MS. FLETCHER: This is Case \#13-PRO-00005, Watergate Hotel Lessee, LLC, trading as Watergate Hotel, 2650 Virginia Avenue NW, License \#ABRA-091162. This is a Retailer CH New Application.

The protest issues are adverse impact on peace, order and quiet, residential parking and vehicular and pedestrian safety and real property values.

My name is LaVerne Fletcher, and I'll be conducting the roll call hearing as the Board's agent pursuant to D.C. Official Code 1601.2.

Introductions beginning with the Applicant, please.

MR. O'BRIEN: Stephen O'Brien for the Applicant. I'm accompanied by Mark -that's M-A-R-K -- Luria -- L-U-R-I-A -- who is Senior Vice President of Development for the parent of the Applicant.

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MS. FLETCHER: Mr. O'Brien, can you give me that name and spelling one more time, please?

MR. O'BRIEN: Yes. M-A-R-K L-U-R-I-A.

MS. FLETCHER: And present on behalf of the Protestants beginning with you, sir.

MR. WALDMAN: Gerry Waldman, President of Watergate West.

MS. FLETCHER: Mr. Waldman, would you please spell your name for the court reporter?

MR. WALDMAN: It's Gerald -- G-E-R-A-L-D -- Waldman -- W-A-L-D-M-A-N.

MS. FLETCHER: Thank you.
MS. DYMOWSKI: Julie Dymowski. I'm the attorney for Watergate West in the petition filed by the Board Members.

D as in David -- Y -- M as in Mary -- O-W-S-K-I.

MS. FLETCHER: Thank you, Ms.
Neal R. Gross \& Co., Inc.

Dymowski.
MR. IRIZARRY: Good morning. I'm Armando Irizarry. And I am an ANC Commissioner, and I'm here for the ANC as part of the protest in this matter.

And my name is Armando -- A-M-A-N-D-O. And the last name is Irizarry. That's I-R-I-Z-A-R-R-Y.

MS. FLETCHER: Thank you.
MS. DYMOWSKI: Ms. Fletcher, we have many, many people here who also filed protests and should identify themselves for the record.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you.
If you each would line up behind Ms. Dymowski and in front of the microphone on the table and state your name and spell it for the court reporter.

MR. SMITH: William Smith -- Dr. William Smith. W-I-L-L-I-A-M S-M-I-T-H. And accompanied today by my wife, Anne Smith -- A-N-N-E S-M-I-T-H, and Pauline Newman -- P-A-U-

was a letter that $I$ did file with the record on February 6 representing additional petitioners that are not here.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MS. DYMOWSKI: I just wanted to bring that to your attention.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes. I actually have that.

Ms. Dymowski, I have a letter from you designating a group of eight which includes Mr. Waldman --

MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: -- and seven other residents --

MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: -- at Watergate West.

MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: Let me ask you something because this would be a good time to clarify something, Ms. Dymowski.

Mr. Waldman is also -- you're also
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a resident -- is also a resident at Watergate West. Is Watergate West, Inc. filing a complaint, or is Mr. Waldman filing the complaint?

MS. DYMOWSKI: We were doing it in both capacities. Watergate West, Inc. is a residential co-op which is immediately next door to the property at issue. And each of the individuals here were doing it as a director of Watergate West.

MS. FLETCHER: And so, Watergate West, Inc. is not the owner of the property at 2700 --

MS. DYMOWSKI: They are the owner. Watergate West owns --

MS. FLETCHER: Watergate West, Inc. is the owner of the property?

MS. DYMOWSKI: Yes. These are individual residents who live there pursuant to certain documents. But the corporate entity is the owner of --

MS. FLETCHER: Is the owner.

Okay.
MS. DYMOWSKI: -- of that property.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you.
And so, with respect to the group that you're representing, because Watergate West, Inc. is an owner of the property, it is a protestant --

MS. DYMOWSKI: Okay.
MS. FLETCHER: -- in addition to the individuals?

MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct. Thank you.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay.
And the other question that $I$ have is are all of the residents of 2700 going to form a group of one because I have several letters from different groups in 2700? So is this going to be one group or do you want to be treated as a separate group?

MR. PHILLIPS: Separate.
MS. FLETCHER: You want to be Neal R. Gross \& Co., Inc.

MS. FLETCHER: So Mr. Phillips, what's your address?

MR. PHILLIPS: 2700 Virginia Avenue.

MS. FLETCHER: And you're together?

MS. KAUB: Yes. I have another apartment.

MS. FLETCHER: And what's your name?

MS. KAUB: I'm Karen -- K-A-R-E-N K-A-U-B.

MS. FLETCHER: And so, Mr. Phillips, you do not want to be treated as a part of a group with respect to 2700?

MR. PHILLIPS: I don't know what their document is. All I know is that there's a petition that was circulated and was signed by eight members that appeared reasonable to me. And so $I$ signed it.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Same for you, Ms. Kaub?

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MS. KAUB: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: You don't want to be treated as a part of the group of 2700 ?

MS. KAUB: I don't believe so. I think that we want some regulation and say but not perhaps as total as some of the others.

MS. FLETCHER: Is there anyone else present that shares that view -- any other individuals who do not want to be a part of the group at 2700 Virginia Avenue? Or does everyone else choose to be a part of the entire group?

MR. SMITH: My name's William Smith.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes?
MR. SMITH: We represent a separate protest letter. And we have taken positions from the negotiating standpoint that we hope that the group or the building itself will arrive at a position. But like the other folks who are here, we're not fully aware of what the building's position is at this time.

So we felt we wanted to be on record as a separate protest until it's clear what the building's position was.

And I think that's probably both the protests that you're seeing in addition to the building are in that position. That's correct.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you.
MR. SMITH: And in terms of our negotiating position, we are asking the building to take the lead on it. But the building right now, we don't know what their position is. So until that becomes clear, we'd like to be treated separately.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay.
MS. KELLEY: So can he speak for all of us who signed his petition or do we each need to stand up?

MS. FLETCHER: And I'm going to get to that in a moment.

MS. KELLEY: Okay.
MS. FLETCHER: Because what I'm
going to do now in light of that is I'm going to designate each individual group -determine whether each individual group is standing as protestants today. If you were all going to be one group at 2700 Virginia Avenue, then I would just grant standing to the entire group as protestants. So now I'm just going to break it down and see who's here from each group and determine if the group has standing as protestants.

So Ms. Rice, I know already that Carolyn Walker would like to be included --

MS. RICE: Cynthia Walker.
MS. FLETCHER: What?
MS. RICE: Cynthia Walker.
MS. FLETCHER: Well, she says Carolyn. But okay. Her correspondence to me says Carolyn Walker.

MS. RICE: It does?
MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MS. RICE: We have an email for her.

MS. FLETCHER: I do, too. I'm just letting you know the name that $I$ use. I'm just making a note for the record that Ms. Walker already decided that she wanted to be a member of the group at 2700 Virginia Avenue.

MS. RICE: And the Board.
MS. FLETCHER: Yes. A member of the Board --

MS. RICE: As the Board.
MS. FLETCHER: A member of the group of 2700 --

MR. SMITH: Yes.
MS. RICE: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: -- Virginia Avenue.
MS. RICE: Okay.
MS. FLETCHER: I just wanted to state that for the record.

MS. RICE: Okay. Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: Thank you.
ANC 2A does have standing as a protestant.

Ms. Dymowski's group does have
standing as a protestant. That would be the Watergate West, Inc., in addition to the other individuals represented by Ms. Dymowski.

So Ms. Dymowski, I'm looking at your protest letter, and I see the names of the individuals that signed. Some of them I can read. Some of them $I$ can't. But their signatures are there.

MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: I know that Daniel Dening -- Daniel Dening -- is that correct?

MR. WALDMAN: Deming. Deming.
MS. FLETCHER: You're a part of the group being represented by Ms. Dymowski, yes?

MR. DEMING: Yes, ma'am.
MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: Jennifer South?
MS. DYMOWSKI: Jennifer Smith.
MS. FLETCHER: Smith? Ms.
Jennifer Smith? I'm sorry. Jennifer Smith is being represented by Ms. Dymowski.

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Dugoff is Mai Van Tran. I'm not sure how she signed it here though.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay.
MS. DYMOWSKI: Can you spell it for the court reporter?

MS. FLETCHER: The second one on the list?

MS. DYMOWSKI: Yes. Can someone spell it for the court reporter?

MS. FLETCHER: Or pronounce it phonetically?

MR. WALDMAN: She wrote it Tran. It's Tran. So it's M-A-I V-A-N T-R-A-N.

MS. FLETCHER: Thank you. So that's Mai Van Tran?

MS. DYMOWSKI: Right.
MS. FLETCHER: So the person to that effect is also represented by Ms. Dymowski.

MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. And then we
have Lewey Gilstrap?
MR. WALDMAN: Yes, ma'am.
MS. FLETCHER: Also represented --
MR. WALDMAN: Mr. Gilstrap back here.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MS. DYMOWSKI: He's present.
MR. WALDMAN: Christine Evans, member of the -- secretary of the Board. She's not here.

And the last one is Hal Lawrence.
MS. FLETCHER: Hal Lawrence is being represented by Ms. Dymowski, but he's not here today.

MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: But he is being represented. Okay.

MR. WALDMAN: And one other person is Judge Newman who you previously met as she's on both petitions, ma'am.

MS. DYMOWSKI: Ms. Fletcher, if you go to page one of my letter at the very

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bottom, you'll see that the first signature --
MS. FLETCHER: Yes. That's
Pauline Newman. Yes.
MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: So Ms. Dymowski, present from your group today -- and let me know if I leave out anyone --

MS. DYMOWSKI: Okay.
MS. FLETCHER: -- is Pauline Newman is present?

MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: Daniel Deming is present?

MS. DYMOWSKI: Is he present? Correct.

MS. FLETCHER: Lewey Gilstrap is present?

MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: Mr. Waldman is present?

MS. DYMOWSKI: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: Did I leave out
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anybody?
MS. DYMOWSKI: Not that's present.
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. So what that means is that if this matter is not resolved in mediation and there's going to be a status hearing, then one more person from Ms. Dymowski's group will need to appear. But Ms. Dymowski knows that already. I'm just stating this for the record.

MS. DYMOWSKI: Okay.
MS. FLETCHER: At the point of the status hearing, the Board needs to have seen at least five people.

MS. DYMOWSKI: Okay.
MS. FLETCHER: Four are present today. So one person who's not here today from Ms. Dymowski's group would appear at the status hearing.

MS. DYMOWSKI: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: So that's one group. Ms. Dymowski's group has standing as a protestant.

Watergate West, Inc. is a protestant. ANC 2A.

MR. IRIZARRY: 2A.
MS. FLETCHER: I'm going to deal with the groups in just a moment.

Okay. And so now I'm going to look at the individual groups.

So there is a group of 22 . None of the other groups designated representatives. So I'm going to identify the groups and then determine who's in the groups, and you can decide who's going to represent your group.

MR. SMITH: We have some additional signatures --

MS. FLETCHER: I'm sorry. Could you just tell --

MR. SMITH: Sure. We have additional signatures for that group as well.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay.
MR. SMITH: Is that the group that you'd like to talk to now?

MS. FLETCHER: I'm going to have to figure out who's in the group of 22 . I have a couple of other groups. I'll let you know in a moment.

MR. SMITH: Very good.
MS. FLETCHER: And what's your name, sir?

MR. SMITH: William Smith.
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. William Smith is speaking.

Okay. So Anne Smith -- these are members of the group of $22 ?$

MR. SMITH: Correct.
MS. FLETCHER: Anne Smith, who's present; William Smith is present. Pauline Newman also signed as an individual member of your group. She's present.

MR. SMITH: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: Daniel Deming is
also present. He signed as a protestant of the group of 22.

MR. SMITH: Yes.
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MS. FLETCHER: Michael Walsh is present. Michael Walsh is present from the group of 22. Thank you.

Sherry Kelley is present from the group of 22.

Is there anyone else present that you know that you're with the group of $22 ?$

MR. KELLEY: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: Whatever you say, you'll need to say it in the microphone so that the court reporter can record it.

MR. KELLEY: Yes. You got my name before -- a member of the group of 22.

MS. FLETCHER: And what is it?
MR. KELLEY: Estel -- E-S-T-E-L Kelley -- K-E-L-L-E-Y.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes. Exactly.
Yes, I do have you as a member of the group of 22. Thank you.

Did somebody else raise their hand back there? Did you raise your hand?

PARTICIPANT: You've already
called my name.
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you. I just wanted to make sure that $I$ include everybody.

Okay. So from the group of 22, there are six people present. From the group of 22 , there are six people present.

What that means is that only those six individuals are granted standing as protestants.

MR. SMITH: We have an additional two letters --

MS. FLETCHER: I'll take those.
MR. SMITH: -- of designation.
MS. FLETCHER: The ones you gave me earlier.

MR. SMITH: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: Yes, yes, yes.
Thank you. Thanks for reminding me. That will include those individuals.

Madeleine Deming.
MR. SMITH: I think you have
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different letters there. It should be Carrey Thyne.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes. I'm just going through them one at a time.

MR. SMITH: Oh, okay. Great.
MS. FLETCHER: Madeleine Deming is being represented by Daniel Deming. And she is a member of the group of 22.

MR. SMITH: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: So that brings the number up to seven.

Madeleine is spelled M-A-D-E-L-E-I-N-E. And the last name is D-E-M-I-N-G.

Michelle Michaels is a member of the group of 22. And she has designated Anne Smith as her representative bringing the number up to eight.

Carrey Thyne is a member of the group of 22. She designated Anne Smith as her representative. So that brings the number up to nine.

MR. O'BRIEN: What was that last
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name?
MS. FLETCHER: Thyne. T-H-Y-N-E, Carrey.

MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you.
MS. FLETCHER: She's on the first page.

MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you.
MS. FLETCHER: Mr. Smith, are there any other letters?

MR. SMITH: I think you got them.
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you.
So the group that started out as a group of 22 is now a group of nine.

Anybody that's not present today and did not designate a representative to appear on the behalf is dismissed. But the roll call hearing notice states that. But the group of nine has standing to file a protest. So now we have a group of nine.

And for the group of nine, you actually need to designate a representative to speak on behalf of the entire group.

I was only dealing with the group of 22. So what started out as a group of 22 is now a group of nine that has standing as protestants because you're present.

From this point forward, we just need the name of a person that you want to designate as your representative to speak on behalf of the entire group. That's going to be Mr. Smith?

MR. SMITH: That'll be me.
MS. FLETCHER: So William Smith is the designated representative for the group of nine.

Mr. Smith, on the table there is a sign-in sheet, a contact sheet. The only name that needs to be on there is the designated representative. So any of you that filled it in, that's okay as long as your name is on there, Mr. Smith. A name, daytime number and email address.

Okay. We'll look at a couple of other groups to see who has standing.

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Oh, let me just add for the record, I'm actually going to add Cynthia Walker to the group of nine to make that a group of ten. If no one is opposed to that, I'm going to add her to your group because she lives at 2700 Virginia Avenue. She could not be here today. But she indicated that if that group was given standing that she would like to join the group.

MR. SMITH: Okay.
MS. FLETCHER: She's a resident at 2700 Virginia Avenue?

MR. SMITH: Yes, she is.
MS. FLETCHER: So I'm going to make her a member of your group of nine bringing that up to a group of ten.

MR. SMITH: Okay.
She's also a resident and member of the Board.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay.
So there's one other group which is a group of eight.

MS. KAUB: This is the letter.
We're representing Jonda McFarlane. She's our designated person.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Can you say that into the microphone for the court reporter, please?

MS. KAUB: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: State your name.
MS. KAUB: Jonda McFarlane is our designated representative.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you.
And your name?
MS. KAUB: Karen Kaub -- K-A-U-B.
MS. FLETCHER: Thank you, Ms. Kaub.

MR. SMITH: Karen, have a seat.
MS. FLETCHER: Karen Kaub has designated Jonda McFarlane as her representative. And Jonda is spelled J-O-N-DA. The last name is M-C---

MR. PHILLIPS: M-C-F-A-R- --
MS. FLETCHER: -- F-A-R --
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MR. PHILLIPS: -- L-A-N-E.
MS. FLETCHER: -- L-A-N-E. And
Robert Phillips has also designated Jonda McFarlane as his representative.

MR. PHILLIPS: Yes
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. So I have a letter of designation from Robert Phillips and Karen Kaub designating Jonda McFarlane as their representative.

Thank you.
Robert Phillips. Mr. Phillips, I'm now looking at the group of eight which is a separate group.

MR. PHILLIPS: Right.
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. You signed the protest letter of a member of a group of eight.

MR. PHILLIPS: That's correct.
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. So there's one person here from your group so far.

MR. PHILLIPS: There's two people from our group today. Karen Taub and me.

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Those have named Jonda McFarlane as our representative for future hearings.

MS. FLETCHER: Thank you.
So Karen Kaub is here from that group of eight.

MR. PHILLIPS: That's correct.
MS. FLETCHER: Is Jonda McFarlane here?

MR. PHILLIPS: She's not here.
MS. FLETCHER: That's okay. I'm just checking for the record.

MR. PHILLIPS: She's out of town.
MS. FLETCHER: Thank you very much.

Is there anyone else here from the group of eight?

MR. PHILLIPS: No, not from this group -- just the two of us.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay.
MR. O'BRIEN: I believe Ms. Kaub gave you a letter of representation from Jonda McFarlane.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MR. O'BRIEN: So there's three actually.

MS. FLETCHER: I have a letter from Jonda McFarlane designating -- yes -- Mr. Phillips and Ms. Kaub to represent her. And so, yes, that is --

MR. PHILLIPS: Today.
MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MR. PHILLIPS: And we designate her to represent us in the future.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MR. PHILLIPS: Okay.
MS. FLETCHER: Thank you. And so, Ms. McFarlane is credited with being present today because she designated you as her representative. So that's three.

MS. DYMOWSKI: Good.
MS. FLETCHER: So what that means is there are not at least five people present from your group or represented. That means that your group would actually have to be
dismissed today because in order to be granted standing as a protestant, at least five people have to be present or a total of five people have to be represented. And in your case, there's a total of three.

You still have the option, if you wish, to join the other group. But as a stand-alone group, you could not have standing today. And I'll let you make that decision.

MR. PHILLIPS: Nobody told us.
MS. FLETCHER: Earlier when I mentioned if you all wanted to join as one group -- we do that when there's a large group that lives in pretty much the same vicinity and there are a lot of different groups. So that option still stands.

If you would like to join the group of ten, if there's no opposition to that, you may join the group of ten. But as a stand-alone group, you would have to be dismissed.

MR. GILSTRAP: Some members of the Neal R. Gross \& Co., Inc.
group of ten joined her group to get her up to five.

MS. FLETCHER: We're not going to do it that way. Because we've already established ten, it'll be much easier just to let them join you than to switch over. But we could do that.

MR. PHILLIPS: Okay. Can I make the decision after I talk? It has to be right now?

MS. FLETCHER: Yes. It has to be right now.

MR. PHILLIPS: I'll just -- so I didn't know about this rule.

MS. FLETCHER: Actually, it's just a courtesy that we offer. We could just dismiss your group, but because we're aware that there's a larger group, we allow you an opportunity to join it.

MS. TAUB: Jonda McFarlane is
really the one in charge. We're just representing her at her direction. And so, if

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we have no choice --
MS. FLETCHER: You have a choice.
MS. TAUB: -- if she can be on the larger committee and doesn't want to be, then she can drop out. But I think that we might as well put her on so she at least exists.

MS. FLETCHER: Can you hear that? You're going to need to come up to the microphone. Any speaking has to be done -you're going to need to --

MR. PHILLIPS: To put us on, we're having --

MS. FLETCHER: Excuse me. Excuse me one second. You must speak into that microphone. You must because the court reporter has to record everything that's being said today. Thank you.

PARTICIPANT: Why don't you guys talk a little bit and then tell them what you want to do. Whatever you want to do is great.

MS. FLETCHER: Mr. O'Brien, do you want to say something?

MR. O'BRIEN: I want to say something.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay.
MS. KAUB: Well, I would like to -- I'm Karen Kaub -- and I would like to include Jonda McFarlane in the group of ten with the caveat that she is allowed to drop out if she chooses to.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you.
MR. PHILLIPS: And you might include me in that group of ten as long as I have a choice of dropping out.

MS. FLETCHER: At any time, you can drop out.

MR. PHILLIPS: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MR. PHILLIPS: And you, too, Karen. You can do it, too.

MS. KAUB: Yes, I would like the same privilege to drop out.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you.

MR. O'BRIEN: I was going to offer the alternative of allowing the group of three to be seated -- waive any objection -- allow the group of three to be seated as long as two show up the next time -- two more show up the next time.

MS. FLETCHER: And I actually would do that if they had letters of designation from at least two more people.

MR. O'BRIEN: Well, I was offering to waive the objection --

MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MR. O'BRIEN: -- and allow late submission of letters of representation.

MS. FLETCHER: I don't have the authority to do that, Mr. O'Brien. That could be an alternative but just not today. I don't have the authority to waive the requirement.

MR. O'BRIEN: Very well.
So then the three individuals have now joined the group of ten, at least for the
moment?
MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MR. O'BRIEN: Okay. Thank you.
MS. FLETCHER: So now we have a group of --

MR. O'BRIEN: Thirteen.
MS. FLETCHER: -- 13. We have a group of 13 with William Smith as the designated representative for the group.

Any individuals from the group of eight that are not present are dismissed in accordance with the notices that they received. You'd either have to be here or designate someone to represent you, or you're automatically dismissed.

But the group of 13 stands.
MR. WALDMAN: I'm sorry, ma'am.
But the corporation that owns the building is represented --

MS. FLETCHER: Exactly. So you could represent the interests of everybody, but just as a group.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes.

MR. SMITH: In terms of the hearings and the representation of the groups, can you just clarify who needs to be here for those meetings? Do we need to bring letters of designation, show up in person?

MS. FLETCHER: Thanks for asking that.

No. Because from your group of 13 because at least 13 people are present today, the Board does not need to see anybody else but you unless anyone else decides they want to come.

So for the status hearing, if
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you're here, Mr. Smith, that'll be fine. It's not required that anyone else show up. But anyone else can come if they want.

MR. SMITH: Thank you.
MR. WALDMAN: I will not be here, but our attorney will be here.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes. Exactly.
MR. SMITH: So you can designate a representative?

MS. FLETCHER: Yes. If it turns out you can't come, you can designate someone else.

MR. SMITH: Very good.
MS. FLETCHER: Do you have my email? Did you get my card?

MR. SMITH: I did.
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. You can just let me know.

MR. SMITH: Thank you.
MS. FLETCHER: So we need to set a date for the mediation to occur prior to the March 27th status hearing. And I'll give you
the next dates that are available.
Thursday, March 7 is available. Thursday, March 7 for mediation.

MR. O'BRIEN: In the afternoon?
MS. FLETCHER: Yes. We have 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

MR. O'BRIEN: That would be all right with us.

MR. SMITH: I have a conflict on that date.

PARTICIPANT: Seven or 27? March 7th for what? Mediation hearing?

MS. FLETCHER: March 27 is the status hearing.

MR. SMITH: It's mediation. It's

MR. O'BRIEN: Dr. Smith's not available on the 7 th?

MR. SMITH: The question I think related to mediation and what exactly that process entailed. Is that what you're asking?

MS. KELLEY: That is correct.
MS. FLETCHER: What was the question?

MR. SMITH: Exactly what that process entailed in terms of that particular meeting.

MS. FLETCHER: Oh, okay. Thank you.

So that's you speaking, Mr. Smith?
MR. SMITH: It was actually --
MS. KELLEY: He's speaking for me.
MS. FLETCHER: You understand the court reporter's position when she tries to

MS. KELLEY: So the question is --
MS. FLETCHER: And who's speaking, please.

MS. KELLEY: My name is Sherry Kelley.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you.
MS. KELLEY: He spoke for me but I will repeat it.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay.
MS. KELLEY: What exactly is the nature of the mediation session?

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. The nature of the mediation session is first of all, it's informal. It's nonadversarial. The whole purpose of it is for the parties to come together in an attempt to resolve the protest issues.

And if those issues can be resolved to the mutual satisfaction of all, then a settlement agreement is signed by all the parties and is submitted to the ABC Board
for review. If the ABC Board approves it, they will cancel the protest hearing and they will cancel the status hearing. If it's received prior to the status hearing, there won't be a need for any future proceedings. And also, it's not mandatory. I think you know the city well. But it's not mandatory that the matter is resolved. It's just mandatory that all the parties participate in mediation.

MS. KELLEY: I understand. Thank you very much.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. You're welcome.

Were you going to say something?
I thought the lady sitting next to you. Okay. Thank you.

MS. DYMOWSKI: I think we have a problem with the date.

MS. FLETCHER: Exactly. I'm going to move to the next week.

Mr. O'Brien, would you prefer
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afternoons, or are you available earlier during the day?

MR. O'BRIEN: Generally, afternoons.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Let's see.
The next available date available in the afternoon at 1:00 o'clock is Thursday, March the 14th.

MR. O'BRIEN: That's all right.
MS. FLETCHER: Is that good for you?

MR. IRIZARRY: I have a conflict on that day. However, the ANC has also designated other commissioners.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MR. IRIZARRY: At this point, I believe -- I don't know if they would have a conflict.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MR. IRIZARRY: So I know I probably will. But there are four other commissioners that have been designated.

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MS. FLETCHER: That's right.
MR. IRIZARRY: So I'm assuming -I believe that probably one of them could attend. But $I$ can't confirm that now.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. No problem. That date is --

MS. DYMOWSKI: That date is fine for us.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Mr. Smith, is that good for you?

MR. WALDMAN: 1:00 p.m., ma'am?
MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
So Mr. Irizarry, you indicated that ANC 2A has designated a couple of other representatives. And we have that on the record.

MR. IRIZARRY: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: I'm just stating it.

And so we'll go ahead and set the mediation for Thursday, March 14 at 1:00. And as you said, maybe one of the other

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representatives can appear on behalf of the ANC.

And you can let me know. Do you have my card?

MR. IRIZARRY: I do.
MS. FLETCHER: You can let me know if that changes.

MR. WALDMAN: Ma'am, I have a question regarding mediation. Does the appointment allow enough time to keep going until we resolve this thing, hopefully?

MS. FLETCHER: The date of the mediation, you mean? Or afterwards?

MR. WALDMAN: No. During the mediation. How many hours do we have? There's a lot of issues. And I'm hoping we can just stay at it and finish it up.

MS. FLETCHER: Yes. Normally, even with this many issues, we're done in a couple of hours.

MR. WALDMAN: Good.
MS. DYMOWSKI: And a second day
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could be had.
MS. FLETCHER: And a second day can be set if not. Yes, we get through them as quickly as we can. So normally in a couple of hours, we're done. And if not, as Ms. Dymowski said, we can just set a second date.

And also, if the matter is not resolved by the date of the status hearing, if it's resolved by the date of the protest hearing, the protest hearing can still be canceled.

So Mr. Waldman, do you have any other questions about the dates?

MR. WALDMAN: No, ma'am.
But since we do have a lot of issues, is it possible while you have a calendar in front of you to set a second date sometime immediately after the 14 th so we can finish it up?

MS. FLETCHER: We can do that.
Yes. Do you want to put a date out there just in case?

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MR. WALDMAN: I think everybody would like to resolve this.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Is that good for you, Mr. O'Brien?

MR. O'BRIEN: Yes.
MS. FLETCHER: Okay. And these will be dates before the status hearing? MR. WALDMAN: Correct.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Well, the status hearing is on Wednesday, March 27. If everyone is available, Thursday, March 21 is also available at 1:00 o'clock.

Is that good for you, Mr. O'Brien? MR. O'BRIEN: Yes, ma'am.

MS. FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Waldman. So there's the second date.

MS. KELLEY: So 1:00 p.m., March 21st?

MS. FLETCHER: Yes.
MR. O'BRIEN: So March 14 is
mediation. March 21 is a continuation date, if needed.
