a band on their arm.
16 And that was their decision. So I think it's
17 based on the numbers.

18 From the standpoint that if they
19 have got say it's only 400 people coming, then
20 obviously, they are going to open their doors
21 up to other people that are not a part of the
22 pub crawl, so -- from that perspective. So

1 it's a decision based on particular bars, how
2 they would like to run that.

3 And what we found, we haven't
4 found issues where we have got -- if we have
5 over-drinking, obviously, the bartenders are
6 stopping it. They refuse to serve them. I
7 have watched that take place.

8 And as well, if I see, as part of
9 the security and my security team, people that
10 are absolutely not able to even take -- get a
11 band, I'll refuse them. I'll hand them their
12 money back and say no, sorry, you're not a
13 part of our pub crawl. It's just a part of
14 controlling what goes on. We just don't do
15 it.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: What did you
17 say about 8:00?

18 MS. KIRK: 8:00, we stop.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You stop
20 registration at 8:00?

21 MS. KIRK: We stop registration.
22 We do not accept -- and I have turned away.

1 You know, Mr. Kirk is like really? I said
2 absolutely. I said the rule is we are
3 stopping at this point. And the bottom line
4 is that if we have had people that have bought
5 tickets, have come in like, you know, four
6 Uber cars drive up and have got 40 people
7 sitting in front of me and it's 8:01 or in
8 this particular case, it was 5:01, I turned
9 them away.

10 I said you had all afternoon to
11 get here. You couldn't get here by 5:00? I'm
12 sorry you bought a ticket and you are not
13 going to be a part of the pub crawl. So I'm
14 very clear about, you know, obeying the time
15 frames.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

17 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: So does
18 that -- when you said 8:00 p.m., does that
19 mean that's when the drink specials end, too,
20 or that's just the last time you can register?

21 MS. KIRK: That's the last time
22 you can actually come in with your tickets.

1 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: So the
2 specials will run until 10:00 p.m.?

3 MS. KIRK: If the bar chooses to.

4 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Sure.

5 MS. KIRK: Sometimes the bars will
6 actually choose not to.

7 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes.

8 MS. KIRK: And so that's the
9 individual situation. So it's sort of those
10 things where we can go back and confirm, I'll
11 be happy to do that --

12 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes.

13 MS. KIRK: -- when they would like
14 to stop their specials. So if you prefer it
15 to be 8:00, we can make it 8:00.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. You're
17 just throwing it out as --

18 MS. KIRK: Yes.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: -- something
20 to consider.

21 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, I was
22 just -- you know, that M Street Corridor is

1 extremely busy and as the night progresses, it
2 gets very busy. And those crowds mixing
3 creates a lot of, you know, potential, I
4 guess, issues.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So first of
6 all, the bar specials, if they were to end at
7 9:00 or something, that really would be the
8 end of the pub crawl then, right? Because you
9 can't really say it's whatever 2:10 and then
10 people would say well, where is my -- you are
11 not honoring my --

12 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Right.
13 You're not honoring the specials that I signed
14 up to partake of.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Okay.
16 So but they could still stay in the bars or
17 whatever.

18 MS. KIRK: Sure.

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: But they can
20 leave before the next rush comes in maybe if
21 their specials aren't being offered any more.

22 So what is your view on whether it

1 went to 9:00 instead of 10:00 or something?

2 MS. KIRK: I am fine with that. I
3 can -- we can make the adjustment.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

5 MEMBER ALBERTI: Can I ask a
6 question?

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

8 MEMBER ALBERTI: Maybe I'm hearing
9 that inappropriately, but, Investigator, I
10 don't know if this helps, but the other option
11 I see is to just cut off sales earlier,
12 because people --

13 MS. KIRK: That, too.

14 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- are going to
15 have to get there earlier and meanwhile they
16 are going to want to get into these places
17 earlier. Would that help?

18 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes, I
19 think that, you know, just in my mind I think
20 that that absolutely would help.

21 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.

22 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: So that

1 those two crowds --

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Registration.

3 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: -- people
4 who haven't been partying all day versus the
5 people who have, and I'm thinking about M
6 Street, you know, three or four lanes one-way.

7 MEMBER ALBERTI: Right. And so I
8 was trying to help and I'm trying to be fair
9 to the applicant.

10 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Sure.

11 MEMBER ALBERTI: Is one better or
12 worse for you?

13 MS. KIRK: From my perspective,
14 no. I mean, so from the standpoint that we
15 need to back it up an hour, for instance, and
16 say instead of 2:00 it's 1:00 and we go 1:00
17 to 9:00, we could adjust that. We can adjust
18 on either side. You know, we are amenable to
19 what the preference is.

20 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Well, why
21 don't we do that? Okay.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Why don't we

1 do what? 1:00 to 9:00?

2 MEMBER ALBERTI: I would rather --

3 I mean, you could cut off sales rather than

4 cutting sales. You could cut off at 8:00.

5 You could cut them off at 7:00.

6 MS. KIRK: We always cut off a

7 minimum of two hours prior.

8 MEMBER ALBERTI: Two hours --

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

10 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- before the

11 end. Okay. I gotcha. That's what I was like

12 looking for to happen.

13 MS. KIRK: Yes, yes.

14 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. I got you.

15 MS. KIRK: So if we need to --

16 MEMBER ALBERTI: That stops the --

17 MS. KIRK: Right. So I don't know

18 if the question is do you want to keep it 2:00

19 to 10:00 and then we cut it off at 7:00 or did

20 we want to move it from 1:00 to 9:00?

21 MEMBER ALBERTI: That's the

22 question I was asking.

1 MS. KIRK: And cut it off at -- we
2 still would be cutting off at 7:00, so to
3 speak, or cutting it off at 6:00. We can
4 adjust. Let me know what your suggestion is.

5 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: I mean, I
6 don't really have a suggestion.

7 MS. KIRK: I understand what you
8 are --

9 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: But in my
10 opinion, the registration and the end of the
11 specials aren't the same thing.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

13 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Whether or
14 not you register until 9:00 or 10:00, it
15 doesn't make any difference to me. It's the--
16 how long the specials last.

17 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So that
18 would --

19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: That would be
20 the 9:00.

21 MEMBER ALBERTI: I think 9:00 is
22 probably the better.

1 MS. KIRK: So, yes, because from
2 my perspective, we have always made sure that
3 we cut it off a minimum of two hours, so
4 nobody could come in and just do massive
5 drinking.

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Good.

7 MS. KIRK: Right. All right. So
8 I guess the final agreement then is?

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So from what
10 I'm hearing, 1:00 to 9:00.

11 MS. KIRK: Okay.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Would be the
13 time frame and then registration would end at
14 7:00.

15 MS. KIRK: Okay.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And do the
17 establishments have any issues with that
18 earlier 1:00 time? I wasn't sure if you said.

19 MS. KIRK: I don't think they are
20 going to have an issue.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

22 MS. KIRK: I think it's just more

1 that the patrons aren't coming -- it's all
2 about the --

3 MEMBER ALBERTI: Nobody comes in
4 early?

5 MS. KIRK: They are going to come
6 in when they come in.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

8 MS. KIRK: So that's fine.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: But eight
10 hours is the time that you like for -- can you
11 just say why or that has been working?

12 MS. KIRK: It has just been
13 working.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

15 MS. KIRK: And to be quite honest,
16 I mean, look at the time frame depending on
17 like I said if it's the Christmas --

18 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

19 MS. KIRK: -- and it was the solid
20 eight hours, because the amount of patronage
21 that the -- then on the smaller ones, you
22 know, people may come. It depends. It's like

1 me telling them at 5:01, 40 people, sorry, you
2 had all afternoon to get here and we started
3 at noon.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Right.

5 MS. KIRK: So it's all based on
6 people's individual preference.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And how much
8 do you personally supervise that day?

9 MS. KIRK: Oh, I'm there.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Are you all
11 over?

12 MS. KIRK: I'm all over.

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

14 MS. KIRK: So I'll start at one
15 registration and then basically I start
16 walking the space checking in with the
17 managers at every bar to confirm that there
18 are no issues or concerns. If there is, then
19 I am logging it and I'm making sure that we
20 are adjusting and what do we need to be doing
21 differently for each time.

22 And at this point, all I have had

1 was accolades. In fact, if anything, they
2 were like could you do one every month?

3 Because it brings in, --

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

5 MS. KIRK: -- obviously, revenue
6 that they normally would not get.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great.

8 MS. KIRK: So --

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You haven't
10 made the news, so --

11 MS. KIRK: Except I don't know
12 that you want to see me in the news.

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Exactly.
14 That's a good thing.

15 MEMBER ALBERTI: That was a
16 compliment.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes. Okay.
18 Any other? Okay. Anything else from the
19 Board Members? All right.

20 Then I'm going to move that we
21 approve this pub crawl application. Do I have
22 a second?

1 MEMBER ALBERTI: Second.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Mr. Alberti
3 seconded the motion.

4 All those in favor say aye.

5 ALL: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: All those
7 opposed? All those abstaining? Okay. Now,
8 I am -- I want to send this out to you,
9 because we are approving it for the 1:00 to
10 9:00 and it has on it 2:00 to 10:00, so I want
11 you to --

12 MS. KIRK: Oh, initial?

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: -- change it
14 and initial it. And then we will sign off on
15 it and you will be set. Okay.

16 MS. KIRK: Thank you very much.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Thank
18 you.

19 MEMBER ALBERTI: Thank you. Good
20 to see you.

21 MS. KIRK: Thank you very much.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you.

1 MS. KIRK: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you
3 very much.

4 MS. KIRK: And I'm sure I'll see
5 you for December. Great. Have a good one.
