The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met in the Alcoholic Beverage Control Hearing Room, Reeves Building, 2000 14th Street N.W., Washington, D.C., Chairperson Ruthanne Miller, presiding.

CHAIR MILLER: Next we have on our calendar is a fact finding hearing for Taste of D.C. Festival. Good morning.

MR. MARTENS: Good morning.

CHAIR MILLER: We were just checking to see if we have an investigator coming and --

MR. MARTENS: Take your time.

CHAIR MILLER: Okay. Good morning.

MR. MARTENS: Good morning.

Sorry.

CHAIR MILLER: That's okay. So we're just starting. Do you want to introduce yourself for the record?

MR. MARTENS: I'm Stuart Martens with KCDC.

MR. GHENENE: Investigator Abyie Ghenene.

CHAIR MILLER: Okay. This is a

1 fact finding hearing for Taste of D.C. And  
2 it's going to be in the Neighborhood of  
3 Pennsylvania Avenue between 9th Street and  
4 14th Street northwest.

5 MR. GHENENE: Yes, ma'am.

6 CHAIR MILLER: Okay. October 11th  
7 through 12th?

8 MR. MARTENS: Yes, ma'am.

9 CHAIR MILLER: And, okay, so I  
10 know that we've approved Taste of D.C. for  
11 several years. So we don't expect this to  
12 be a long hearing. It's just about a check-  
13 in, because we have noted in our records  
14 that there may be 15,000 attendees per day;  
15 is that correct?

16 MR. MARTENS: If it doesn't rain  
17 hopefully.

18 CHAIR MILLER: 30,000 total. If  
19 it doesn't rain, okay. I think it's just  
20 the big number that we want to make sure  
21 everything's in order. So, basically I mean  
22 this is your third year or more?

1                   MR. MARTENS: This is going to be  
2                   our fourth year running the event as our  
3                   entity.

4                   CHAIR MILLER: Okay, so is it  
5                   have things changed this year in response to  
6                   anything that happened last year or --

7                   MR. MARTENS: Nothing happened to  
8                   elicit change.

9                   CHAIR MILLER: No.

10                  MR. MARTENS: We made some  
11                  changes to the site map, just to better  
12                  tweak customer experience.

13                  CHAIR MILLER: Okay.

14                  MR. MARTENS: But nothing that  
15                  would, it's actually nothing that's going to  
16                  affect alcohol usage or consumption at all.

17                  CHAIR MILLER: Okay. So you have  
18                  the same amount of security?

19                  MR. MARTENS: Same.

20                  CHAIR MILLER: The same  
21                  procedures for checking that you had, and  
22                  that's been working for the last few years?

1 MR. MARTENS: Yep. We are  
2 contracting with a private security firm to  
3 do a lot of that work. A lot of the  
4 interior work of just helping us monitor.  
5 Obviously stationing private security inside  
6 of the beverage booths, as well, has helped  
7 tremendously. And then, obviously, we work  
8 very closely with MPD. I believe this year  
9 we have 14 interior roaming officers  
10 throughout the venue. On most blocks, it  
11 puts us at about three people per block,  
12 with one block having two and then we have  
13 MPD's stationed at every north, south, east,  
14 west entrance into the festival, as well.

15 CHAIR MILLER: Okay. Without  
16 going into too much detail, can you maybe  
17 just explain your alcohol areas?

18 MR. MARTENS: Absolutely.

19 CHAIR MILLER: OKAY.

20 MR. MARTENS: Well, the key focus  
21 of Taste of D.C. is we market 70 restaurants  
22 as being in one place at one time, all

1 providing a taste of D.C. So they have  
2 small tasting options. We have two alcohol  
3 centric areas. One is called our Wine Walk  
4 where we have chefs pairing dishes with  
5 different wines from around the world, where  
6 you can get a two ounce sample, along with a  
7 food dish. And that's on the block of  
8 Pennsylvania Avenue between 14th and 13th.  
9 So there are four 16 x 16 tents that will  
10 each have on either side, have those  
11 pairings and have those wines available.  
12 Again, we operate on a ticketing bay system.  
13 So we have a triple I.D. check where you  
14 have to get, you get I.D.'d, if you want to  
15 drink, you have to get your I.D. checked  
16 upon entry to the festival. At which point  
17 our security staff would I.D., give you a  
18 wrist bracelet, that will identify that you  
19 are 21 plus. And then from there at the  
20 actual ticket booths, to buy your tickets,  
21 we also have a further I.D. check to  
22 actually get the currency, because you'll

1 need that to get your glass of wine. And  
2 then on the other side, the exact opposite  
3 side of the festival, between 9th and 10th  
4 Street on Pennsylvania Avenue, we have the  
5 Stellar Artois Beer Garden, which operates  
6 in the same capacity as the Wine Walk. So  
7 those are our two primary areas where beer  
8 or wine would be consumed.

9 CHAIR MILLER: Okay, great. And  
10 I just want to ask you clarify. You're  
11 positioning your security differently this  
12 year?

13 MR. MARTENS: Security is in the  
14 same positions and operates in the exact  
15 same capacity it has.

16 CHAIR MILLER: Okay. Good.

17 MR. SHORT: Thank you.

18 CHAIR MILLER: Any board  
19 questions? Mr. Short?

20 MR. SHORT: Good morning.

21 MR. MARTENS: Good morning.

22 MR. SHORT: So the total amount

1 with the total amount of security personnel  
2 you have, the total amount, what is that  
3 number?

4 MR. MARTENS: Sir, I'd have to  
5 get back to you on that number. I don't  
6 want to give you something that's incorrect.  
7 But I do know it's a lot.

8 MR. SHORT: I would say this to  
9 you. On your application is 20. Which, you  
10 know, we know that would not suffice for  
11 15,000 people or more. Now you say you have  
12 MPD, so what we need, what I'd like to have  
13 as a board member is the total number of  
14 security persons you going to have, so you  
15 can, we can see adequately on your  
16 application, should unfortunately something  
17 happen that we didn't do diligence in asking  
18 you and requiring you to have the proper  
19 amount of security for 15 to 30,000 people.

20 MR. MARTENS: Certainly. I know  
21 one thing we have done. I think 20 is, 20  
22 might just be the interior folks that are

1 managing just the alcohol side of things.  
2 But on top of that we have security at all  
3 the entrances and exits. We also have  
4 security at all the stages and they're all  
5 run from the same security company and  
6 they're all --

7 MR. SHORT: When could you  
8 provide us with that number? The total  
9 number of security?

10 MR. MARTENS: Probably within two  
11 minutes or less.

12 MR. SHORT: Okay.

13 CHAIR MILLER: Oh, good.

14 MR. SHORT: Thank you.

15 MEMBER ALBERTI: I'll just  
16 comment for the future, Mr. Martens.

17 MR. MARTENS: Yes, sir.

18 MEMBER ALBERTI: That's usually  
19 what we're asking for. I mean Mr. Short's  
20 correct, is, is usually when we ask for  
21 security, it's not just for the alcohol  
22 service, it's for the total event. So just,

1 just for the future letting you know.

2 MR. MARTENS: Will do.

3 MEMBER ALBERTI: Where we're --

4 MR. MARTENS: Yeah, we, we --

5 MEMBER ALBERTI: This is not  
6 unusual that we ask for this, so.

7 MR. MARTENS: Certainly.

8 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.

9 MR. MARTENS: I, when we filled  
10 that out, we thought as it just related to  
11 that, the issue --

12 MEMBER ALBERTI: Of course. I  
13 understand.

14 MR. MARTENS: We can adjust in  
15 the future, for sure.

16 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.

17 MR. SHORT: Thank you.

18 MR. MARTENS: I do have a number  
19 for you.

20 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.

21 MR. MARTENS: So we have 26  
22 massive security agents that are going to be

1 working on the alcohol side of things. We  
2 have 14 MPD staff, not including the  
3 exterior MPD officers, and then we have --

4 MR. SHORT: Now how many  
5 entrances do you have?

6 MR. MARTENS: We only have two  
7 entrances.

8 MR. SHORT: Okay.

9 MR. MARTENS: When I say we have  
10 MPD at all the perimeter, so at the north  
11 and south of, south ends of every street.  
12 So, and then the east west. So at the  
13 intersection of 9th and Penn, 14th and Penn,  
14 13th, north side of 13th and Penn, north side  
15 of 12th and Penn, et cetera, et cetera. So  
16 we only have, we operate two entrances into  
17 the festival, which are at 13th and 11th  
18 Street. But again we still have MPD  
19 positioned at every block on the north south  
20 and east west portions of the street.

21 MR. SHORT: Okay, so ballpark  
22 figure for the total number.

1 MR. MARTENS: 47 and that doesn't  
2 include our 50 management staff.

3 MR. SHORT: 47 plus 50?

4 MR. MARTENS: Correct. So your  
5 staff comprises of 50 people. And we have  
6 47 contracted folks that would be coming in  
7 to provide security.

8 MR. SHORT: So you're saying  
9 there would be 97 security folks there?

10 MR. MARTENS: If you want to  
11 count our management staff as security, no.

12 MR. SHORT: Okay. Let me make  
13 this very plain again. A ballpark figure on  
14 the total number of security personnel that  
15 will be working your event for both of those  
16 days.

17 MR. MARTENS: Correct, sir. 47  
18 are coming in from third party contractors.  
19 That includes MPD and our security services  
20 firm. Then on top of that we, personally as  
21 a company, have 50 management staff who will  
22 be there.

1                   CHAIR MILLER: What does the  
2 management staff do that's related to the  
3 security?

4                   MR. MARTENS: Our staff, well, we  
5 run, most of our staff is running all of the  
6 beverage pods. So we run, so our staff will  
7 be managing the ticket process. They'll be  
8 managing the massive security force.  
9 They'll be working with MPD. They'll be in  
10 the beer zones. They'll be in the wine  
11 zones, supporting those efforts, and they're  
12 primarily there in case something goes  
13 wrong. Because we have direct eyes and ears  
14 into the HSEM trailer, so we can work  
15 closely with them to, if there's an issue we  
16 can adjust it quickly.

17                  MR. SHORT: Okay, the reason I  
18 was asking that question, and you pretty  
19 much answered it with your response, was in  
20 case something did happen, I have a little  
21 knowledge of these kinds of events and I'd  
22 just say this. If something should happen,

1 then everybody knows where exits are, how  
2 they help people get out. You said you'd  
3 be, have people in the trailer with the  
4 Homeland Security.

5 MR. MARTENS: Correct. So we,  
6 well, Taste of D.C. has a trailer that's  
7 right next to the HSEM trailer. We have  
8 staff that's directly connected by a radio  
9 with HSEM at all times. We've worked with  
10 HSEM for the past four years and it's,  
11 everything's worked seamlessly so we're well  
12 in tune as to what we need to do. Did I  
13 answer your question?

14 MR. SHORT: Thank you. Thank  
15 you, Madam Chair, I appreciate it. Thank  
16 you.

17 CHAIR MILLER: Mr. Silverstein?

18 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: This event  
19 is to be taking place over two days, eight  
20 hours per day?

21 MR. MARTENS: 12:00 to 7:00 each  
22 day.

1 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Okay.

2 MR. MARTENS: And we have, our  
3 permit gives us a little buffer time on open  
4 and close, so that we can get everything  
5 kind of turned on, taps turned on and so  
6 forth and so on.

7 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: And you're  
8 looking at a total of 30,000 people, but  
9 that's 15,000 per day.

10 MR. MARTENS: Correct.

11 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: And the sun  
12 shining. And what's the max you assume at  
13 any one given time? Because they're not all  
14 going to be there when the thing starts and  
15 leave when it ends.

16 MR. MARTENS: In my experience of  
17 being out there the past few years, it's  
18 like I would equate it to a restaurant. You  
19 have turns at the tables, right? Some  
20 people come early. You see a lot of the  
21 families early on in the day. So you kind  
22 of see the strollers disappear around 3:00,

1 4:00, more of a young professional crowd  
2 will come in around 3:00 to 4:00. And  
3 that's really, so we do see that. You don't  
4 see 15,000 people at one time. At least in  
5 my experience.

6 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Right, but  
7 at the heaviest load, what do you expect? I  
8 know it's hard to, but --

9 MR. MARTENS: I couldn't really  
10 tell you. I'm not a, that's not my area of  
11 expertise to be able to, I don't think we've  
12 ever figured out --

13 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Well,  
14 actually, sir, we do need to know that. We,  
15 because in order to determine whether we're  
16 having an adequate police --

17 MR. MARTENS: Sure.

18 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: -- and  
19 security, we need to know --

20 MR. MARTENS: I would probably  
21 say 7,000.

22 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: 7,000, okay,

1 that's fair.

2 MR. MARTENS: That's a guess.  
3 I'm just trying to --

4 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: That's an  
5 absolute --

6 MR. MARTENS: -- That number.

7 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: That's  
8 reasonable.

9 MR. MARTENS: That's given to us  
10 by HSEM as well.

11 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: No, I share  
12 Mr. Short's concern, but I also look at your  
13 past record and it's pretty solid.

14 MR. MARTENS: Thank you.

15 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Thank you.

16 CHAIR MILLER: Mr. Ghenene.

17 MR. GHENENE: Yes, ma'am. I  
18 don't have any questions, but I can comment  
19 to the Board that I've worked this event the  
20 last three to four years and I think they're  
21 very responsive and proactive to any  
22 concerns that we've ever had, MPD's had, and

1 other events, not the Taste, but you see  
2 that they've participated and they've been  
3 very responsive to our needs, MPD's needs,  
4 EMS, Detective Carter's come and done  
5 undercover I.D. checks and it's always gone  
6 seamlessly. And so Mr. Silverstein's and  
7 Mr. Short's question about occupancy or,  
8 I've never been in the Taste of D.C. where I  
9 felt like this is extremely crowded. So,  
10 and there's definitely a physical security  
11 and police presence.

12 MEMBER SHORT: And I'd just like  
13 to state for the record. I'm very aware  
14 this event is one of the best, I think, that  
15 this city or probably any city can put on.  
16 And we're very happy to have you running  
17 this event again.

18 MR. MARTENS: Thank you, very  
19 much. I appreciate it. And I'm sorry, I'm  
20 not trying to skirt your questions, I just  
21 don't want to give you a, a not 100 percent  
22 correct answer.

1                   MEMBER SHORT: The record will  
2 reflect that. Thank you.

3                   CHAIR MILLER: Okay, and it is  
4 your representation that the security that'  
5 being offered this year is the same as the  
6 past years?

7                   MR. MARTENS: Correct. We have  
8 contracted, I believe there's only been one  
9 year where we've changed security firms. We  
10 have used, in 2011 we used Massive  
11 Entertainment. In 2012 we used CSC, which  
12 I'm sure you're all familiar with. And then  
13 in every other year we have continued to use  
14 Massive Entertainment. Which is a they're,  
15 I think approved by this Board, I believe  
16 and they're, you know, very recognized in  
17 this city as doing a lot of the major  
18 events. The stadium work, inside various  
19 stadiums, so they're --

20                   CHAIR MILLER: Okay.

21                   MR. MARTENS: -- they're very  
22 good.

1                   CHAIR MILLER:   Okay.   And Mr.  
2   Ghenene, in the past the security has seemed  
3   adequate, at least --

4                   MR. GHENENE:   Yes, ma'am. They,  
5   they actually did come before the Board on  
6   one occasion. I think it was through an  
7   event that you guys had. And they spoke  
8   with the board about some of their practices  
9   and they're policy, but outside of that  
10  they, they do work in a lot of the  
11  nightclubs and they do do a lot of larger  
12  events. And they're very open to any of our  
13  concerns. We've given them I.D. books.  
14  We've given them tips on I.D. training and  
15  things of that nature, so.

16                  CHAIR MILLER:   And that's good.  
17  And the number, the numbers is, has been  
18  working out?

19                  MR. GHENENE:   Yeah, and I've  
20  always felt security around. It's never  
21  been that you're looking and you can't see  
22  security. There's always been security, a

1 heavy security presence, and police  
2 presence.

3 CHAIR MILLER: Okay.

4 MR. MARTENS: And that's also  
5 done with a lot of intent. As I mentioned,  
6 our 50 staff who are going to be working in  
7 these pods, they're, our staff are not  
8 designed to come in and solve, if there's an  
9 underage issue, if there's somebody who's  
10 highly intoxicated, our instructions to our  
11 staff is to make sure you can get ahold of  
12 somebody in a yellow jacket, so that they  
13 can come and take care of that. They're, of  
14 course, trained, they're certified to do  
15 that. And that's really why we want to make  
16 sure that there's a security personnel  
17 visible within 50 to 100 feet of every one  
18 of our staff members as well.

19 MEMBER SHORT: Okay, and just for  
20 the record, also, I know you normally have a  
21 presence of the D.C. Fire Department, the  
22 Fire Marshall's office there, don't you?

1 MR. MARTENS: Yes, we have to,  
2 yes.

3 MEMBER SHORT: Okay.

4 CHAIR MILLER: Okay. Any other  
5 questions here? All right. Well, I'm  
6 ready to approve the application. I'd move  
7 that we approve Taste of D.C. application.

8 MEMBER SHORT: Second.

9 CHAIR MILLER: Mr. Short seconded  
10 the motion. All those in favor say aye.

11 (Chorus of ayes)

12 CHAIR MILLER: All those opposed.  
13 All those abstaining. Okay. Motion passes  
14 then. 5-0-0. And we'll get the paperwork  
15 back to you in a minute.

16 MR. MARTENS: Okay. Thank you  
17 all, very much.

18 CHAIR MILLER: Okay. Thank you.
