ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.

The next case on our agenda is a fact finding on a temporary license application for an event to occur July 4th, 2013 at 800 Water Street.

Would you please identify yourself?

MS. SPATZ: Hi, my name is Jennifer Spatz. I'm with Washington Team Tennis, aka Washington Kastles, a professional tennis team in D.C. Our location is 800 Water Street, S.W.

ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Great. Thank you for coming. Well before we go on, I'm just going to have the investigator introduce herself.

INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Yes, Investigator Felicia Martin with ABRA.

ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Great. Thank you. So, Ms. Spatz, we often bring

1 people in for these large outdoor events so
2 that we can just kind of review the procedures
3 they have for crowd control and especially for
4 the service and consumption of alcohol. So
5 this is just sort of fact finding.

6 MS. SPATZ: Yes.

7 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: We're
8 going to ask you questions, get information
9 from you. We always have an investigator here
10 as a resource person and someone you can turn
11 to if you have questions after you leave here.

12 MS. SPATZ: Great.

13 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: So this
14 event -- so this is in the stadium, the tennis
15 stadium?

16 MS. SPATZ: That's correct, yes.

17 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.
18 Great. So why don't you -- I think you were
19 given a list of --

20 MS. SPATZ: I did.

21 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: All
22 right. So jumping off from that, why don't

1 you give us some information about the event?

2 MS. SPATZ: Sure. And I -- just
3 in case I don't cover every single detail, I
4 -- it is typed out into the question I just
5 gave you as well as the diagram. In fact, it
6 is --

7 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: And we
8 have that here. Good. Thank you.

9 MS. SPATZ: Yes, sir. The event
10 is July 4th from 4:30 to 9:30. It's a
11 ticketed event. Twenty-one and older only
12 will be admitted. It's an advance purchase.
13 There won't be tickets sold at the door.

14 CSC is our security company.
15 We've worked with them since 2008 since our
16 matches were established in 2008. There will
17 be 30 guards on site. As of last night 738
18 tickets were sold, so I feel that we'll have
19 ample coverage.

20 There's only one main entrance
21 which is near the corner of 9th and Water
22 Street, S.W. If you look at the diagram, we

1 have ample emergency exits. There will be a
2 security guard at every one of the exits
3 because we have to have the gates -- they have
4 to be unlocked. They don't have to be open,
5 but there's a security guard at all of those
6 exits as well as by all of the bars. There
7 will be roving security guards and they will
8 also be by the stage and the bathroom areas,
9 too. We have the AMS ambulance and their
10 medical team will be on site, as well as two
11 MPDs have been set up for the event.

12 It is a music festival to
13 celebrate the 4th of July. There will be two
14 food trucks on site. The music being played
15 will be a mix of country, '80s and '90s music,
16 and there will also be a DJ area that will
17 play mainly the top 40. We expect the
18 demographics to be, you know, the 22 to 40-
19 year-old age demographic. All age
20 demographics above 21 are invited and we
21 expect it to be more of the D.C. native and
22 Hill staffers in attendance.

1 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Great.

2 I'm going to ask a few quick questions.

3 MS. SPATZ: Sure.

4 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.

5 So there's one entrance, correct?

6 MS. SPATZ: Yes.

7 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Who does

8 the ID checking at -- I assume there's ID

9 checking at the entrance?

10 MS. SPATZ: Of course, yes.

11 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.

12 MS. SPATZ: So a patron will come

13 up that has purchased a ticket. They'll get

14 their IDs checked by our staff members. There

15 are no volunteers working these events. A lot

16 of our staff members will have the ID book on

17 them, but have also taken ABRA classes.

18 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.

19 Great.

20 MS. SPATZ: So they will be

21 checking IDs. Once the IDs are checked, they

22 will then go to the next table and that's

1 where it has the list of names of people that
2 have purchased to make sure that they've in
3 fact purchased their ticket. And there will
4 be a supervisor near the security checkpoint,
5 as well as CSC guards.

6 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Great.
7 Let me see if there are any other questions I
8 have here. You're serving beer and -- what
9 alcohol are you serving? Do you just have
10 beer trucks? You have beer and wine or
11 beer --

12 MS. SPATZ: There's beer, wine and
13 spirits.

14 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: And
15 spirits?

16 MS. SPATZ: Yes. The ticket
17 includes, the package includes the beverages.
18 I don't know the exact type, if it's Smirnoff
19 vodka or --

20 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.
21 But the entrance includes all alcohol, is that
22 correct?

1 MS. SPATZ: Yes, sir.

2 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.

3 MS. SPATZ: I tried to label
4 everything as possible --

5 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: So this
6 all takes place within the stadium?

7 MS. SPATZ: Yes, sir.

8 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: So it's
9 all confined?

10 MS. SPATZ: It's all fenced it.

11 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Right.

12 MS. SPATZ: It's an eight-foot-
13 high fence. And I marked the exits. There
14 are several. There's one, two, three, four
15 20-foot exits, one 30-foot exit and a 10-foot
16 exit within the area that will have a guard at
17 each gate. But there's only one entrance
18 point.

19 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Yes.

20 MS. SPATZ: So it's just of the
21 emergency exits out of the egresses. And over
22 on the other side where the event isn't taking

1 place there will still be a guard over there
2 in case -- I don't know if you've ever
3 attended a Kastles match --

4 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: I
5 haven't.

6 MS. SPATZ: -- but we have the
7 main stadium and then the --

8 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: But I've
9 seen the --

10 MS. SPATZ: Okay.

11 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: --
12 exterior.

13 MS. SPATZ: Okay.

14 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: I know
15 the exterior. So, yes.

16 MS. SPATZ: Okay. So there's the
17 main stadium and right next to it is a VIP lot
18 that they're not utilizing, but there are
19 gates there. So they'll have a security guard
20 at them just in case --

21 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.

22 MS. SPATZ: -- there's an

1 emergency to let someone out.

2 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.
3 Great. I have no other questions. Anyone
4 else have any questions?

5 MEMBER BROOKS: Yes.

6 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Mr.
7 Brooks?

8 MEMBER BROOKS: I think she's
9 already answered one of them, anyway. It's an
10 open bar? Is that basically what it is?

11 MS. SPATZ: It is, with the ticket
12 purchase. And the average price is \$65.

13 MEMBER BROOKS: You say "average
14 price." So --

15 MS. SPATZ: Because it's like a
16 kind of -- there's like an early bird special
17 and then it increases as it gets closer to the
18 event. So that's why there's an average price
19 of \$65.

20 MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. So can I
21 buy a ticket at the door?

22 MS. SPATZ: No, sir. You can only

1 buy them online. Eventbrite is hosting, where
2 you can go and purchase a ticket. But there's
3 no walk-up sales.

4 MEMBER BROOKS: Oh, okay. And
5 food. Is food a part of the package, or you
6 have to buy food?

7 MS. SPATZ: You buy the food.

8 MEMBER BROOKS: Okay. All right.

9 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.
10 Now just a few minor things just to make sure
11 we're all on the same page here. Maximum
12 number of people you allow is 2,000? And
13 you'd be happy if you got that, I imagine.

14 MS. SPATZ: Yes, so the -- I mean
15 right now we expect approximately 1,500
16 people.

17 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.

18 MS. SPATZ: But as I said, last
19 night there were 738. So right now we have 30
20 security guards on site, so I think that will
21 be fine.

22 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.

1 MS. SPATZ: But, you know,
2 obviously if the ticket sales start to
3 increase and go to 1,500 -- let's say you can
4 hold -- well, the stadium grounds can hold
5 5,000 people, but we don't expect that.
6 That's why we have it capped --

7 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: At
8 2,000?

9 MS. SPATZ: Yes, sir.

10 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: All
11 right.

12 MS. SPATZ: And obviously if it
13 goes above 1,500 -- because we know it's
14 usually 1 per 50 --

15 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Right.

16 MS. SPATZ: -- people that we need
17 a guard. So right now we've got 30. If we
18 see ticket sales have a sudden crazy increase,
19 then we'll contact CSC and have them
20 additional guards.

21 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Great.
22 Very good. We appreciate that.

1 Now just -- and I do this because
2 we're very strict on asking licensees to
3 adhere to the times in their application. So
4 I want to go over this quickly.

5 MS. SPATZ: Yes, sir.

6 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: So the
7 event is until 9:30. That means you're going
8 to have everything cleared by 9:30, right?

9 MS. SPATZ: The event stops at
10 9:30. The serving of alcohol stops by 9:15.

11 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.

12 MS. SPATZ: So the event stops at
13 9:30 and everyone will be out as soon as the
14 event ends. CSC will help us get them out of
15 the gate.

16 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.
17 So I would suggest -- because you may have
18 some people lingering as they try to leave,
19 all right? So I would suggest that you amend
20 your hours of the event until 10:00 p.m.

21 MS. SPATZ: Okay.

22 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: All

1 right? And that you also amend the hours of
2 sales and service to say 9:15, which you don't
3 have here. You have 9:00.

4 MS. SPATZ: Okay.

5 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: So
6 because someone's going to forget. They're
7 going to come by and they're going to go, oh,
8 wait a second, the license says you can't be
9 selling until -- and, you know -- and that we
10 don't --

11 MS. SPATZ: Okay.

12 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: It just
13 makes it easier for everybody. So I'm going
14 to have Ms. Walker come down and you can amend
15 it right now.

16 MS. SPATZ: Okay. Great.

17 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: And you
18 can initial it.

19 MS. SPATZ: Oh, thank you.

20 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: And then
21 we'll all be on the same page.

22 (Laughter.)

1 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: This
2 just avoids confusion. And I know when you're
3 filling this out it's not clear to everybody,
4 so I just want to avoid confusion the day of
5 the event.

6 MS. SPATZ: I appreciate that.
7 Thank you so much.

8 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Very
9 good. So I am going to recommend that we
10 approve this temporary license.

11 MS. SPATZ: Great.

12 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Second.

13 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Thank
14 you for the second. All in favor, say aye?

15 (Chorus of ayes.)

16 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Excuse me,
17 Mr. Alberti, I had a few questions.

18 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Oh, yes,
19 I'm sorry.

20 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: That's okay.

21 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: I'm
22 sorry. Yes?

1 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: We get that
2 sometimes.

3 (Laughter.)

4 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Please.
5 Please continue.

6 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Thank you,
7 sir.

8 Miss Jennifer, I want to thank you
9 for coming in and explaining this all for us
10 for our understanding, but I just had a few
11 more questions.

12 MS. SPATZ: Of course. Whatever
13 you'd like, ma'am.

14 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Does CSC
15 stand for anything for the security company?

16 MS. SPATZ: Contemporary Services
17 Corporation.

18 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay.

19 MS. SPATZ: They're the same ones
20 that do Nat Stadium and Verizon Center.

21 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Oh, okay.
22 And you talked about the numbers here for the

1 width of the entrance.

2 MS. SPATZ: Yes.

3 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Was that the
4 entrance or the security fence?

5 MS. SPATZ: It's just the gate
6 opening.

7 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay. Oh,
8 the gate opening?

9 MS. SPATZ: Yes, I just -- because
10 with our DCRA permit we have to let them know
11 how big the entrance is. So I just thought it
12 would be good for everyone to know that.

13 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay. And
14 you're using fencing to enclose the area?

15 MS. SPATZ: It's eight-foot fence.
16 It's all around and secure into the ground.

17 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Oh, okay.

18 MS. SPATZ: So it's already there.

19 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay.
20 That's what I was concerned about, the height
21 of the fence.

22 MS. SPATZ: Yes.

1 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: And if this
2 fence can be manipulated or the integrity of
3 it can be, you know, impacted by scaling or
4 something like that.

5 MS. SPATZ: Yes, it shouldn't be.
6 There are coverings on the outside of the
7 fence. There's a green mesh covering as well
8 as vinyl mesh signage to promote any season.

9 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay.

10 MS. SPATZ: So there's nowhere to
11 grab onto anything or put feet through.

12 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay.

13 MS. SPATZ: Should someone that
14 gets in underage, be recognized that someone
15 is underage, we have security procedures as
16 far as everyone on the radio, they'll contact
17 either CSC or our staff will contact MPD to
18 come in and remove the person.

19 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay. And
20 will MPD officers be the only officers who are
21 armed, or do you know?

22 MS. SPATZ: They should be the

1 only officers that -- CSC is not armed.

2 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: They do not
3 come armed? And lastly, you mentioned that
4 participants will receive a ticket. How do
5 you control the tickets? Do they print them
6 at home or upon entry?

7 MS. SPATZ: It's through
8 Eventbrite and so when they purchase the
9 ticket, their name gets put on a list. That's
10 why when they check in there's a list with the
11 person's name.

12 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay.

13 MS. SPATZ: So when they come in,
14 they show their ID at the security checkpoint
15 and then they come through and then they get
16 checked off the check-in list.

17 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay.

18 MS. SPATZ: So they don't have a
19 physical ticket that they can pass on that
20 somebody else can come in.

21 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay. And
22 with the one entrance to have so far 730-plus

1 participants --

2 MS. SPATZ: Right.

3 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: -- and let's
4 hope that you get the max --

5 MS. SPATZ: Right.

6 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: -- how are
7 you controlling just that one entrance for
8 everyone to gain entry?

9 MS. SPATZ: So there will be at
10 least -- so similar to our season we have
11 multiple guards that are right there in the
12 front --

13 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: I get you.
14 I get you.

15 MS. SPATZ: -- ID checking. They
16 come in and there's a table and there's at
17 least 10 people there --

18 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay.

19 MS. SPATZ: -- to check the name
20 list. And we will probably segregate it out
21 like A through F and -- you know, so it runs
22 a lot smoothly.

1 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay.

2 MS. SPATZ: And then CSC does
3 obviously check any bags that come in.

4 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Yes.

5 MS. SPATZ: We hope that they
6 don't bring a lot of bags because it's a five-
7 hour festival, but they will check anything
8 and make sure that no items are brought in
9 from the outside.

10 INVESTIGATOR MARTIN: Okay. Thank
11 you for your answers.

12 MS. SPATZ: No problem.

13 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: All
14 right. Ms. Spatz, I also have a question. So
15 what gets done first, the ID checking or
16 the --

17 MS. SPATZ: The ID checking gets
18 done first.

19 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.
20 And there's one person there, or more than
21 one?

22 MS. SPATZ: No, no, there's

1 multiple people.

2 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay.

3 Great.

4 MS. SPATZ: Yes.

5 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Got you.

6 Okay. So there's a motion before us and I
7 will call the vote on the motion. All those
8 in favor, say aye?

9 (Chorus of ayes.)

10 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: All
11 those opposed?

12 (No audible response.)

13 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: The
14 motion carries 4-0 and your application is
15 approved.

16 MS. SPATZ: Great.

17 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: We're
18 going to sign this now. I think if you can
19 come back tomorrow to --

20 MS. SPATZ: Oh, they --

21 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Because
22 they're closed, so you'll have to come back

1 tomorrow to pick it up.

2 MS. SPATZ: Okay. Not a problem.

3 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Okay?

4 MS. SPATZ: Okay. Do they open at
5 9:00?

6 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Yes,
7 9:00. And we're going to sign it today, so it
8 will be ready.

9 MS. SPATZ: Great. Thank you so
10 much of your time.

11 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: Well,
12 thank you for coming.

13 MS. SPATZ: Have a good day.

14 ACTING CHAIRMAN ALBERTI: And hope
15 you have a great event.

16 MS. SPATZ: Thank you.

18 concluded at 4:26 p.m.)
