The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met in the Alcoholic Beverage Control Hearing Room, Reeves Building, 2000 14th Street, N.W., Washington, D.C., Ruthanne Miller, Chairperson, presiding.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Our 10:00
4 case is Mr. Nickerson. Is that you?

5 MR. NICKERSON: Yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Why
7 don't you just state your full name for the
8 record, though?

9 MR. NICKERSON: Yes, my name is
10 Jerome H. Nickerson, Jr. I'm the President of
11 the Washington Waterfront Association. In
12 conjunction with the WWA, Hoffman-Madison
13 Waterfront and the National Cherry Blossom
14 Festival we are producing the Southwest
15 Fireworks Festival, which is going to be held
16 on April 7th, this Saturday. Leading up the
17 fireworks which begin at 8:30, we programmed
18 approximately six hours of music across a
19 three-block venue.

20 I believe I submitted supporting
21 documentation to the application which
22 included not only the complete site venue,

1 which goes from 600 Water Street up to 900
2 Water Street, but then I did a specific
3 breakout with respect to the application for
4 a beer garden. The beer garden's location is
5 actually 700 Water Street. It is the parking
6 lot of the former Zanzibar Nightclub.
7 Zanzibar remains shuttered and closed.

8 We did a test run of this model
9 last year in anticipation of the centennial
10 gift of the trees. I came before the Board on
11 the fact finding hearing. It worked very well
12 for us then.

13 Things have changed somewhat.
14 Obviously there's much more publicity this
15 year with the centennial gift of the trees and
16 we're going into some very fine weather. And
17 I have produced this festival for about five
18 years. This is my second year seeking a
19 permit for alcohol.

20 We're expecting large attendance.
21 We're expecting an attendance that could reach
22 30,000. We reach our maximum attendance

1 approximately an hour before the fireworks go
2 off, which is at 7:30 p.m.

3 Prior to appearing before the
4 Board here today, both the alcohol plan, the
5 security plan, the venue diagram were
6 presented to the ANC 6D and I obtained their
7 unanimous approval to go forward with the
8 plan --

9 COURT REPORTER: Sorry, sir. Could
10 you repeat that? There was a problem with my
11 microphone.

12 MR. NICKERSON: I apologize. Yes.
13 On March 13th I submitted the identical
14 documents that are now before the Board to the
15 Area Neighborhood Commission 6D, obtained
16 their approval to hold the festival in the
17 community, along with the service, the
18 proposed service of alcohol. And then on
19 March 13th I met with Commander Hickson with
20 respect to the security plan that had been
21 submitted.

22 With respect to my meeting with

1 Commander Hickson, I would, with leave of the
2 Chair, orally amend some elements of this. We
3 had originally sought to hire six off-duty
4 Metropolitan police officers. The commander
5 requested that we retain eight plus one
6 supervisor. So we have a reimbursable detail
7 right now of eight off-duty officers and one
8 sergeant.

9 The security plan and alcohol
10 management plan also made reference to CSC as
11 providing security. That portion of the plan
12 has been stretched. I've now -- instead of
13 the six CSC officers, I've hired seven SPOs.
14 So we have a total of 14 SPOs in addition to
15 the nine police officers.

16 And finally, as we went through
17 the vetting process with DCRA on our special
18 events permit, we were asked by the Department
19 of Health Emergency Department to acquire
20 another paramedic. So we now have two
21 paramedics on site. They are being furnished
22 to us by the George Washington University

1 Emergency Department.

2 I could -- let me explain a little
3 bit more the festival. Additionally, prior to
4 the submission of the application -- well,
5 after submission of the application I
6 received, and I believe it was caught up
7 electronically to the Board, a letter from the
8 deputy mayor. The deputy mayor controls this
9 property and specifically the Zanzibar parking
10 lot. And the deputy mayor has granted me
11 permission to use this for the service of both
12 beer and sake. And I have additional copies
13 for the Board if they care to see it.

14 MEMBER ALBERTI: We'll get those
15 later.

16 MR. NICKERSON: Additionally, I
17 received from the deputy mayor's office a
18 license to occupy. What I had submitted to
19 the Board with the application were the
20 license to occupy and permission letter from
21 the 2011 festival and they had to go through
22 the AG, Office of OAG and had to be caught up.

1 But I am now in possession of the license to
2 occupy the whole venue from the deputy mayor's
3 office.

4 I know the Board is concerned
5 about what type of entertainment will be
6 there, what type of food is being served. And
7 in a shameless promotion of my quadrant of the
8 city, I have brought the Board copies of The
9 Southwester. It's our local publication.

10 Inside is a listing of all the
11 entertainment on all stages. We have three
12 stages that are simultaneously programmed. We
13 attempt to cater to the broadest demographic
14 possible.

15 We have one area that is
16 specifically designated. That's the 6th
17 Street stage for children's activities.
18 Children come with their families. They can
19 make boats. They can get their face painted.
20 The music on that stage is children oriented.
21 There will also be food offered there. We do
22 -- one of our members is Joint Base Myer-

1 Henderson Hall and they have a military
2 service unit called BOSS, who is affiliated
3 with the USO. They come down. Do hot dogs,
4 popcorn, things like that for the kids.
5 That's the first venue. The 6th Street venue.

6 Then there is the 7th Street
7 venue. The 7th Street venue is primarily jazz
8 and blues programming. I believe there are
9 three bands that will be appearing there. In
10 addition to that, we have -- I hope I
11 pronounce this correct -- Cui Bono, which is
12 the production of the Japanese carp kites,
13 which children can participate in. One of our
14 sponsors is the National Cherry Blossom
15 goodwill ambassadors who'll be doing an
16 origami presentation. Harbor Patrol, who is
17 one of our members in the WWA, will be doing
18 T-shirts where the kids color their T-shirts
19 and presses. There will be two food locations
20 at that point. One will be barbecue. Another
21 one will be Captain John's Seafood.

22 The next area on the site map is

1 festival control headquarters. This is
2 currently Hoffman-Madison Waterfront's design
3 trailer. That's where we will do volunteer
4 check-in. That's where our EMTs will be
5 hosted. That's where we will do
6 communications, monitoring of communications.
7 It's also where we'll be monitoring weather
8 patterns for severe weather if that's coming
9 down on us.

10 The next location is in fact the
11 beer garden. The beer garden is surrounded by
12 a seven-foot chain link fence. We're
13 proposing to have three entrances to the beer
14 garden. Those entrances -- I believe I
15 submitted photographs in the original
16 application. There would be a channel side
17 gate, which would be the gate closest to the
18 Washington Channel. There would be another
19 entry point as you come in from what is now
20 Kastles Stadium. And then there would be a
21 third gate on Water Street, S.W.

22 And I know that the Board is very

1 concerned about that venue more than others,
2 but let me just finish the venue plan to give
3 you the big picture, and then I'll come back
4 to the Kirin Beer Garden.

5 So the next venue is Kastles
6 Stadium. And we are programming here --
7 because we have such a close relationship with
8 both the Navy Yard and the Department of the
9 Army, we're programming -- it opens with
10 presentation of the colors, the National
11 Anthem. We move to Downrange. It's an
12 excellent Army jazz band. I had no idea that
13 the Army could perform like this. We have the
14 Army Blues Band.

15 We're bringing in some popular
16 groups, popular local groups to perform there.
17 There is one group that's coming from Austin.
18 It is not nationally known. It's known to our
19 promoter. We think it would be fun. That
20 area, we have tremendous sponsorship thanks to
21 the National Cherry Blossom Festival this
22 year.

1 Lincoln Cars is one of our
2 sponsors. We'll be giving away a Lincoln
3 automobile during the event. And in this area
4 we will have merchandise tents, approximately
5 26. And then we will have seven food trucks.

6
7 And that is a general overview of
8 the venue and the food and the entertainment
9 that we will be doing all the way across the
10 venue. And without going too far on, I think
11 perhaps I should maybe entertain questions
12 from the Board with respect to either the
13 entire venue or the beer garden.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Thank
15 you. That sounds very exciting. Last year
16 when you did this practice or whatever, how
17 many people were there?

18 MR. NICKERSON: I think right
19 before the fireworks we probably got to about
20 9,000 people. We started out the morning with
21 a hailstorm and it just really suppressed our
22 attendance. And then it was followed by

1 another rainstorm.

2 And when I had previously done
3 this function and we have good weather; such
4 as the weather which is predicted for
5 Saturday, approximately 66 degrees, three
6 years ago, we had 20,000 people as estimated
7 by the Metropolitan Police all across the
8 venue and on the waterfront shortly before the
9 fireworks.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So
11 this year you expect 50? Is that what you
12 said?

13 MR. NICKERSON: Thirty.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thirty.
15 Thirty. Thirty. Okay.

16 MR. NICKERSON: Thirty. And I
17 think that is reasonable given the publicity
18 associated with the 100 years, given the fact
19 that this is the fireworks -- the fireworks
20 are actually coming to us from Japan. Nagaoka
21 is very famous for their fireworks displays,
22 and NCBF was able to bring fireworks from

1 Japan directly in. And there's a significant
2 amount of buzz, for lack of another word,
3 about the fireworks. And this event has
4 grown. It's almost larger than the 4th of
5 July fireworks, which are also visible from
6 the southwest.

7 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So and this
8 is a free event?

9 MR. NICKERSON: Yes.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

11 MR. NICKERSON: Completely free
12 across all venues.

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And then you
14 just buy the drinks and the food and things
15 like that?

16 MR. NICKERSON: Yes, alcohol and
17 sake will be sold. It's \$5 for a beer, \$5 for
18 a sake. The sponsor of the beer garden is
19 Kirin Beer, who is one of the big NCBF
20 sponsors for the festival.

21 With the Chairwoman's permission,
22 let me just talk a little bit about how we've

1 trained people and how we will operate the
2 beer garden.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

4 MR. NICKERSON: On March 24th, we
5 took approximately 35 volunteers and put them
6 through TIPS training at the Metropolitan
7 Police Harbor Patrol. That TIPS training was
8 conducted by a certified trainer, Mr. Rich
9 Hammer. Mr. Hammer is general manager at
10 Cantina Marina, which is a local establishment
11 on the waterfront which holds a permit. He is
12 also one of our alcohol managers for the site.

13 Our other alcohol manager for the
14 site is Mr. David Johnson. I believe I
15 submitted both gentleman's certifications in
16 the initial application. Mr. Johnson does
17 operations for entertainment cruises in
18 Odyssey. Very familiar in the entertainment
19 industry. And so they will be our two
20 managers.

21 And what we will do is do two
22 shifts of 15 of our trained volunteers. All

1 of our trained volunteers signed in. We have
2 the alcohol management plan. They were
3 required to read it. They were required to
4 sign off on it. We checked them at point of
5 TIPS training as to their age. We've
6 maintained a list as to who they are. These
7 are the only volunteers that will be allowed
8 to work the beer garden.

9 As those beer garden volunteers
10 come in, they will be given an NCBF shirt, a
11 staff shirt. They will also be banded twice,
12 once to demonstrate that they're over 21 and
13 then with another band that they have in fact
14 completed TIPS training.

15 The venue which I initially
16 submitted to the Board, the Kirin Beer venue,
17 has changed just ever so briefly. In
18 reviewing the plan with my alcohol manager, we
19 determined that we needed -- the venue itself
20 is open. It's got fenced on there, but we're
21 not going to restrict people from under 21
22 from coming in. Rather, we're going to do

1 identification and age check at point of sale
2 of the tickets. And we have divided in the
3 new venue; and I have copies for the Board,
4 the point of sale ticket from the actual
5 service area where beer and sake can be
6 dispensed.

7 So we will have two volunteers
8 there. The first volunteer will take the ID,
9 will go ahead and certify that it is a valid
10 ID, will go ahead and put a UV light on it,
11 certify that the individual is over 21, it is
12 in the fact the individual that's standing in
13 front of them and then pass it to a second
14 volunteer sitting right next to them who will
15 then confirm the individual is over 21. At
16 that point the second volunteer will place the
17 wristband on that individual indicating that
18 he is over 21.

19 At that point any individual who
20 has been identified by us can purchase a
21 maximum of four tickets, no more than four
22 tickets at any one time. And then they can

1 proceed to the distribution area where they
2 will only be allowed to obtain two beverages
3 at one time, whether it's two beers or one
4 beer and one sake. And that's how we'll do
5 it.

6 When they come back for -- if they
7 wish to purchase additional tickets, we're
8 going to do another ID check because, yes, it
9 is our band and we can -- but it's what we
10 need to do.

11 With respect to signage, the gates
12 -- the photographs of the gates that I
13 presented in the initial application are all
14 going to be marked no alcohol beyond this
15 point. And on the entrance side, no alcohol
16 can be brought in here.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

18 MR. NICKERSON: We're going to
19 allow food to be brought into the venue. We
20 are not going to allow any fluids to be
21 brought in whatsoever. You just can't bring
22 them in. We don't know what's in the bottle.

1 We don't know what's going on. We will make
2 both water and soft drinks available inside
3 the Kirin Beer Garden, but we just think it's
4 best -- you know, we want them to enjoy
5 themselves. We're attempting to create a
6 place not where we're just all 21, but where
7 mom and dad can take a break with the kids,
8 have a beer if they want to, get something
9 from the food trucks. And that's what we're
10 trying to foster here.

11 We do programming during the
12 summer on Thursday and Friday night. It has
13 worked on a smaller scale. Admittedly it's a
14 smaller scale when we do Thursday, Friday
15 programming, but it's worked. And that's how
16 we're trying to promote the southwest, as
17 family friendly, and not just, you know, an
18 over-21 to 30 demographic. We're looking to
19 try and diffuse that and just offer an
20 amenity. We want to offer the amenity. I'm
21 not trying to serve everybody. We're just
22 trying to offer an amenity to the festival.

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. When
2 you say you do Thursday, Friday programming,
3 do you mean you have small events on the
4 waterfront?

5 MR. NICKERSON: Yes, we do jazz
6 and blues on Thursday, Friday. You know,
7 typically we may get on a nice evening 200,
8 300 people down there. This is at the 7th
9 Street. It's not at the Kirin Beer Garden.
10 But we do a similar type of -- it's open. We
11 have chaise lounges that are out there.
12 People can sit around. They can eat some
13 food. And at point of sale we go ahead and do
14 the ID process. We go ahead and band them
15 right there. And it's worked.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

17 MR. NICKERSON: It's worked for
18 us. Now the larger questions that I'm sure
19 the investigator has already scribbled down.
20 What are we asking for occupancy? We would
21 request the Board to be allowed to go to an
22 occupancy of 1,000 individuals with inside the

1 beer garden.

2 The beer garden itself is 10,400
3 square feet. I'm aware that the Board
4 typically says 50 to 100 persons per security
5 personnel in the area. We are in the NCBF.
6 We think we are catering to a very broad
7 demographic. I would respectfully request
8 that we be allowed to go to an occupancy of
9 1,000, however, I am at the Board's discretion
10 if you believe it should be lower than that.

11 MEMBER ALBERTI: What is the
12 number of security guards that you're going to
13 have? I didn't hear the number of security
14 guards, so I'm asking that --

15 MR. NICKERSON: Right. So I have
16 six. I have six SPOs assigned to this area.
17 I have a total of 31 security, both private
18 and off-duty Metropolitan police officers with
19 approximately --

20 MEMBER ALBERTI: So six in this
21 area?

22 MR. NICKERSON: Six in this area.

1 MEMBER ALBERTI: And do you have
2 any volunteers who --

3 MR. NICKERSON: Yes, we do.

4 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- will serve in
5 any function?

6 MR. NICKERSON: We have two shifts
7 of 15, plus the alcohol manager.

8 MEMBER ALBERTI: And what is the
9 function of the volunteers, aside from the
10 ones that are checking IDs.

11 MR. NICKERSON: Yes, well, the
12 volunteers will also be posted at the entrance
13 points to make sure that no liquids are being
14 brought in and that no alcohol obviously is
15 leaving the venue.

16 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. And will
17 you have people roaming through the event?

18 MR. NICKERSON: Yes.

19 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- the beer
20 garden event space to make sure that --

21 MR. NICKERSON: Yes.

22 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- beer is being

1 passed off to underage people?

2 MR. NICKERSON: The passage to an
3 underage or someone -- well, not even someone
4 -- just someone who's not wearing -- has not
5 been banded by us.

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. And how
7 many of those people will there be,
8 approximately?

9 MR. NICKERSON: Approximately I
10 would -- we've got -- six are required to run
11 the three gates. Two are required to do the
12 tables. So it's approximately one or two in
13 addition to the alcohol manager. And the
14 SPOs, that's all they do. The SPOs are not --

15 MEMBER ALBERTI: Right.

16 MR. NICKERSON: -- involved in --

17 MEMBER ALBERTI: I'm trying to
18 figure out who in addition to the SPOs --

19 MR. NICKERSON: Right.

20 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- you'll have.
21 so you've got at least two other people who
22 are roaming to monitor the crowd?

1 MR. NICKERSON: At least two other
2 in addition to the manager --

3 MEMBER ALBERTI: And then --

4 MR. NICKERSON: -- because he's
5 got overall supervisor of what's going on.

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Gives me
7 an idea.

8 MEMBER MOBLEY: Right, that's
9 about 133 per security guard.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Did you say
11 that you also discussed security with MPD?

12 MR. NICKERSON: Oh, yes. I've met
13 with Commander Hickson. It was on March 13th.
14 He reviewed the security plan before you and
15 then made modifications to it and gave me
16 instructions in terms of what he wanted --

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

18 MR. NICKERSON: -- for a
19 reimbursable detail. And we've been in
20 communications since. And right now we're
21 waiting to see if the commander is going to
22 have vehicles available. What we would

1 propose and what has worked for us last year
2 was the major entry points to the venue are
3 6th, 7th and 9th. And we've requested 1D, if
4 they have the assets available, because he
5 doesn't know until the start of the shift if
6 he has it -- that two officers be put in a
7 patrol car in each of those locations.
8 Because if we have to get emergency equipment
9 in, that's how it's going to come in --

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

11 MR. NICKERSON: -- and that it
12 also gives the greatest visibility, and to the
13 extent that folks subscribe in deterrence,
14 it's the greatest police presence you can
15 project out there by putting them there.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Board
17 questions?

18 MEMBER ALBERTI: Just a quick
19 question.

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes?

21 MEMBER ALBERTI: Mr. Nickerson,
22 because I know you probably thought of this,

1 but just since this -- this is an open event;
2 and I know there are signs that say no beer
3 beyond this point, but are you going to have
4 distinctive containers, cups --

5 MR. NICKERSON: Yes.

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- for the beer
7 and sake so that if you see one of those
8 outside the venue you know to stop that --
9 some -- the police will know to stop that
10 person?

11 MR. NICKERSON: Yes. We're
12 getting much better at this and we are
13 completely branded across. Kirin is giving us
14 their cups. And so, yes, we can identify
15 what's coming out of the beer garden. We can
16 instantly spot it outside of the venue.

17 MEMBER ALBERTI: I just want to
18 tell you that I look forward to this event and
19 the fireworks every year. So I'll be there.

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: That goes for
21 me, too. I think I'll check it out.

22 Okay. Mr. Ghenene, do you have

1 any questions or concerns you want to raise?

2 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

4 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Earlier on
5 you said that there is 14 SPOs, 9 police
6 officers, correct?

7 MR. NICKERSON: Yes, 14 SPOs, 9
8 officers and 1 sergeant.

9 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: And one
10 sergeant? Okay. So that's a total of 23. In
11 addition to those 23 do you have any specific
12 security personnel?

13 MR. NICKERSON: Yes. Yes, we do.
14 I apologize, investigator. So in addition to
15 those we also have Watkins Security.

16 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes.

17 MR. NICKERSON: And those numbers
18 are -- it's page 3 of the security plan to the
19 commander. It's eight Watkins Security.

20 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: What's your
21 plan for handling intoxicated patrons and
22 disorderly patrons?

1 MR. NICKERSON: Right. So we
2 couldn't do an exhaustive list of all the
3 signs of over intoxication, but the plan as it
4 stands right now is we're screening people as
5 they come in. I mean, we can look at people
6 as they come in. But more importantly I
7 think, at the ID checkpoint you attempt to
8 engage in small conversation. Oh, you're from
9 Ohio? You know, how did your team do this
10 year? Get a sense of is this person oriented,
11 you know, to person, place, time? Are they
12 there? And as an initial kind of thing.

13 But then of course we're well
14 aware that although someone may not be
15 intoxicated when they come into the venue, if
16 they're in the venue for a sufficiently long
17 period of time or if there is an interaction
18 with drugs they may be taking, they may become
19 intoxicated. So the procedure is for the
20 volunteer to notify the managers, because the
21 managers are long-time industry individuals
22 that deal with over intoxication.

1 We'll approach the individual.
2 And it's a very -- you know, at first it's not
3 a you're too drunk, it's, look, I'm very
4 concerned. I think you're over intoxicated.
5 I'm just no longer comfortable with serving
6 you. You know, I apologize, but, you know, I
7 think, you know, you need to go right now.
8 And if the individual comes out at that point,
9 then great. If the individual doesn't, then
10 we go to the SPOs and say we apologize, you
11 have to leave.

12 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Okay. And
13 how many drinking areas are there going to be
14 total?

15 MR. NICKERSON: Well, there's one
16 service area. It's under -- it's two 10 by 10
17 tents that have been joined together. There's
18 a draft truck, which is behind it.

19 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes.

20 MR. NICKERSON: So that is the
21 service area. But if I might, this whole
22 venue, the pink -- these are tables and

1 chairs. The pink are actually chaise lounges.

2 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes.

3 MR. NICKERSON: The center of it
4 is a Kirin Beer -- it's actually a lifeguard
5 chair --

6 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Okay.

7 MR. NICKERSON: -- in the middle
8 of it. Lincoln, because they're one of our
9 sponsors, will have a vehicle --

10 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes.

11 MR. NICKERSON: -- over here. So
12 this is -- inside the fence chained area,
13 that's the drinking area.

14 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Yes.

15 MR. NICKERSON: That's --

16 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: They're not
17 allowed to take them outside?

18 MR. NICKERSON: Absolutely not.

19 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: Okay. And
20 there's only one kind of band to distinguish
21 patrons over 21, correct?

22 MR. NICKERSON: Yes, there's only

1 one kind of band.

2 MEMBER BROOKS: Okay?

3 INVESTIGATOR GHENENE: That's it,
4 yes.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Any
6 other Board questions?

7 MEMBER MOBLEY: No, Madam Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Sounds
9 like you have a very comprehensive plan in
10 place. So I recommend we approve. I think
11 that's the consensus of the Board, correct?

12 PARTICIPANT: Yes.

13 MEMBER MOBLEY: Yes.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So
15 we're going to approve --

16 MR. NICKERSON: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: -- the
18 application. I believe it needs to be
19 processed and then we'll get back to you.

20 MR. NICKERSON: I'll stand by.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Or
22 check with our staff.

1 MEMBER ALBERTI: Check with our
2 staff.

3 MR. NICKERSON: Thank you. Thank
4 you for your time.

5 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you
6 very much.

7 MR. NICKERSON: And hopefully you
8 can all join us.

9 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

21 what time do they start?

22 MR. NICKERSON: They start at 8:30

1 promptly. So 8:30. And it's not like 4th of
2 July, everybody looks up towards the monument.
3 This time you have to look down channel.
4 They're off a barge --

5 MEMBER NOPHLIN: Oh.

6 MR. NICKERSON: -- going down the
7 Washington Channel. So you want to be looking
8 south, not north on Cherry Blossom.

9 MEMBER NOPHLIN: And you can
10 actually see it from the Virginia side?

11 MR. NICKERSON: Yes, you can.

12 MEMBER ALBERTI: From Hains Point.

13 MR. NICKERSON: You can. If
14 you're in East Potomac Park, you can
15 definitely see them.

16 MEMBER ALBERTI: Yes, not from
17 Virginia, but from Hains Point.

18 MR. NICKERSON: East Potomac Park
19 is very close to where the barge is.

20 MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Mr.
21 Nophlin, I can tell you the best viewing spot.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Good. Sounds

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good.
