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The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met in Alcoholic Beverage Control Hearing Room, Reeves Building, 2000 14th

Street N.W., Washington, D.C., Ms. La Verne Fletcher, Agent, presiding.

Fletcher. Matthew LeFande, a member of the District of Columbia Bar. I am standing in for Manual Empress, who is the attorney for the Applicant, Manchester Bar and Restaurant.

MS. FLETCHER: And, Matthew, would you please spell your full name for the court reporter.

MR. LeFANDE: Yes. It is M-a-t-t-h-e-w, L-e-F-a-n-d-e.

MS. FLETCHER: And would you please put your contact information on that sheet on the table before you leave.

MR. LeFANDE: Okay.
MS. FLETCHER: And, present on behalf of the Protestants. If you would just state your name and spell it for the court reporter, please.

MR. PINKNEY: My name is Walter Pinkney, P-n-k-n-e-y.

MS. FLETCHER: Just a second. Did you say Walter?

MR. PINKNEY: Yes.

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MR. PINKNEY: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: Thank you very much.

Mr. Riley, this is just a notice to appear today, so $I$ will give this back to you. So, I have one letter from you.

Standing is granted to a group of six. In your case, there were approximately 22 people that signed your protest letter, but only six of you are represented today. Five of you are present, and $I$ have one letter of designation.

So, standing is being granted to a group of six, including you five and the one person who designated a representative.

Mr. Pinkney, you are the designated representative. Did you put your contact information on that sheet? If you would do that, your contact information.

So, there is one protest -protest group in this matter, a group of six.

I am going to give you a date for
a mediation. I don't have dates for status and protest hearings to give to you today, so for today, $I$ am only going to schedule a date for a mediation.

Mr. Pinkney, the mediation is to allow the parties an opportunity to resolve the protest issues. It is required that the parties meet with the licensee in an attempt to resolve the protest issues.

Do you have a question?
MR. PINKNEY: The purpose of this hearing today is for what?

MS. FLETCHER: The purpose of the hearing today is to determine who the parties are and to address any preliminary matters that may come up.

But, the primary purpose is to establish who the parties are. And, in this case, there is one protest group, a group of six that has standing as protestants.

So, the group that you represent are considered protestants in this matter.

That is what was done today.
The next step is for you to have an opportunity to meet with the licensee in an attempt to resolve your concerns.

Any other questions?
MR. PINKNEY: Yes. One question. This seems to be fruitless.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes, we have to do it, anyway. So --

MR. PINKNEY: Well, -- well, I am just -- I am just stating my --

MS. FLETCHER: Yes. That is okay, Mr. Pinkney. For the purpose of today, that is all we are doing. We are just --

Are you a part of this group?
MS. RILEY: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: And what is your name, ma'am?

MS. RILEY: Davechia Riley.
MS. FLETCHER: Could you say that in the microphone and spell it for the court reporter, please.

MS. RILEY: Davechia Riley, D-a-v-
e-c-h-i-a. Last name Riley, R-i-l-e-y.
MS. FLETCHER: And did you say Deborah?

MS. RILEY: I said Davechia.

MS. FLETCHER: What -- oh. Can you say that again.

MS. RILEY: Davechia.
MS. FLETCHER: Just a little bit further.

MS. RILEY: Davechia.
MS. FLETCHER: Could you spell it again.

MS. RILEY: D-a-v-e-c-h-i-a.
MS. FLETCHER: And did you sign the protest letter?

MS. RILEY: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you. So your group just became a group of seven.

Any concerns that you have, Mr. Pinkney, my card is on the table. My name is La Verne Fletcher. If you have any concerns
or questions about what happens next, give me a call beyond today.

MR. PINKNEY: What is next? That is the -- that is the --

MS. FLETCHER: What is next? What is next is mediation.

MR. PINKNEY: But that didn't answer my question. When is this mediation date?

MS. FLETCHER: We are going to set a date for mediation.

MR. PINKNEY: I mean, will this be done in 24 hours or 48 hours or --

MS. FLETCHER: I am going to give you the next available dates on the calendar. So, let me do that.

The next available dates for -- we are into -- we are into -- don't be worried. I am going to see if we have anything left in January, though.

We actually do have a date available on Thursday, January 30, for
mediation.

Yes, Mr. Pinkney.
MR. PINKNEY: This seems to be a fiasco.

MS. FLETCHER: I am sorry.

MR. PINKNEY: This seems to be a fiasco. In other words, it is my understanding -- it is my understanding when matters are brought before the $A B C$ Board, the ABC Board is supposed to review those matters.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MR. PINKNEY: And determine whether or not it is equitable or inequitable - -

MS. FLETCHER: That is not what happens at this stage. At this stage we schedule a mediation, in an attempt for the parties to come together to try to resolve the protest issues.

If that cannot be done, then a protest hearing is conducted where the ABC Board makes a decision about whether or not
the license will be renewed.
MR. PINKNEY: Well, then --
MS. FLETCHER: The next -- Mr. Pinkney, I am only going to have to cut you short because I have got to keep moving. We have to move to the next step, which is to set the date for mediation, and then call me with any questions that you have.

The next available date for mediation is Thursday, January 30. Mediation can be held on that day at nine, ten, eleven or one. Is that a good thing for you?

MR. LeFANDE: It is not -- not for me, but $I$ am standing in for someone else. But, what are the dates we have after that?

MS. FLETCHER: The next available date after that is Tuesday, February 4.

MR. PINKNEY: No. No, ma'am, I can't -- I can't put up with nonsense that long.

MS. FLETCHER: Mr. Pinkney.
MR. PINKNEY: I am serious.

MS. FLETCHER: Mr. Pinkney, the next available date for mediation is February 4th. If you are representing your party, you are going to have to select a date.

The next available date is February 4th.
(Off-mic comment.)
MR. LeFANDE: I have got a conflict for that day.

MS. FLETCHER: There is a conflict on the other side.
(Off-mic comments.)
MS. FLETCHER: Mr. Pinkney, this is what $I$ am -- let me tell you what $I$ am going to have to do.

MR. PINKNEY: Yes. I want to hear what you have to do.

MS. FLETCHER: I am going to set this date for a mediation. If you are not available on any particular day that you can agree upon today, $I$ am going to set the date based on the availability of the Applicant,
and we will talk later about when you are available.

MR. PINKNEY: It is not a matter of my being available.

MS. FLETCHER: So, Mr. LeFande. Mr. LeFande.

MR. LeFANDE: I am sorry.
MS. FLETCHER: Are you available on February 4th?

MR. LeFANDE: The 4th is fine. Thank you.

MS. FLETCHER: At nine, ten, eleven or one?

MR. LeFANDE: Ten or eleven, please.

MR. PINKNEY: No.
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. What time?
MR. LeFANDE: Ten or eleven is fine.

MS. FLETCHER: Mr. Pinkney, are you available on February 4 at ten or eleven?

MR. PINKNEY: I want nine o'clock
in the morning. I can't keep going over this stuff - -

MS. FLETCHER: Can we try for nine in the morning? What do you think?

MR. LeFANDE: That is not going to -- that is not going to work. It should be ten or eleven.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. I am going to -- this is what $I$ am going to do. This is what I am going to do.

I am going to offer one other date at nine, and if that doesn't work, we are going to keep moving.

What about Thursday, February 6th, is nine ever going to be good for Mr. Empress?

MR. PINKNEY: No.
MR. LeFANDE: It is just -- it is just a matter of -- it just kills an hour of the day for him just to sit and -- we prefer to have permission --

MR. PINKNEY: Yes.
MR. LeFANDE: I mean, if you have
it available --
MS. FLETCHER: I am going to set the mediation for nine o'clock. I am going to set the mediation for nine o'clock on Thursday, February 6th.

MR. PINKNEY: Ms. Fletcher, I have a question. What happens in the interim with all these --

MS. FLETCHER: Nothing happens during the interim.

MR. PINKNEY: So they do what they want to do? Are you telling me that?

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Mediation is set for February 6th at nine in the matter of Manchester.

Any questions about the time for mediation?
(No response.)
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you. The roll call hearing is concluded. The roll call hearing is concluded. All the parties seated at the table at the present time need
to move to the back. It is time for me to call the next case.

Mr. Pinkney, if you have any questions, please --

MR. PINKNEY: I have some major questions.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Call me.

MR. PINKNEY: I don't need to call
you. You need to call me --

MS. FLETCHER: Okay.

MR. PINKNEY: -- and come see what is going on at the restaurant.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. All right. Thank you.
(Whereupon, the Roll Call Hearing
was concluded at 10:22 a.m.)

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
