CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay, we have one more fact finding this morning. It's the applicant is Daniel Kirner, Taste of DC, for October 12 through 13. Okay.

(Off the record comments)

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay, would you introduce yourself, sir, for the record please.

MR. KIRNER: I'm Dan Kirner, with Taste of DC.

MR. MARTENS: Steuart Martens, Taste of DC.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. Dan, what's your last name?

MR. KIRNER: It's Kirner, K-I-R-N-E-R.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: K-I-R-N-E-R, okay. And, I'm sorry.

MR. MARTENS: Last name is Martens, M-A-R-T-E-N-S.

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And your
2 first name?

3 MR. MARTENS: Steuart.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Steuart,
5 okay.

6 MR. GHENENE: ABRA investigator
7 Abyie Ghenene.

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great, okay.
9 This is Taste of DC, which has been a very
10 successful event, right, for how many years?
11 How many years?

12 MR. MARTENS: It's been around
13 since '89.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. I
15 thought it was a very long time. Okay. I
16 probably have reviewed this once. Because
17 I've only been on the Board for a little over
18 a year.

19 MR. MARTENS: Okay.

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: But I do
21 recall that is the case. And I think that you
22 have been asked back because of the size of

1 the event.

2 MR. MARTENS: Sure.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Is it
4 different in any way, this year from last
5 year?

6 MR. MARTENS: Slightly, but not
7 inherently different, nothing that's going to
8 change dramatically. We've changed some
9 locations of certain things around, based on
10 making some tweaks here and there for crowd
11 control.

12 And just every year we see that we
13 want to move around, in particular, where
14 people line up for a soda, water, and at the
15 beverage pods and they create a road block,
16 just of human beings. So we moved that
17 around.

18 But other than that, we're moving
19 our craft beer section to the south side of
20 12th. It used to be in front of the stage on
21 Pennsylvania between 9th and 10th. And now
22 that's going to the south side of 12th.

1 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: That's good.

2 MR. MARTENS: So that is a big
3 change as it relates to being here.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And why are
5 you doing that?

6 MR. MARTENS: More space, also to
7 make it a defined area. I think it'll keep it
8 a little bit more contained. And also we want
9 to make it its own, almost event within the
10 event.

11 MR. KIRNER: I'd say the other
12 reason we're doing that, the past two years we
13 had national talent on our main stage, that's
14 that stage Steuart's referencing.

15 We're changing that this year to
16 be a culinary demonstration stage. So in
17 terms of just having something like that
18 meshes well with it, it really makes sense to
19 have a beer area by a culinary demonstration
20 stage.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. That
22 makes sense. I think maybe I should let you

1 just give, really briefly, like the overall
2 picture of Taste of DC and then how the
3 alcohol fits in.

4 MR. KIRNER: Okay. We have 60
5 plus restaurants that are on Pennsylvania
6 Avenue. So they're DC area restaurants
7 that'll come. They'll get a 10 by 10 or a 10
8 by 20 space that they'll be selling a limited
9 menu off of, so one to four menu items.

10 We'll have three locations on
11 Pennsylvania Avenue that'll be serving beer,
12 wine, soda and water. So not your big beer
13 areas, but just something where we're offering
14 like a Bud Light or a Stella or something
15 light like that.

16 And then on the south side of 12th
17 we have the craft beer area, a family zone at
18 14th and Penn, and then a line area at the
19 intersection there of 12th and Penn.

20 And then we also have two music
21 stages, one on the south of 12th and then one
22 just south of the intersection of 11th and

1 Penn and then the culinary stage at 9th and
2 Penn.

3 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And
4 how is how is the alcohol being controlled?

5 MR. KIRNER: So the entire venue's
6 going to be fenced in. We'll have initial ID
7 check at the two entrance locations. Anyone
8 that pre-purchased tickets that would have
9 included alcohol tickets, they have to get
10 their ID checked before being able to redeem
11 those tickets.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So when you
13 come into the event, you get a wrist band if
14 you think you may want to --

15 MR. KIRNER: Yes. We're really
16 the ID check. We were hoping that we could do
17 stamps as proof of age versus a wrist band.
18 But we'll have some sort of proof of age after
19 someone will get their ID checked like we've
20 done at the other events that we do.

21 So the first thing that would
22 happen if you're trying to get tickets is that

1 we'd have an ID check and give you a stamp or
2 a wrist band.

3 So we've had, I wouldn't say
4 issues is in the past, but people bypassed the
5 tent when we have it inside the venue. And
6 then when they try and get something, we have
7 to tell them they have to go back to the tent
8 and get their ID checked.

9 So it's more just being better for
10 our consumers to have that ID check be the
11 first thing. So it's something they're not
12 going to miss when they come in.

13 And then once they're in and
14 they've gotten their ID checked, most of the
15 beverages are going to be sold with beverage
16 tickets. So there's going to be two ticket
17 trailers where people can purchase beverage
18 tickets. And then they'll use those like
19 currency at the various beverage pods and beer
20 and wine tasting areas.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So
22 they can walk around with their alcohol

1 drinks. Is that correct?

2 MR. KIRNER: Yeah, the venue is
3 fenced in. That is correct.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. And is
5 it like the other place we were listening to
6 earlier, that security is for the whole venue?
7 Or do you have separate --

8 MR. KIRNER: The security is for
9 the whole venue. I'd say the majority of it
10 we're going to be allocating to those alcohol
11 areas. And then we also have MPD reimbursable
12 to beef that up.

13 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

14 MR. MARTENS: And we also have an
15 MPD squad car at the end of every block in
16 addition to the MPD reimbursable, not that
17 they're patrolling alcohol, but they are there
18 so that the police presence is surrounding the
19 event.

20 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

21 MR. MARTENS: And then you've got
22 more of an inter-MPD, the reimbursable detail,

1 you've got at least two to three officers on
2 every block. And then we'll have our security
3 personnel as well.

4 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: How much
5 security will you have? How many security
6 people will you have?

7 MR. MARTENS: We literally just
8 met with MPD this morning and are finalizing
9 those numbers. So that we've finished with
10 them, we had put 20 here. It's probably going
11 to stay right around there.

12 But again, we wanted to finalize
13 everything with MPD today and make sure that
14 we had an understanding of what they were
15 trying to do and what their presence was going
16 to be like at the event.

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And are you
18 having any particularly devoted to where
19 alcohol is sold or not?

20 MR. MARTENS: Yes.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yes.

22 MR. KIRNER: Are you referring to

1 MPD or security?

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Both.

3 MR. KIRNER: Yeah. Well, I guess
4 the answer would be both, for both of them,
5 yeah. So we're working with MPD. They're
6 going to have a couple of officers on the
7 blocks and then they want to devote officers
8 into the craft beer area.

9 And we'll have our security
10 throughout the venue in addition to the beer
11 and wine area and each of the beverage pods.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay. So
13 you're working with MPD on the numbers, right?

14 MR. KIRNER: That we have,
15 correct.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: And why do
17 you want a stamp instead of wrist bands?

18 MR. MARTENS: There's several
19 reasons. One of the things that I'm concerned
20 about with a wrist band is somebody could take
21 it off. And then they could grab a piece of
22 scotch tape or some piece of adhesive or

1 something and put it on a friend or even just
2 hold it, and they've got a wrist band on.
3 With a stamp you can't do that.

4 The other thing is, not that it
5 relates to ABRA that much, but wrist bands
6 create a huge bottle neck. They're very
7 cumbersome to get on. And they also create a
8 lot of trash, whereas stamps don't do that.

9 And once you've ID'd and decided,
10 okay, this person's 21, it's a quick thing.
11 You're not creating a lot of trash on the
12 ground.

13 So it'll help keep Pennsylvania a
14 little bit cleaner. Because the wrist bands
15 all have that little tear tab that ends up
16 falling on the ground that's holding that
17 piece of adhesive.

18 And I think a lot of the other
19 things, I'm just concerned that somebody would
20 take off a wrist band or somehow could -- I
21 mean, you could cut it off. And you could put
22 it on somebody else's wrist. And then

1 somebody who's not 21 has got a wrist band on.

2 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: So is the
3 downside though that the stamps aren't as
4 visible?

5 MR. MARTENS: No. The stamp is --

6 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You have a
7 big one?

8 MR. MARTENS: It's huge. And it's
9 got a big knife and fork on it. And it's blue
10 or red. You can't miss it. So we'd have a
11 separate color for each day. And it's an in-
12 house stamp, so it's not like something you
13 could be like, oh, that's the stamp, and go
14 out and get it. It's a custom made --

15 MR. KIRNER: And then it has text
16 on it. So, I guess, the fear of trying to
17 transfer the stamp, you'd would end up getting
18 mirror writing on it. So if someone is
19 looking at the stamp, you could tell that it's
20 not the stamp that we applied.

21 MR. MARTENS: So if somebody got
22 the stamp but then ran over to a friend and

1 licked it and tried to put it on their hand,
2 it wouldn't work. You'd be surprised. We
3 have --

4 (Laughter)

5 MR. MARTENS: If there's any way
6 around it, they think of a way to do it.

7 (Simultaneous speaking)

8 MR. MARTENS: You've got to think
9 of everything, you know.

10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: My last
11 question is, how is the alcohol being served?
12 Is it going to be in cups, specific cups?

13 MR. MARTENS: So same thing as a
14 lot of our other events that we've come before
15 you. We use clear cups.

16 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Clear, okay.

17 MR. MARTENS: It's all draft.
18 There's nothing else there. So you can't take
19 it to go. Drink it or throw it away. And
20 it's in a cold plate, so it's out of a draft
21 system.

22 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

1 There's no limit on how many drinks you can
2 get, is there?

3 MR. MARTENS: A lot of our
4 managers and the security personnel we work
5 with, they're TIPS trained. So clearly at a
6 certain point if somebody's -- It's Taste of
7 DC. This is not --

8 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yeah, right.

9 MR. MARTENS: -- very different
10 than a lot of our other events. Most people
11 are pushing strollers around. So it's a very
12 family friendly event. So we don't ever even
13 encounter that really.

14 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay,
15 perfect. All right. Mr. Ghenene?

16 MR. GHENENE: Yes, thank you. I
17 just first off want to say that I worked
18 several events that they've put on. And the
19 two of them are very hands on.

20 It's not that they're hiding in
21 the trailer or in a car somewhere. They're
22 constantly walking around and engaging

1 security, vendors, us, MPD, EMS, very, very
2 much hands on.

3 So in addition, I've also
4 administered minimally 50 ID checks at the
5 last several events that they've held. And I
6 haven't come across one under age drinker, one
7 misused ID or one fake ID. And I've tried.

8 (Laughter)

9 MR. GHENENE: And, yeah, they've
10 been very open and very helpful. So I have no
11 questions.

12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Oh, okay.
13 Great. Any other questions?

14 MR. BROOKS: Yeah.

15 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yeah, Mr.
16 Brooks?

17 MR. BROOKS: Did you guys have any
18 problems last year to speak of, none?

19 MR. MARTENS: Not ABRA related.
20 We did have one lady who fell down. I don't
21 know. I think she was dehydrated, wasn't
22 feeling well.

1 MR. KIRNER: She tripped over the
2 cable box.

3 MR. BROOKS: Oh, cable. Okay.

4 MR. KIRNER: But probably when she
5 walked in, the menu, yes --

6 MR. MARTENS: She hadn't been
7 drinking.

8 MR. ALBERTI: Not there anyways?

9 MR. MARTENS: Yeah, not with us.

10 MR. BROOKS: So are you guys
11 going to do it next year?

12 MR. MARTENS: Huh?

13 MR. BROOKS: Are you two guys
14 going to do it next year?

15 MR. KIRNER: That's the plan.

16 MR. MARTENS: 2014?

17 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Yeah.

18 MR. MARTENS: I hope so.

19 MR. BROOKS: Oh, okay. All right.
20 That's all I have, Madam Chair.

21 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay.

22 MR. BROOKS: I have no questions.

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CHAIRPERSON MILLER: All right.

And I move we approve the application of Taste of DC.

MR. BROOKS: Good luck, guys.

MR. KIRNER: Thank you very much, appreciate it. Hope to see you down there.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: You guys going to approve this?

MR. ALBERTI: Yes, of course.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Okay, very good. Thank you very much. Great job, everybody. So we're signing off now.

(Whereupon, the hearing in the above-entitled matter was concluded at 12:17 p.m.)

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
